WIDOW SOLE
LEGATEE OF LATE
F. E. BLACKMER

Estate Valued at \$14,000 of which \$3,000 is Real Property--Will of Late John C. Gilman is Probated

TWO SONS NAMED
AS THE EXECUTORS

The will of the late John C. Gilman of Kingsclear was admitted to probate yesterday. The estate was sworn at \$8,000 Mr. William B. Gilman, Royal Canadian Dragoons, St. John's P.Q., sons of the deceased are named as executors. The farm at Kingsclear has been left to Mr. William B. Gilman. The widow and other son receive legacies. Mr. J. W. McCready was proctor.

BLACKMER WILL

The will of the late Frederick E. Blackmer of this city was also admitted to probate yesterday Mr. A. R. Slipp, proctor. The estate is valued at \$14,000 of which \$3000 is real property and \$11,000 personal. The widow of the deceased is named as sole executrix and is also sole legatee. The real property consists principally of the residence on George Street. The stock of the jewelry business is included in the personal property.

PROVISION MARKET
SHOWS UPWARD TENDENCY

Pork Products have Advanced Considerably--Rolled Oats Growing Dearer

The provision market is strong with a marked tendency toward higher prices in several lines. This advance is not confined to one particular variety of food-stuffs but is general. Pork products are particularly firm.

Rolled oats advanced ten cents per barrel yesterday making a total advance of thirty cents within a few days. Corn meal has advanced ten cents per bag. Clear pork has advanced two dollars per barrel, pure lard two cents per pound, hams and bacon two cents per pound and beans ten cents per bushel. These advances in the wholesale market will have a very noticeable effect upon retail prices. Further advances are not unexpected.

PUBLICITY COMMITTEE
TO MEET MONDAY

Session Adjourned from Last Night--City Council now has Majority of Members on Committee

The Publicity Committee met last night and certain information which was desired not being to hand it was decided to adjourn the meeting until Monday evening next. Correspondence has been opened with various persons with regard to the appointment of a Publicity Agent and the required information will probably be available by Monday night. The decision of the City Council to appoint five of its members to the Publicity Committee has made the membership of that body ten which is considered by some to be too great as the body may be unwieldy as a result. There is also a tendency on the part of some members of the Board of Trade to think that the City Council is taking the publicity campaign although it originated in the board out of the hands of its members. Several of the aldermen on the Publicity Committee are also members of the Board of Trade and it is thought there will be no friction. Mr. Jennings being chairman the members of the City Council will ordinarily have a majority on the Publicity Committee.

YOUNG WOMAN NARROWLY
ESCAPED DEATH IN FIRE

Miss Lena Everett had to be Dragged from Burning Barns--Mannaseh Dunphy one of her Rescuers Severely Burned--All Cattle but one Burned to Death also Three Horses in Fire at Coun. Everett's Farm

Details of the burning of Coun. Tabor C. Everett's dwelling and barns at Kingsclear yesterday show that his daughter, Miss Lena Everett narrowly escaped death in the fire, being dragged from the burning barn just in time by Messrs. Mannaseh and James Dunphy, neighbors, who went to the fire to render what assistance they could. Mr. Mannaseh Dunphy had one of his hands and his head severely burned while helping Miss Everett.

SPARK FROM CHIMNEY.

The fire was started, according to report, by a spark from the chimney of the house, which caught upon the roof of a porch. The house stood upon a high hill and the brisk wind fanned the flames till they had complete possession of the house and spread to the barn which stood some distance away. Mrs. Everett and her daughter were the only occupants of the house at the time and their sudden danger caused them to become very much excited. Practically nothing was saved from the dwelling. When the barn caught Miss Everett rushed to the building to try and let the horses and stock out. The barn, contained thirty head of cattle and five horses. Fortunately the sheep kept on the farm were in the open and escaped destruction. The pigery also was not touched by the flames. One cow in some manner, broke loose and got out of the building. Three of the horses were burned together with the rest of the cattle.

DRAGGED FROM BARN.

Among the horses in the barn were a pair of colts which Coun. Everett had purchased this week. The most valuable of these, which had been bought from Mr. Charles Courser, was lost in the fire. The other was one of two which the Messrs. Dunphy, who had observed the fire, were able to get loose and drive out of the barn. Miss Everett was observed shortly afterward standing near a driving horse, which she evidently was trying to get out. Observing her danger, the two men seized her,

dragged her over the manger and took her outside. Had she stayed a few moments longer her life would have been lost. It was at this time that Mr. Mannaseh Dunphy received the injuries mentioned.

LOSS IS HEAVY.

It is estimated that about six hundred barrels of potatoes were stored in the cellar of the house. The bulk of these were destroyed, but it is thought a portion at the bottom still may be of some value. The total loss is estimated at between \$5,000 and \$6,000. The insurance amounts to about one-fourth of that amount.

HOMESTEAD DESTROYED.

The house, which was burned was the homestead. Coun. Everett recently bought the adjoining farm from Mr. Alfred Everett and the greater part of his farming machinery was stored in the buildings on that farm. The councillor and his family will probably make their home there for the present at least.

Coun. Everett was in this city at the time of the fire and his two sons were in the woods some distance away from home, making maple honey. He is one of the most prominent farmers in this section of York County and his numerous friends will greatly regret to learn of his heavy loss.

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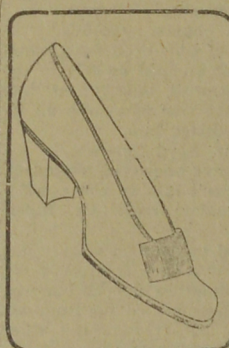

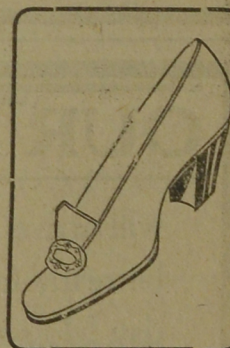
