THE WEST IN EARNEST ON RECIPROCITY ISSUE

Montreal, July 23—"I tell you that no sophistry on the part of your self-interested eastern capitalist can delude the solid common sense of the western farmer," said Mr. Robert Arnold of Regina at the Windsor Hotel this morning. Mr. Arnold is a prominent member of the Regina Stock Exchange, and by years of experience throughout the west is well qualified to gauge the public opinion of the prairie Provinces.

A FINAL WARNING

"The outcome of the recent Provincial election in Saskatchewan is pregnant with significance," continued Mr. Arnold. "It is not only a clear-out ratification of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's reciprocity proposals, but it is a final warning to eastern Canada and British Columbia. When our people sent out big delegations of farmers to interview the Laurier Administration in regard to tariff changes which we considered imperative to the proper growth and prosperity of our Provinces the Administration was wise and far-seeing enough to commence negotiations at once with the United States and to formulate a reciprocity proposal which would have proved of enormous benefit to the middle west. But the vested interests of eastern Canada resolved that no stone should be left unturned to defeat Sir Wilfrid. Every device of chicanery and flag-waving was employed, with the result that reciprocity was beaten and we were squelched."

RECIPROCITY GAINING DAILY

"But that was not the end of it. I tell you that we in the west will never let the issue of reciprocity drop. It was the paramount issue in the recent Provincial campaign, and it is gaining ground every day. The result of our recent election is a warning to eastern Canada. If you persist in following a policy of blind and selfish sectionalism, there by bringing out tremendous resources to stunted growth and ultimate stagnation, you will endanger Canadian unity."

"The final note was sounded in

the recent campaign. It will gain ground until there is good indication of a change of Federal tariff policy. Our people feel very strongly in this matter, and unless the electorate of the Dominion very soon opens its eyes to the seriousness of the situation there may be a dissolution of what was accomplished in 1867. Our allegiance to Britain is challengeable, but we shall not remain subservient to vested interest," concluded Mr. Arnold.

CHURCHILL BLAMES GERMANY

London, July 23—Winston Spencer Churchill, first Lord of the Admiralty in introducing the supplementary naval appropriation of \$50,000,000 in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon said the direct cause of the increase in expenditures in the British navy was to be found in the New German navy law the main feature of which was the increase in the striking force of ships of all classes. The effect of the new German navy law would be said that nearly four fifths of the entire German navy would be maintained in full permanent commission and instantly ready for war. The first Lord continued, "Such preparation is remarkable and as far as I am aware finds no example in the previous practice of modern naval powers."

Mr. Churchill then announced the British ship building program for the next five years saying that five battleships were to be constructed next year and four in each of the following years.
