Entries will close with the secretary, Mr. J. A. Edwards on Thursday, August 1st. No announcement is made yet concerning purses that feature not being settled.

It had been thought possible that there would be three days' racing with six classes but the program as announced yesterday provides for some good racing which will do with toward making the Old Home Celebration in success.

NATIONAL COMMISSION COLLECTS PLAYERS' DEBTS

Cincinnati, July 22—The National Commission today refused to reverse or qualify its original finding in the case of the Brooklyn club against the Omaha club relative to player Davidson and again directs Omaha to forward its check for \$750 to Brooklyn and also take \$48.98 from the salary of Davidson and remit that. After playing 73 games with Omaha Davidson was not in condition, was agreed upon.

In the case of pitcher Salles of the St. Louis Nationals, who claims to have loaned \$70 to player McAdams of the Galveston club of the Texas League, the commission directed the Galveston club to direct the amount to Sec. Bruce for transmission to player Salles.

The commission says that the orders must be complied with by July 27 or the player will be ineligible to play with a club under the National agreement from that date until the discharge of the debt.

PITCHER FOLEY OF HOLY CROSS SIGNED BY ST JOHN

"POP" GEERS WON TWO RACES AT DETROIT GRAND CIRCUIT

Pee Wee Made Great Finishes in 2.10 Trot--Dudie Archdale Outclassed the Field in 2.07 Trot--Our Colonel With Jones Driving Developed Speed in 2.15 Pace--Jim Logan Beat C the Limit out in 2.05.

Detroit, July 22—Blue ribbon week started off just right to please the people who assembled at the State Fair Grounds today, for "Pop" Geers won two races. Drivers may come and drivers may go, but for many years Mr. Geers has been the idol of the race goers of this city and State.

The win by Geers with Pee Wee was not entirely unexpected, although that gelding was known to have the flight of speed, if he would stick to the trot. He surprised his owner and everybody else by picking up two or three inside of the distance flag each time and beating them as though they were tied to stakes.

With Dudie Archdale it was different, for that slim black mare outclassed those opposed to her. Although she lowered her record in a race on Friday she came right back to that notch with "Pop" looking around at the finish.

The stage setting for the opening of the 28th annual blue ribbon meeting was admirable. The rain of Saturday had done the track good and it was of billiard-table smoothness. The soil was just firm enough not to break out, yet it did not sting. The weather was ideal, too, warm, but without a hot sun, and the time was correspondingly fast.

The attendance was about the best that any first day has had, as there were about 5000 persons in the stand and inclosure under it, where men still gather and court the tickle goddess.

Racing was good all through the card. The 2.05 pace, perhaps, was the best of the day, the victory of Jim Logan being clean-cut and of the sort to win back for that horse the splendid reputation he brought over the great divide. He forced C the Limit out in 2.03½ and then came right back and won in the same time, taking the third heat more comfortably, but doing all of it like a real race horse.

OUR COLONEL DEVELOPS SPEED

The slow race was not of the popular sort. Two horses ran won heats and then Our Colonel came along and paced much faster than the others had, winning very handily. He looked as though he might have started sooner.

There were nine horses in the 2.05 pace, worth \$2,500. C the Limit was the favorite, with Branham Baughman second choice. The eventual winner, Jim Logan, was on the bargain counter in cheap fields.

PEE WEE SHOWS WELL

Eight came out for the 2.10 trot, which was worth \$3000, and Pee Wee was picked to win, with Arona McKinney second choice and Ethel Lynne third. The scoring was protracted, but when they got the word Burt Axworthy took the lead and Pee Wee trailed, closing up at the three-quarters and when it did not look as though he had a chance Geers made his drive, Pee Wee going by as though all alone.

In the second heat Burt Axworthy and Arona McKinney made the race to the last part, where Pee Wee joined them after beating Sadie Colbert. Arona McKinney was leading, but Pee Wee brushed by very easily, Cox mare breaking near the end. The third heat saw Arona McKinney stick to the trot all the way and lead to within 30 yards of the finish. Geers came up with Pee Wee and disposed of her as he had before, and Pee Wee stepping into the 2.10 class this time with a record of 2.09½.

DIDIE ARCHDALE

The 2.07 trot was a soft spot for Dudie Archdale, now that R. T. C. is of no account and probably will not start for several meetings.

JUDGES THREATEN THE DRIVERS

The 2.10 pace was first on the card. Lily Woodford was the choice in this and she looked like something in the first heat when she went away with the lead and never gave it up. Bow-net and The Burgett being comfortably close to her, Lily tried to do the same thing in the next heat, but Trojan, who broke in the first mile, stuck to the pace and, coming with a rush in the stretch, beat her half a length.

The judges talked with several of the drivers and made threats as they

thought there was some loafing on the part of the non-heat winners. Lily Woodford, Trojan and Lou Bullock were fighting it out as they passed the half in the next heat, but they did not have a chance, as Jones turned Our Colonel loose and that horse tramped over them, winning easily in 2.07½, four seconds faster than in the first heat. Our Colonel never was in trouble after that, winning as he pleased, for the rest were dead in the final mile.

CANADIAN BOXER SCORED KNOCK OUT IN NEW YORK

Frank Flemming put Tommy Buck Out in Eighth Round--Pal Moore Outpointed by Eddie Smith

New York, July 22—Willie Bescher and Young Brown two local lightweights fought 10 fast rounds to a draw in the main bout tonight in the Garden A. C. It was a slugging match throughout. Both lads stood toe to toe and hammered away. Beecher playing continuously for Brown's body and landed many hard punches. Brown did the better work at long range and his whirlwind finish earned him a draw.

In the first match, Frankie Fleming of Canada knocked out Tommy Buck of Philadelphia. The end came just a few seconds before the final gong. Fleming had previously floored Buck in the first session and early in the last round. Buck held Fleming even for the first eight rounds, scoring a clean knockout in the sixth and had the Canadian in a bad way. Fleming came back strong in the two last chapters however, and hammered Buck all about the ring.

Eddie Smith a local lightweight outpointed Pal Moore of Philadelphia in the second bout. Smith earned the honors in six out of the 10 rounds, but Moore scored knockdowns in the second and 10th sessions. Moore was slow and only showed a shadow of his former boxing ability.

REVISED AGREEMENT GAME IN FORCE YESTERDAY

Cincinnati, July 22—The revised national agreement for the government of professional baseball clubs becomes a law today. It was ratified by the National League, the American League and the National Association of Baseball Clubs officially and promulgated by the National Baseball Commission.

The changes in the agreement while not radical are numerous, all tending toward making the rules more simple to the ordinary fan as well as lessening disputes over technicalities by the various leagues or club owners. The principal change was the creation of a Class A league and the revision of the drafting prices in vogue in the various classes of leagues.

The agreement is signed by Pres. Lynch of the National League, Pres. Johnson of the American League and M. H. Sexton, president of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues.

FIFTY THOUSAND OFFERED JOHNSON FOR TWO FIGHTS

According to Tom Andrews of Milwaukee, Promoter McIntosh's representative in the United States, Jack Johnson has been signed to box Sam Langford and Sam McVea in Australia in December and January. For meeting Langford he will get \$30,000 and \$20,000 for taking on McVea. Johnson, who will get transportation for three to Australia, is to sail for the Antipodes in September.

JACK FOURNIER RELEASED

Chicago, July 22—Announcement was made here tonight of the release of Jack Fournier by Manager Callahan of the Chicago American League baseball team. Fournier who was obtained by Chicago from Boston on a waiver has been released to the Montreal club of the International League.

HIGHLANDERS BUY BARRY

New York, July 22—The New York American League Club today purchased First Baseman Malcolm Barry from the Brockton Club of the New England League. Barry will not report to the Highlanders until the end of the New England season.
