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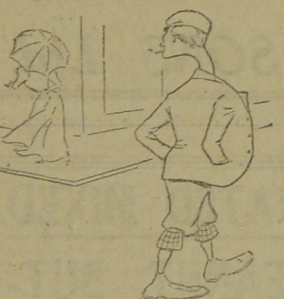

Horse-Racing at Local Track July 16th, 17th and 18th

Conference of Horsemen at St. John Yesterday Re-
 sulted in Program Being Arranged--Halifax, Mon-
 ton, St. John, Fredericton and Woodstock to have
 Meets in Order Named--Purses to be \$300 each
 each Track to Select its Classes--Racing to Boom
 in Maritime Provinces

There is every prospect that horse
 racing will have a great season in the
 province during the coming summer.
 Horse racing received a great boost
 during the last winter in St. John
 and the track at Terryburn was the
 scene of much sport. It was fully de-
 monstrated that the game had got-
 ten a grip on the public, and the
 races were well attended.

Now it is proposed to give the pub-
 lic a chance to see some high class
 racing and with this end in view mem-
 bers of the St. John Driving Club
 have been in communication with
 tacks and horse owners throughout
 the province. The plan to arrange
 the meets so that the dates would
 not clash was well received and the
 result was the meeting yesterday af-
 ternoon when provincial track own-
 ers and horsemen met in the Dufferin
 Hotel and arranged for meets to be
 held during the summer.

Delegates were present as follows:

P. A. Belliveau and A. E. Trites,
 Moncton; Hugh Gallagher, Woodstock;
 Ald. Hugh O'Neill, T. V. Monahan
 and Frank O'Neill, Fredericton; H. J.
 Fleming and John Ross, St. John
 Driving Club.

A. E. Trites was selected as chair-
 man, while John Ross was secretary.
 The chief business was the arrang-
 ing of dates for the meets to be held.
 There was considerable discussion as
 to which town should have the meet
 on July 1, but it was finally arranged
 that Moncton should get this date.

The racing programme was arrang-
 ed as follows:
 Halifax, June 21 and 22; Moncton,
 June 29 to July 6; St. John, Old
 Home Week, July 9 to July 14; Fre-
 dericton, July 16, 17 and 18; Wood-
 stock, July 30 and 31.

It was agreed that purses amount-
 ing to \$300 would be hung up for
 each class. The management of the
 tracks is to select the classes which
 are to be run off on their tracks.

N. B. AND MAINE

Some Knotty Points to be Cleared up
 --Schedule not Satisfactory to all
 Clubs

A meeting of representatives of
 clubs composing the New Brunswick
 and Maine Baseball League is being
 held here today and it is hoped that
 after the meeting everything will be
 working smoothly. The representa-
 tives of the St. John club, D. B.
 Donald and Joe Page, arrived here
 last night and the Houlton and
 Woodstock representatives at noon.
 The schedule is said to be unsatis-
 factory to Houlton and Woodstock,
 and the meeting may have to devote
 some attention to it. St. John and
 Fredericton are satisfied with the
 dates proposed but may have to give
 in to the other clubs.

Salaries are bound to cause discus-
 sion, as both Fredericton and St.
 John realize that they cannot get
 together teams as good as those
 which they had in 1911 on a salary-
 limit of \$1,000 per month and Wood-
 stock has shown an inclination to
 think the same.

Joe Page, manager of the St. John
 club, has stated that he had signed
 on a good college catcher for the
 season. The new backstop is M. A.
 Maher of the University of Vermont,
 and he is rated as being a good one.

GRIFFITHS AGAINST SQUEEZE PLAY

Clark Griffith, like Jimmy Callahan
 of the White Sox, thinks the squeeze
 play on the bases of baseball, and
 it is not likely that the Nationals
 will ever be caught trying this play
 Griffith thinks that when a right-
 handed pitcher allows this play to be
 pulled on him he should be fined.
 He realizes that, inasmuch as a left-
 hander is unable to watch third, a
 base-runner starts off that base, but
 he holds that there is no excuse for
 a right-hander falling for this game.
 But Griffith has figured a play which
 is much more effective to his way of
 thinking. For instance, if there is a
 man on first and third, and none are
 out, the first baseman is sure to hug
 his bag in an endeavor to hold the
 runner on there. Griffith argues that
 under such conditions a bat towards
 first base will assure one run and
 maybe more, and that there is no
 way to break up the play, since the
 man on third makes no effort to
 score until he sees that the bunt laid
 down.

OUTCLASSED JACK WUEST

Cincinnati, O., April 29--Before a
 packed house here this evening Jack
 ("Twin") Sullivan of Boston out-
 classed Harry Wuest, the local white
 hope, in ten rounds of burlesque fight-
