Albion R. Foster, C.P.R. Police Brought Three Prisoners in Today—Trial this Afternoon

The three are charged with assaulting and severely beating two Englishmen named Odell and Derrick, employees of the C.P.R. The assault, it is said, was committed on April 23rd. The three prisoners are Frank Harris, Chester Kane and Robert Leakin, sometimes known as "The Slasher." All belong to McAdam. Odell and Derrick, the two principal witnesses, also came in from McAdam.

The three appeared for trial before Police Magistrate Marsh this afternoon.

SUGGEST DIVERSION
OF RAILWAY ROUTE
AT SPRINGHILL

Summer Residents Wait upon Engineer Ross Thompson of St. John & Quebec Railway to Protest against River Route

PRESIDENT A. R. GOULD
ARRIVES IN CITY TODAY

A delegation of citizens who occupy summer-residences near Springhill waited upon Mr. Ross Thompson, chief engineer of the St. John & Quebec Railway, this morning and pointed out that the proposed location of the line of that railway along the river-front at Springhill covered ground already occupied by camps and would if used necessitate their removal at considerable expense to both owners and railway company. It was suggested to Mr. Thompson that the line be diverted or that an alternative route be followed. Consideration of the request was promised. Those composing the delegation were Messrs. H. G. Chestnut, F. B. Edgecombe and F. W. Porter.

RESIDENCES ESTABLISHED

Residential sections averaging about ten miles in length are to be established on the line of construction of the railway and a resident engineer placed in charge of each. The names of such engineers will be announced shortly. Mr. G. Fred Baird will have the first residence west from Fredericton and Mr. Keith now in the local office of the chief engineer will have a residence on the Gagetown-Fredericton section.

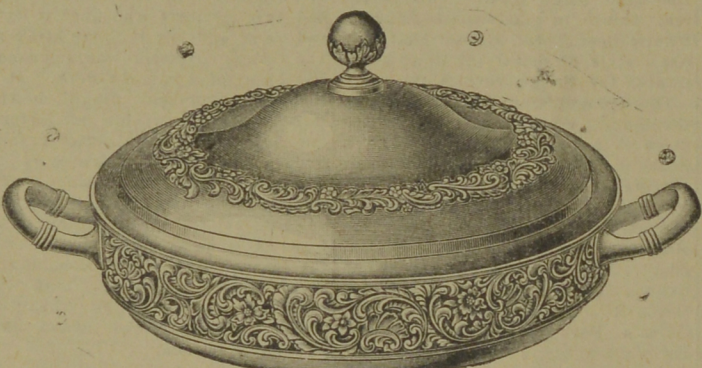
CIVIC BYELECTION

Farrell should he offer as a candidate.

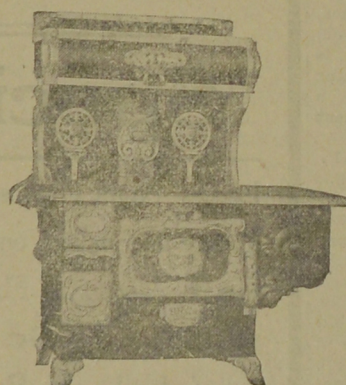
