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## A GREAT VICTORY

Returns from the provincial elections in Saskatchewan are as yet incomplete, but sufficient information is available to show that the Liberal government of Mr. Walter Scott has achieved a notable triumph at the polls. The contest was one of the most bitter in the history of the Dominion, and the big prairie province, by returning the Scott government to power, has certainly done itself proud.

In the last House, which consisted of forty-one members, the Liberals numbered twenty-eight and the Conservatives thirteen. From the returns to hand it looks as if the parties in the new House, which will consist of fifty-four members, will stand in nearly the same relative positions. Premier Scott's majority will be at least twenty, which is sufficient for all practical purposes.

Premier Scott fought the battle on the trade issue and the electors of the province have repeated and emphasized the verdict which they recorded on the 21st of September last. They declared for larger markets then and their bitter experience of last winter, when they saw their grain rotting in the fields for want of a market does not appear to have modified their views on the question of reciprocity. They have shown by their verdict of yesterday that so far as the west is concerned, the reciprocity issue is still very much alive.

The Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of the Interior in the Borden cabinet, made the fight his own. All the influence and patronage of the federal government was used on behalf of the Tories and they had the benefit of an enormous campaign fund, subscribed by the manufacturers of the east. The most flagrant attempt was made to coerce the settlers, especially the foreign element, into voting against the government; every device known to unscrupulous Tory political heelers was resorted to, but apparently to no purpose. The Tories were overwhelmingly defeated as they deserved to be and Liberals all over Canada will rejoice over the great victory achieved by Premier Scott.

The great significance of the election in Saskatchewan is shown by the following extract from a Regina despatch to The Montreal Star of Wednesday last:

"Alberta has an election also shortly, and it is generally admitted that as Saskatchewan will go, so will go Alberta."

"If the Conservatives can carry Saskatchewan, Alberta will probably follow suit. If the Liberals retain Saskatchewan, it will greatly strengthen the chances of the Sifton government. IF THE LIBERALS WIN THE TWO PROVINCES IT WILL GIVE THEM A GREAT ADVANTAGE NEXT DOMINION ELECTION. THEY WILL HAVE A GREATER CHANCE OF HOLDING THEIR PRESENT MAJORITY AND OF WINNING THE TEN NEW SEATS THE PROVINCE WILL GET."

The Liberal victory in Saskatchewan will be duplicated in Alberta just as soon as the Sifton government makes up its mind to call on the electors. And as The Star correspondent well says: "If the Liberals win the two provinces it will give them a great advantage next Dominion election."

## THE ADJUNCT QUESTION

The New York Times repudiates the interpretation placed upon President Taft's private letter to Mr. Roosevelt, namely, that when the President used the word "adjunct" he had any thought of political absorption, as alleged by the flag-bearer organs. The Times says:

"In that sense, in precisely the sense that Mr. Taft had in mind, we are an 'adjunct' of Great Britain. We are an adjunct because during the last fiscal year we exported to Great Britain and Ireland commodities valued at \$576,613,974. We have been doing something like that right along year after year. This enormous volume of exports 'transfers' to London bank credits that

we find mighty convenient when we have need of cash. But for one obstructive tariff, which restricts our exports as well as our imports, our export trade to Great Britain and Ireland would be much greater. We should then be more of an adjunct of Great Britain than at present. That would suit us still better. We enjoy the role of adjunct, and would welcome an increasingly large and intimate adjunctive relation with other great commercial Powers—France, Germany, Italy, Russia, and all South America."

The Times says quite truly that "the English and Canadian newspaper writers know very well that Mr. Taft was thinking only of commercial relations, not at all of political. All Western Canada is extremely desirous to become an adjunct of the United States in the sense of the President's letter. The relation is reciprocal, and we should like nothing better than to become an adjunct of Canada in the commercial way. Reciprocity would make us both adjuncts, one of the other."

Premier Borden discussing the naval question in his speech at the banquet of the Royal Colonial Institute declared that "any great Dominion undertaking to share upon a permanent basis in the sea defence of the Empire must have some voice in the policy which shapes the issues of war or peace." Sir Wilfrid Laurier laid down the principle that when England is at war Canada is at war. It was the policy of the late government to build a Canadian Navy which in time of war would be under the control of the British admiralty to be used in defence of the Empire. Had Sir Wilfrid put forward the policy advocated by Mr. Borden he would have been denounced by Tory orators as a buckstering politician and a traitor. But we suppose Mr. Borden has to shape his policy to meet the views of his nationalist supporters, and his ultra loyal followers must meekly submit to it.

Speaking at a banquet on St. John last night, George W. Fowler, M.P., said that one of the chief works which should be done in the province was the improvement of the roads. He said that the roads of the province were at present in a disgraceful condition and that the provincial government should get to work and put the highways in first class condition for then we would see great development along agricultural lines in the province. It is to be sincerely hoped that the Fleming government will heed the advice given by Mr. Fowler.

Mr. H. L. Drayton, Corporation Counsel for the City of Toronto, has been named as head of the railway commission in succession to the late Judge Mabey. So far as can be learned Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., was not given the opportunity to decline the position.

The reciprocity issue seems very much alive in Saskatchewan. The farmers of that province take no stock in the loyalty cry of the Tory flag-bearers. They want larger markets and they won't be happy till they get them.

The result of the election in Saskatchewan was a solar plexus blow for that prince of political manipulators, Hon. Bob Rogers, minister of the Interior.

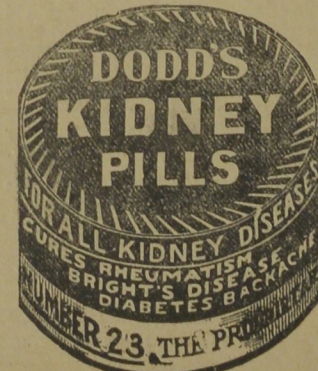

Dressing for Asparagus—A delicious dressing for boiled asparagus is made by mixing one heaping teaspoonful of butter with a tablespoonful of vinegar seasoned with salt and pepper and blending with a teaspoonful of water in which the asparagus was boiled. Set this where it will melt without cooking. If desired a little grated cheese may be sprinkled over the asparagus after the dressing is put on it.

Strawberry Shortcake—Sift a heaping teaspoonful of baking powder into a pint of flour, add a little salt rub into it a level tablespoonful of butter and mix with half a pint of milk to a soft dough. Press it into a pan with a spoon till it is about half an inch thick. Bake for fifteen or twenty minutes. Chop and sweeten the strawberries, break the cake open and spread it with butter, then pile the strawberries on. Whipped cream looks better and goes further than the same amount of plain cream.
