## HON. MR. WHITE TURNED THE FIRST SOD

(Continued from page one)

sition in the world's trade as the half-way station between Europe and the awakening nations of the east, and of St. John's relation to this trade.

Premier Flemming congratulated the city on the commencement of the great work of development but predicted that it would not be many years before even these enlarged facilities would be insufficient to meet the needs of the port. St. John is bound to share in the growth and prosperity of the whole nation, he said and in the future he expects to see as great a city on the eastern side of Courtenay Bay as there now is on the western side.

Hon. Mr. Reid dealt with the importance of the works which are being undertaken not only to St. John but to the whole dominion. He regarded St. John not as the port of New Brunswick but as a port for the whole country. Upper Canada and the west must depend largely on St. John as their gateway and the pressure of the country's growth will make itself felt in additional expansion in St. John. He wished that every member in the federal cabinet and every member of parliament might have been present in order that they would be able to appreciate more fully the importance of the work which is being undertaken and that which must be done in the future. The present development scheme is the result of the co-operation of both political parties working together for the good of the country as a whole.

### OVATION FOR DR. PUGSLEY

Hon. Dr. Pugsley was given another ovation when he came forward to address the gathering. He welcomed to the occasion the distinguished speakers who had preceded him, and expressed his gratification to find then so optimistic regarding the future of Courtenay Bay as could possibly be wished. He felt that presence of members of the federal and provincial governments on this occasion argued well for the future of the port.

Naturally this was a proud day for the speaker. He felt somewhat like a proud father on the occasion of the birth of a lusty son for he regarded the Courtenay Bay project as his own baby. He regretted that circumstances over which he had no control had deprived him of the privilege of attending to the up-bringing of the child (laughter) but when he looked at the smiling faces of those around him he felt that he was in good hands. If by any chance the youngster did not receive good treatment he felt that he could depend on his good friends Hon. Mr. Hazen and Geo. W. Foster, to see that its rights were looked after and in spite of all these protectors it did not flourish he knew that his friend Dr. Daniel would be only too glad to step in and prescribe for its welfare. (Great laughter)

Continuing in a more serious vein, Dr. Pugsley said that since the time of Confederation the people of St. John had shown their deep faith in the future of the city, and that, when they could receive no encouragement from others, they had not hesitated to dip into their pockets and spend a million and a quarter dollars to equip the port for the place it should take as a national

port. One question on which St. John and all the people of the maritime provinces are united, he said was the limiting of the tariff preference for British products to those which enter through Canadian ports and as soon as the Transcontinental facilities and the facilities at St. John are complete, it would be the duty of the government to take this step so that Canadian trade should cease to build up foreign ports.

**GEORGE W. FOWLER, M. P.**

George W. Fowler, M. P., was the concluding speaker and in a brief address voiced his sympathy with the ambitions of St. John and his congratulations on the work which was being commenced in the eastern harbor.

### A GREAT EXPLOSION

The next feature on the program was the setting off of the first blast on the site of the proposed dry dock. The charges of explosives had been prepared in the face of the cliff and when the signal was given Hon. Mr. White pressed the button which established the electrical connection which discharged the blast. There was a tremendous roar accompanied by immense sections of rock could be seen flying through the air. At the discharge of the blast the Union Jack on the speakers' stand was raised and the Cambridge City Band which furnished music for the occasion, broke in the national anthem while hearty cheers were given by the assembled multitude.

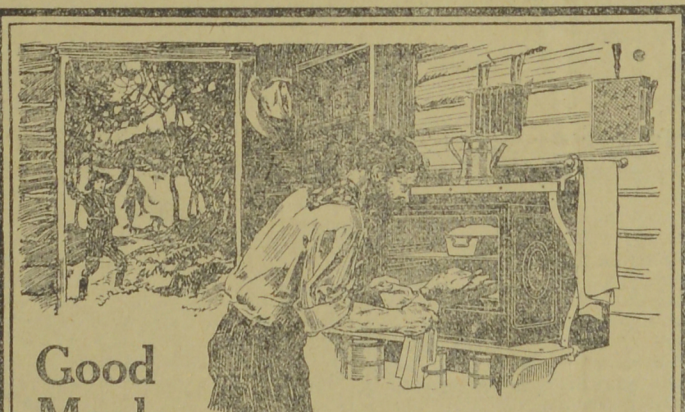

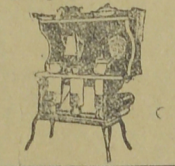

## BAPTIST CHURCH HAS LOST GREAT DIVINE

Bridgetown, July 5.—The death at eleven o'clock on Saturday morning at the age of seventy years, of Rev. C. Goodspeed, D. D., of Paradise, came as a shock to the valley. The great and good man was stricken down last March after a heavy cold, with that dread disease—consumption. Never of a robust constitution he was upheld by a magnificent energy that made him a tower of strength to the Baptist denomination. After graduation in an arts course in 1865, at the University of New Brunswick, Fredericton, he spent two years at Regent College, London, England. Then he came home to St. Andrew's, and was ordained, taking the pastorate of the Baptist church at that place. A year or two later on he went to Newton, where he completed a three years' course in two. He was then called to the Baptist church at Woodstock, Ontario, where he also taught in the Baptist college at that place. Later on he went to Leipzig, Germany, where he spent five years. This was his longest and last pastorate. After this he took the editorship of The Messenger and Visitor, at St. John, for some years, and later was offered the chair of systematic theology in McMaster University, Toronto. In 1906 he went to the Baylor University in Texas, and was there four years. Later he spent a year at Wolfville in the chair of systematic theology and church history.

Because of failing health he has spent the past eighteen months at his beautiful residence—bought some ten years ago, on the banks of the Annapolis River at Paradise—supplying pulpits where and when needed. In a short interview recently with a Herald representative, he said:

"One of the happiest moments of my life is when I leave my students at college and start for my summer home at Paradise."

Dr. Goodspeed was author of a commentary on the book of Genesis in the American commentary of the Old Testament. This was started by the late Dr. D. M. Welton, who on account of failing health, handed the matter over to Dr. Goodspeed, who finished the work. A booklet on "The Sabbath" was also the work of his pen. At the annual conventions Dr. Goodspeed was always listened to with rapt attention on any subject that he had in hand.

The funeral service was held at the Baptist Church on Monday afternoon. Short addresses were made by Dr. Kempton of Dartmouth, Dr. Chipman of Berwick, S. S. Poole of Middleton, and Rev. Mr. McNinch, his pastor. The underbearers were the Revs. McNeil, Stearns, Balcorn and Rutledge. A widow—who was Miss Fowler of Amherst—two adopted daughters, and a brother at Fredericton, survive. The burial took place at the Paradise cemetery.

## LEAVE TO APPEAL NOT TO BE GIVEN

London, Eng., July 10.—Before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council Monday the Hon. C. J. Doherty, Canadian minister of justice, asked for special leave to appeal in the Quebec marriages case.

Mr. Doherty surveyed with great minuteness the various steps that had led to the present application on the subject. The matter, he said, had given rise to a very considerable agitation, and a goal deal of strong feeling had been generated by the fact that the validity of marriages, at all events between Roman Catholics and Protestants, was dependent upon the ceremony being performed by the Roman Catholic church. Certain portions of the agitation regarded this as constituting a very serious evil.

The government of Canada, said Mr. Doherty, simply felt, in view of the general importance of the matters involved, a general desire that they should be settled by a judgment from the highest tribunal of the realm, and that it was incumbent to make the present application to Their Lordships for leave to appeal.

Lord Chancellor Haldane, who presided over the Judicial Committee, said:

"We consider this a most proper case—obviously of very great constitutional importance. I understand you desire a special sitting."

Mr. Doherty—"We have a very earnest desire that the case should be heard this summer."

The Lord Chancellor—"In that case Their Lordships will endeavor to make special arrangements."

Mr. Doherty intimated that the government had provided arguments on both sides.

It was decided that the case should be taken up, if possible, on the 23rd inst.

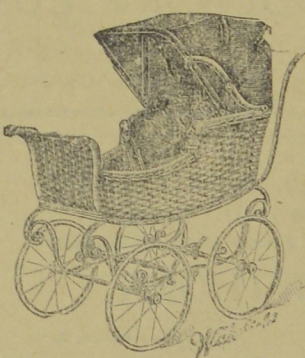
