BARING AND PREMIER WINNERS AT MOOSEPATH MEET YESTERDAY

Interesting Racing--Driver Warman Hurt in First Heat of the 2.17 Trot

St. John, July 12--Another good program of races was run off at Moosepath Park yesterday afternoon and as on the previous day the attendance was only fair. The races were the 2.14 trot and 2.17 pace, and the 2.17 trot and 2.20 pace. Both were hotly contested and those present were treated to some live racing. Baring, owned and driven by Frank Boutilier, was the favorite in the first race, and he won in four heats. Out of eight entries, five started. They were: Allie W., owned by James Adams, of Halifax, and driven by Frank Adams; Masterpiece, owned and driven by W. V. Dowse, of Attleboro (Mass.); Dimple K., owned by P. H. Reed of Fort Fairfield, and driven by G. W. Gerow; Prince Louise St. Stephen, and driven by D. Steeley and Baring, owned and driven by Frank Boutilier of Halifax. Thomas J., Candy Girl and Orphan Girl were all drawn.

In the second race there were ten entries, but only five came up to the wire. The five were: Frank Power, owned by F. Boutilier of Halifax; Kate Alcoyne, owned by D. G. Harlow, of Bridgetown, and driven by William Buckley; Blue Light, owned and driven by D. D. Warman; Premier owned and driven by P. A. Belliveau, of Moncton; and Steele, owned and driven by M. R. Stewart, of Fort Fairfield. Those who did not start were Billy C., Our Protein, Low Helen, Jerome and Surveyor. Steele was the favorite in this race, but made a poor showing, his best performance made being second place in the first heat. In the third heat he got the flag.

The race was won by Premier in three straight heats. There was some good racing in this class, Blue Light showing up to good advantage. The best time made was in the first heat, which was finished in 2.26. The second heat ended in 2.31, and the last heat in 2.28. Premier ran a great race and beat the Steele horse all to pieces.

In the first heat of the race D. D. Warman, who was driving Blue Light, received a nasty cut on one of his cheeks, his glasses breaking while the horses were going down the back stretch. He was forced to lay up. Dr. McGrath taking his place. The following is the summary of the races:

Two games were taken by Washington yesterday from Cleveland, in Washington. Tom Hughes, whose luck against Cleveland has become a baseball tradition, won the first game in the eleventh inning by 2 to 1. Walter Johnson held the slugging Naps to eight hits and beat them in the second game 4 to 3. Cleveland got one more hit than Washington in each contest, but the strange fatality which pursues the Naps when they play the Nationals got in its deadly blows that were more effective than swats. Cleveland has won but twice from Washington this season in nine games.

While on the grand tour he won four games and lost eleven. The fact that he was shifted about so much, but was not allowed to return to the bushes proved that the expert eyes of the managers saw something worth while in him if it could only be brought out.

Perhaps the fact that Curtis whitewashed the Superbas with only two hits attracted Dahlen. Bill will now try his hand with the traveler, and if he fails it will almost certainly be curtains for Clifton G.

DURNAN WON EASILY
