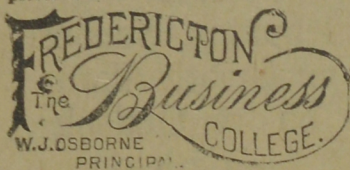

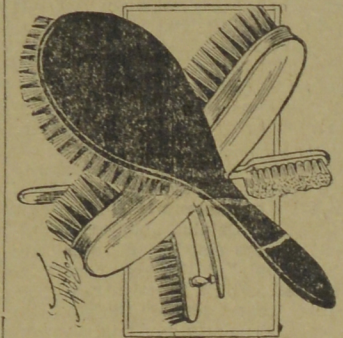

## VANDALS DESECRATE ONTARIO CEMETERY

St. Thomas, Ont., June 14—The village of Delmer, twenty miles east of here in South Oxford was thrown into a state of excitement when it was discovered that sometime during Wednesday night vandals had desecrated the local cemetery by overthrowing and smashing about a hundred tombstones and monuments so that the graveyard looks as though a cyclone had passed over it. Tell tale foot prints have been found in the grounds and these are being carefully guarded until the arrival of provincial detectives today. Suspicion is said to point strongly to one man to whom circumstances seem a motive.

## LAW AGAINST BRIBERY IS VERY STRINGENT

Any man who bribes or takes a bribe in the elections on June 20 may lose the chance to vote again for seven years.

If any voter refuses to tell what he knows about bribery or other corrupt practices he may be fined \$400 or he will stay in jail until he is willing to give evidence.

This is the new law on bribery in provincial elections passed at the 1911 session of the legislature, and it enables a small number of persons to make the application and see that the law is enforced.

In order that the new law may be understood and the electors warned in time against some practices that have prevailed in elections in the past the principal sections of the new act are given below:

"Whenever a petition, within sixty days after the return, has been made to the provincial secretary as required by Section 90 of the New Brunswick Elections Act, and has been presented to the chief justice, signed by any 25 or more electors qualified to vote at the election to which such return relates, stating that corrupt practices have, or that there is reason to believe that corrupt practices have extensively prevailed in such election, and praying the chief justice to cause an enquiry to be made under this act, he may appoint two judges for the purpose of making an enquiry into the existence of such corrupt practices.

"The judges shall, by all such lawful means as to them appear best, with a view to discovery of the truth, inquire into the manner in which the election has been conducted, and whether any corrupt practices have been committed at such election and if so, the nature and particulars of such corrupt practices, and the persons who directly or indirectly have been guilty thereof, and the persons who, before, during, or after the same, have been accessories thereto.

"The judges shall have, for the purposes of such investigation or inquiry to be instituted by them in pursuance of this act, all such powers, rights and privileges as are vested in his majesty's supreme court for the province for in any judge thereof on the occasion of the trial of any action or suit in respect of the following matters:

"(a) The enforcing the attendance of witnesses and examining them on oath, affirmation, or otherwise, as the commissioners may think fit.

"(b) The compelling of the production of books, papers or documents which in the opinion of the judges, are necessary to be produced.

"(c) The adjourning of the court, from time to time, and from place to place within the province as the judges may deem necessary.

"(d) The punishing of persons guilty of contempt.

"If any person summoned as a witness neglects or refuses, after be-

ing paid tendered has fees, according to the scale of witness fees in supreme court, to appear at the time and place appointed by the summons, and no excuse, which in the opinion of the judges, is sufficient, is offered for such neglect or refusal, then, after proof, on oath or affirmation to the satisfaction of the judges, of the summons having been served upon such person, either personally or by leaving the same for him with some adult person at his last or most usual place of abode, the judges may issue their warrant to bring and have such persons at the time and place therein mentioned before the judges, (the and then to be examined on oath or affirmation. Such warrant, and the warrant of commitment in the next succeeding section, may be executed by any sheriff or constable in the province to whom it may have been delivered for that purpose, and the person ordered by the said warrant to be arrested and conveyed before the judges or to the jail, specified in said warrant, as the case may be, may be so arrested and conveyed by such officer, whether arrested within or without, or conveyed wholly within or without the county of which such officer is a sheriff or constable.

"Every inquiry and every examination to witnesses under this act shall be conducted in public.

STIFF PENALTIES

"Any person who neglects or refuses to appear before the judges in obedience to any summons under this act, duly served upon him, and offers no reasonable excuse for such neglect or refusal, shall, in addition to any penalty herebefore under this act in such case imposed, also be liable to a fine not exceeding \$400.

"Whenever it appears by the report of the judges that any person named by them has been guilty of corrupt practices, and has not been furnished by them with certificates of indemnity as provided for in Section 16 of this act, the clerk of the county court for the county in which the inquiry is held, shall take the necessary proceedings to secure the conviction of such person for such corrupt practices, and on the trial of any person charged with such corrupt practices or any of them, the report of the judges shall be prima facie evidence of his guilt.

"In any proceeding for any recovery of the fines provided for in Section 83 of The New Brunswick Controverted Elections Act, the judge of the county court may include in any conviction made by him, an adjudication that the defendant shall be debarred from voting for a term of seven years from the date of the conviction. Provided, however, that if he omits to make any such adjudication a conviction of the defendant the offence mentioned in such section shall have the effect of debarring him from voting for the term of seven years from the date of the conviction."

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## THE OPPOSITION PLATFORM

The new administration will inaugurate a POLICY FOR THE RELIEF AND BETTERMENT OF AGRICULTURE:

By introducing legislation with a view to assisting provincial farmers, who lack the necessary capital to bring their lands up to a satisfactory productiveness, such assistance to be by financial aid under proper safeguards, by long term loans upon the provincial credit, at a low rate of interest and easy terms of repayment, thereby increasing development and production and encouraging our farmers and their sons to remain in the province—

By associating a practical farmer with the administration of the Department of Agriculture—

By abolishing unnecessary offices in the Department of Agriculture so that the appropriations therefor may serve their purpose and no longer be largely wasted in the salaries and travelling expenses of useless officials—

By aiding the establishment of cheap rural telephone services throughout the province—

We will also remove the administration of the roads absolutely from politics, and place the expenditure of the road monies directly in the hands of the people, thereby abolishing the waste of the monies passing through expensive and unnecessary officials—

We will provide for the taxing for school purposes of granted forest lands lying contiguous to school districts (which now escape taxation), thereby improving the schools of remote and depopulated sections, and relieving from the present excessive rates the farmers who remain upon the land and in these districts—

We will, except in cases of imperative urgency, put up all public works to tender and award the contract therefor to the lowest bidder—

We will provide in all government contracts, conditions to secure the payment of such wages as generally are accepted as current in each trade for competent workmen in the district where the work is carried out; this to apply also to work undertaken by the government, which is done by necessary day's work—

We will keep ordinary expenditures of the province within the ordinary revenues—

We will undertake a re-survey and valuation of the Crown Lands of the province and to provide for the conservation of our forest revenue under the direction of scientific foresters—

We will promote and encourage the colonization and settlement of the Crown Lands, which are adapted to agriculture—

We will amend the mining laws
