## WONDERFUL VIGOR OF SIR WILFRID LAURIER

(Montreal Herald.)

So completely does the political personality of a great man usurp our imaginations that we often forget his merely human aspects. It was so, for instance, with the England of Gladstone and the Germany of Bismarck. It is so with the Canada of Laurier. Such men become identified with the ideas for which they stand to so great an extent that those for whom their ideas are living, throbbing realities cannot realize that the intellects in which those ideas originate, or the tongues which express them, must perish while their spiritual progeny continue to inspire mankind.

One of the constant miracles of Canadian politics is the vigor of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Taken as a more physical achievement his activity during the last week has been remarkable. To travel from Ottawa in the morning, hold many important political conversations during the day, deliver a speech of two hours' duration and of outstanding importance at night, to remain after that speech was finished until the small hours of the morning, discussing the situation with enthusiastic followers from all over the country, to rise the next morning as fresh and blithe as ever in the memory of the previous night's triumph, surely this is a feat which might excite the admiration of men of half his years.

Sir Wilfrid, to his followers, has always seemed endowed with perpetual youth. Destiny, that mysterious goddess who, as Renan says, clears the way for her favorites, has accorded him a life beyond the psalmist's span. And in those quantities which are the factors of youth, in virility, energy, lucidity, enthusiasm, optimism, he has not in his long life made any appearance more characteristic than his speech at the Windsor Hotel the other night.

Great men build far beyond the confines of their personalities. Whether Sir Wilfrid's remaining days be few or many his enemies who have built hopes upon his physical limitations are foolish. He has built up a great Liberal party to carry on his work.

Those who saw him arrive from Ottawa the other day saw an alert and vigorous man. They did not forget that he is over seventy, because that historical fact is too familiar, but they did marvel that his burden of years should have sat lightly upon him. That was an impression of his mere physical robustness but only those who heard his speech and saw the speaker in action could fully realize how little his appearance belied the truth. Too often in great personalities the fire of the spirit burns out the clay.

For the sword outwears the sheath. And the soul wears out the breast. And the heart must pause to breathe. And love itself have rest.

But in the case of Laurier the scabbard of his spirit has proved worthy of so fine a blade. The fascination of his personality is undiminished and his dash and courage in the darkest hour have lifted his followers up to a vision of triumph.

## STRONGLY ADVOCATED CANADIAN NAVY

The Canadian Courier has the following reference to the navy problem:

Those who believe in a Canadian parliament, Canadian courts, Canadian foreign trade, and a Canadian army, must believe in a Canadian navy. At best, a cash contribution policy is but temporary; and many of those who favored a cash contribution are in favor of a Canadian navy as a permanent policy.

Wealth is not the only important thing in national life. A nation may be rich and yet play a small part in the world drama. Brains, skill, courage, foresight, intelligence, physique—these are the attributes which count in international diplomacy, commerce and warfare. The man is the badge of the nation. As the Canadian militia system is intended to develop the man as a land-defender, so a Canadian navy would develop the man as a sea-defender. The one is the complement of the other. Both are the majesty of an efficient and self-contained people.

A Canadian navy is more than ships. It includes dry docks, shipyards, coaling stations, arsenals, coastal defence, naval volunteers or militia, training ships and war vessels. It is a complex institution for training citizens in the art of national defence against attack from the sea. It is the insurance which Canada must pay for the maintenance of its good name within the Empire and for the protection of the Canadian flag in home and foreign waters.

Surely we are not a nation of money-grabbers or Red-Indians willing to trust the defense of our country to treaties which we cannot enforce to Monroe doctrines, or fortuitous circumstances. There can be no national pride or enthusiasm in that No real man wants to be a citizen in a country which depends for its national existence on the favor of other peoples.

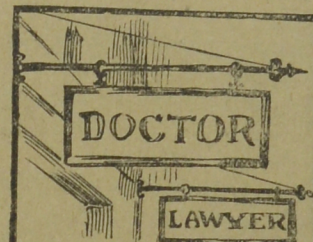
