LABOR FEDERATION TO MEET

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 9.—Headquarters were opened here today for the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor. President Samuel Gompers will call the gathering to order Monday morning and the sessions will probably continue a week or ten days. The convention is expected to be one of more than ordinary interest and importance to the world of organized labor. The reports and discussions will deal with the whole industrial situation. Some spirited declarations are looked for in regard to the recent textile strike at Lowell and the long detention in jail of Ettor and his companions.

At the recent convention of the Cigar Makers' International Union, a resolution to inaugurate an old-age pension system was defeated.

TURKS OUTFOUGHT AND OUTGENERALLED

London, Nov. 7.—Only five little districts now remain in the possession of Turkey out of the vast territory in Europe, which she has ruled for centuries. Even these five districts comprising Constantinople, Adrianople, Saloniki, Monastir and Scutari are seriously menaced. It is reported that the great stronghold of Saloniki has been evacuated and that the Turkish army stationed in the city has been withdrawn but confirmation of this has not yet been received. Which direction the retreating army is supposed to have taken was not mentioned in the report, but if it is true that the Turks have abandoned the city, they must sooner or later come into contact with one of the armies in vesting the fortress which ever way they take.

Monastir, also where, Pethi Pasha has a large Turkish army under him, is said to have been occupied by the allied Balkan troops but this report lacks confirmation.

Between the Bulgarian army and Constantinople now stand only the Thohalja forts which are held by an army that has suffered a series of crushing defeats and that has been rendered it is believed in military circles incapable of making any sustained defence against a vigorous assault some villages in the vicinity of this last line of defence are reported already to be in the hands of the Bulgarians.

The commanders of the Bulgarian invaders are said to have set Sunday next as the day on which they will enter the Turkish capital with their troops and hold a service of thanksgiving in the mosque of St. Sophia.

The Turkish fortress of Scutari on the Montenegrin frontier and that of Adrianople in the eastern sphere of operations are still making a stubborn resistance against the efforts of the besiegers.

Military critics who know the country well, after the warning not to expect the early fall of Adrianople promised by the optimistic Bulgarians. The critics point out that the invaders have not yet reached the principal line of forts around that city.

The defenders of Scutari, too, have repeatedly and successfully assumed the offensive and have managed to keep the line open by which they can supply Tarakisch the other Turkish fortress on Lake Scutari with provisions and ammunition.

IS UNDER ARREST

Chicago, Nov. 7.—Jack Johnson, heavyweight prize fighter, was arrested by federal officers tonight, charged with a violation of the Mann white slave law.

His arrest followed the return by the federal grand jury of an indictment charging him with having caused the transportation of Belle Scriber, a white woman, twenty-six years old, from Pittsburgh to Chicago August 10, 1910, for an unlawful purpose.

Federal officers searched the south side several hours before Johnson was found in a hotel surrounded by four negro guards.

An attempt was at first made by the guards to prevent the officers from entering Johnson's room, but they were pushed aside and the government warrant served on the prize fighter without serious difficulty.

At the federal building tears came to his eyes as the officers put handcuffs on his wrists.

"You don't have to do this; I am not going to run away," he said.

Johnson's bonds have been fixed at \$30,000 but all the federal judges had left the building for the night and declined to leave their homes to go through formality of accepting bail. After several hours' work Johnson found a court clerk willing to act and the prize fighter was taken to the home of his alleged mother on the south side, who signed the bond along with several others and Johnson was released from custody.

Johnson was indicted on four counts and his bail fixed at \$30,000 by United States Judge Landis. Federal officers were instructed to arrest

Johnson who could not be found early this evening. The search for him extended to various quarters of the city.

The jury heard the testimony of Lucille Cameron, of Minneapolis, whose mother charged Johnson with abduction, and she was held as a witness in \$15,000 bail.
