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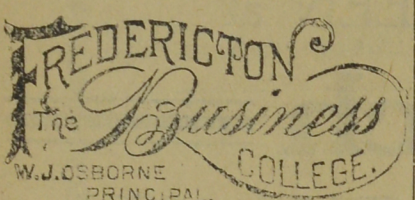

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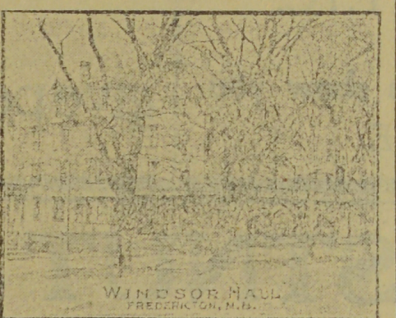

NEWS FORECASTS FOR
THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D. C., Nov. 9.—The
Federal Government's anti-trust suit
against the Prince Line and other
steamship companies engaged in the
trade between the United States and
Brazil is set for trial next Friday.
Particular interest attaches to this
case because it will be the first trial
under the Sherman law based upon
alleged deferred rebates and freight
agreements.

President Taft has accepted an in-
vitation to visit New York at the
end of the week to be the guests of
the Lotos Club at a dinner to be
given Saturday night.

William Vincent Astor will attain
his majority next Friday and on
day will become absolute master of
a fortune of about \$2,000,000, con-
stituting the bulk of the estate left
by his father, the late John Jacob
Astor, who was a victim of the Ti-
tanic disaster.

Secretary of Agriculture James Wil-
son, President W. C. Brown of the
New York Central Railroad and Sir
Edmund Walker, president of the
Canadian Bank of Commerce, will be
among the notable speakers at the
annual banquet of the Canadian Club
of New York at the hotel Astor
Tuesday night.

Delegates representing 70,000 South-
ern women will assemble in Washing-
ton the first of the week for the an-
nual convention of the United Daugh-
ters of the Confederacy. A leading
feature of the convention will be the
laying of the corner stone for the
Confederate monument to be erected
in the Arlington National Cemetery.

The annual convention of the
American Federation of Labor will
be called to order in Rochester Mon-
day by President Samuel Gompers.

Other events of the week will in-
clude the opening of the grand opera
season in New York, the opening of
the National Horse show in the same
city, the assembling of the raw
Saskatchewan legislature, the fifth
National Apple Show in Spokane,
the Northwestern Products Exposi-
tion in Minneapolis, and the annual
meeting of the Southern Medical
Association at Jacksonville, Fla.

IS UNDER OBLIGATION

TO MOTHER COUNTRY

Montreal, Nov. 8.—Choosing for his
topic, "Canada's Place in the Em-
pire," and stating that he was not
there as a politician, Hon. Macken-
zie King delivered an address Mon-
day afternoon before the Women's
Canadian Club. The speaker was in-
troduced by Mrs. A. W. McDougall,
president.

"I think that everybody in Canada
is as one upon the point that we have
an obligation to the Mother Coun-
try," said the speaker, "but in what
that obligation shall consist is an-
other matter. Men view these things
from different points and they may
well differ upon which is the best
method to be adopted in carrying out
our obligations. Therefore, we
should think carefully before making
any move in the matter. We are a
part of the British empire and will
remain so for all time. This is im-
portant, but another thing of equal
importance is that if we are to con-
tinue as citizens of the empire we
have no right to share its advan-
tages unless we take our share of its
obligations.

"The British empire has come into
being largely through the sense of
widening liberty and great freedom,
and to the granting of self-govern-
ment to the different parts, which
have developed steadily.

"We hear people in the empire say,
'I wish there were no Dutch; I wish
there were no French in Canada.' I
cannot see the British empire in
terms of anything of that sort, for
I believe a true citizen would
look at the matter in such a light.
The fact that in the British empire
we have French, Dutch, English and
many races living together in perfect
harmony and with a sense of security
is the highest tribute which can be
paid the freedom and advancement of
the empire.

"The flag stands for that great
freedom for all classes, irrespective
of language, religion or color, but
there is something greater than
nationality; greater than empire;
it is humanity. Men as men and
women who ignore this fundamental
development of society are not in
accord with what is making perman-
ent the development of the empire."

Hon. MacKenzie King is referring
to a second topic in the composition
of his address—What does Canada
mean of a brief review of history
before and since Confederation that
Canada was the first of the outlying
dominions and that in this way she
set an example to other dominions
and thus aided the Mother Country
to form one great empire of self-
governing countries.

The speaker also dwelt on what the
empire meant to Canada, and showed
that the fluttering of the British
flag above Canadian heads gave the
people a sense of security which al-
lowed them to think only of devel-
opment. Had it not been for the
fact that Great Britain was ever
watching over Canada and protect-
ing her from jealous grabbers this
country would have had to divert its
attention from development and
direct it towards defence.

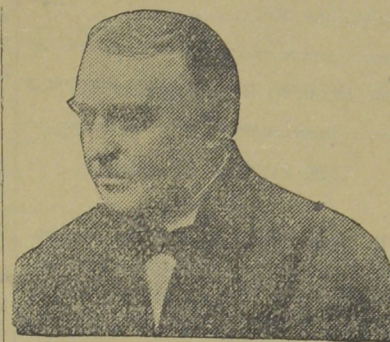
