ACADIA WINS INTER- COLLEGIATE RUGBY

(Continued from page six)

The balance of the half saw U. N.B. working hard to score. Otty took a flying kick at the ball and missed but saved a further gain. U.N.B. forwards got away on several dribbles, taking the play well into Acadia territory. Higgins was blocked when he attempted to punt and a scrum was formed at Acadia's five-yard line. Here U.N.B. held the visitors until half time was called. The Red and Black crossed Acadia's line but Referee Buckley decided that half-time had been called before they went over.

SECOND HALF

Acadia started the second half with a rush and soon put the U.N.B. on the defensive, the red and black playing in slow, listless fashion. Otty was slow in returning a punt and was tackled near the U.N.B. goal line. A scrum followed and U.N.B. was unable to relieve the pressure. From the scrum on U.N.B.'s five-yard line Eaton dived across the line for Acadia's third and last try. Leaman failed to convert kicking at a difficult angle. Score: Acadia, 13, U.N.B., 3.

For the balance of the game play was even, each team sending the ball over its opponents' line but failing to score. There was a return of kicks about mid-field. Acadia's back division got away on a combination run but a knock on spoiled the play. U. N.B. dribbled for a short gain. Brewer took a free kick but fouled the ball rolling along the ground. Fast following by the Red and Black forwards made a gain out of the mis-play. U.N.B. forced the play into Acadia's territory for the first time in the half and there was a scrum at the Acadia twenty-five. From there loose play on the part of U.N.B. let the ball go to the other end. The Red and Black failed to dribble back but relieved by punting. Higgins made some good returns. Acadia tried a cross-kick and took the U.N.B. backs by surprise and the ball went into touch at the U.N.B. twenty-five. The Red and Black by play out of touch and dribbling, took the ball to the Acadia twenty-five but the Garnet and Blue recovered the ground by punting. Starting on their own twenty-five the U.N.B. forwards got away on the longest dribble of the day, gaining fifty yards and, for a while it looked as if the play would result in a score. From a scrum at Acadia's twenty-five the ball went into touch fifteen yards from the Acadia goal-line. Excitement was intense as it was thought U.N.B. would surely score. A free kick by Acadia was returned and play remained close to Acadia's line. There was some scrapping at this juncture. From a scrum the ball went over the line and Acadia was forced to touch down for safety.

From the drop out Acadia carried the play to the U.N.B. twenty-five. There was a return of kicks and Higgins, the Acadia full-back, time after time gained by kicking the ball off the ground. Play remained at mid-field. McGibbon and one of the Acadia quarters mixed it up a little. U.N.B. were playing loosely and Acadia kicked the ball over their line but Otty saved by kicking over the dead-line.

U.N.B.'s drop out was blocked but the ball was recovered and the Red and Black gained. Maimann got away. There was a distinct improvement in U.N.B.'s playing and they rushed Acadia back over their own dead-line but the Garnet and Blue saved a score by kicking over the dead-line. From the drop out play went to mid-field and was there when time was called.

MANY FORGED CERTIFICATES ON MOVING PICTURE FILMS

(Toronto News.)

Some moving picture men will have to be more careful in future in the manner in which they regard the certificate of the Ontario Board of Censors which the law provides must be on every film shown. Unprincipled people in the business have been detaching certificates from films that have passed muster and putting them on pictures that the censors never saw. This has been detected in Ottawa, Kingston and Port Arthur, and even in Toronto, and prosecutions which followed, have resulted in the offenders being fined, but it is thought that only a small proportion of those who have been following the practice have been caught and a plan has been adopted by the censors to put a stop to it.

TRANSFER THE CERTIFICATE.

It is an easy matter to transfer the censors' certificates from one film to another, and few people would be any the wiser.

This practice has resulted in much criticism of the censors, who have now adopted a system whereby small cards containing the names, numbers or descriptions of each film shown must be placed in a prominent position at the entrance to the theatre where the police or any other interested party can see them and check off what they see on the screen inside.

Mr. G. E. Armstrong, chairman of the Board of Censors, informed The News of this new plan when he was asked what he had to say in regard to frequent complaints that there is too much "Stars and Stripes" at the moving picture shows.

CENSORS NOT TO BLAME.

Much of the criticism, he was inclined to think, was unwarranted and would not be forthcoming if the people generally were aware of what the censors were up against.

"We never pass a picture with the Stars and Stripes in it that any reasonable person could take objection to," said Mr. Armstrong. "We do realize what an educational factor the moving picture is and with the means at our command we endeavor

to take every advantage of it for our own people. Ever since the inauguration of the Board of Trade we have been cutting out the Stars and Stripes wherever the flag was not in what we considered to be the proper setting for Canadian audiences. We have done all we could to eliminate what is called 'haunting' our neighbors flag and have rejected hundreds of films on that account.

WHERE IT IS ALLOWED.

"Of course in some war scenes and on pictures of battleships and such films we have passed the picture but no one could justly complain of what we have let go through. We have destroyed many thousands of feet of film if there was any room at all to think they would be objectionable. We have had many that were not fit to show anywhere. You would be astonished if you saw how 'raw' some of them are.

MADE IN THE STATES.

"The public must bear in mind," continued Mr. Armstrong, "that ninety per cent. of the films which come here and probably seventy-five per cent. of films in all the world are made in the United States and a large proportion deal with things distinctly American."

Mr. Armstrong referred to the fact that some of the shown have been juggling around his signature on films that would have been killed if they had come before the notice of the censors and he had no doubt that he and his colleagues were held to account for that. In future, however, anyone who sees a picture which ought not to be shown will be able to verify the genuineness of the censors' certificate by referring to the cards at the entrance to the theatre.

DUTY OF THE POLICE.

It will be up to the police of every place to see that these cards tally with the pictures shown.

The Board of Censors work nine hours a day for five days every week at its headquarters up Broadway avenue and since the work commenced in July last over 10,000 reels of 1,000 feet per reel have been examined.

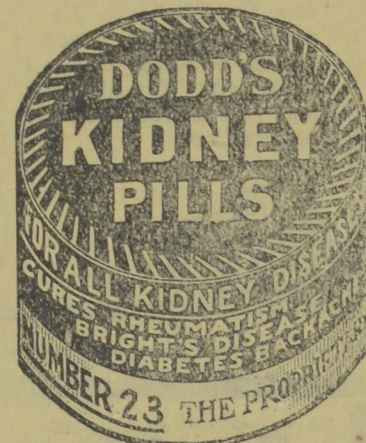

DIAMOND DUST

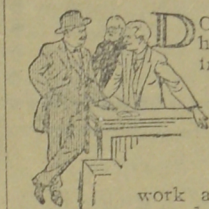
