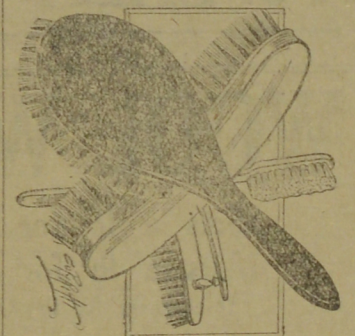

Red Sox can make good use of the
 Left-hand Pitcher—Ray Collins not
 in Condition

St. Louis, Mo., June 9—President
 McAleer is making a big effort to get
 Ed Karger, who is now with the St.
 Paul club. Karger is doing fine work
 for the St. Paul club of the American
 Association, the same club that Bos-
 ton secured him from last time.

The Red Sox feel they are in need
 of good left-hand pitchers, and can
 place little confidence in Ray Collins
 regaining his old form. The Boston
 players have a warm spot in their
 hearts for Karger, who they believe
 can help the team, and President
 McAleer is now on a mission to get
 back to Boston by the offer of both
 players and money.

CLEVELAND WON'T WAIVE.

It was Cleveland that refused to

 is anxious to have a good understudy
 for Larry Lajoie, and Davis has
 great faith in Bradley. Bradley's
 fielding has been excellent this season

 brain work for the team.

 Red Sox are bound to remain in the
 running. The players are intensely
 interested in the brilliant work of the
 Senators, who have recovered from a
 bad wallowing at Boston to win ten
 straight games.

Tris Speaker Leading Batter of American League and Zimmerman of Other

Lajoie and Ty Cobb Running Speaker Close—Don-
 lin also Batting well and but Seven Points behind
 "Zim"—Doyle and Daubert are also Climbing

While his team got a little worse
 than an even break in its first week
 in the West, Tris Speaker of the
 Red Sox personally did so well in the
 seven days that he now leads the
 American League in batting. Tris ran
 his average from .371 to .385 at
 Cleveland and Detroit, passing both
 Lajoie and Cobb who are respective-
 ly second and third, Larry having
 improved his percentage while Tyus
 fell off slightly.

Jake Stahl got back into the .300
 group last week, while Bedient drop-
 ped out, leaving Boston still with
 three men in the select company.
 Charley Hall ranking 17th with an
 average of .320. New York now has
 eight .300 hitters, Philadelphia five,
 Cleveland and Washington, four each
 Chicago three, Detroit two and St.
 Louis none.
