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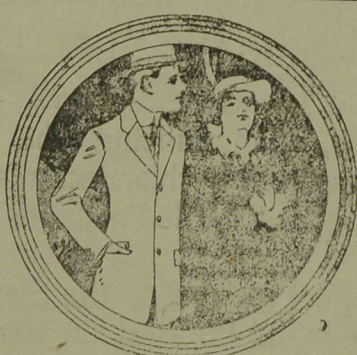

CLAIMS NO WARNING WAS GIVEN THE S. S. ANCONA

So Italian Government Protests to the U. S. Against Sinking
of the Liner in Which More Than 200 Men, Women
and Children Lost Their Lives

Washington, Nov. 15—A protest against the sinking of the Italian liner Ancona by a submarine was handed to Secretary Lansing today by the Italian ambassador Count C. Macchi di Cellere.

The protest was in a form of a denunciation cabled from Rome declaring, that without warning and without observing any formalities accompanying the right of search the submarine opened fire upon "the unarmed passenger liner," recklessly shelling the wireless, the decks and the lifeboats and killing and wounding many passengers.

The denunciation has been presented to all neutrals. The text of the note follows:

"The government of the United States is doubtless aware of the particulars reported by the press in connection with the outrage caused by the enemy on Italian shipping on November 7th.

"More than once the destruction of Italian merchantmen had taken place under circumstances which permitted no other explanation than that there was behind the procedure a ruthless purpose to use brutish force against private property of innocent persons. Non-combatants, passengers and crews, already have been the victims of these methods but never has there been such an instance of such unparalleled atrocities as in the case of the sinking of the Ancona. The unarmed liner, enroute to New York was steaming westward between the coasts of Sardinia and Tunis passengers and cargo destined for America.

"It was out of the question that the vessel could have then suspected of carrying contraband or persons in the service of any belligerents. In fact, none of the circumstances alleged in other cases in an attempt to justify actions described by their authors as a necessity of war or as a reprisal were present in the case of the Ancona.

"There are principles that no state ought to disregard and no private individual could violate with impunity. Respect for the lives of persons in no way participants in a war is among these fundamental rules of humanity and international law. This rule imposes on belligerents the strict obligation to do all in their power in every circumstance to protect the lives of such passengers.

"Without any warning whatsoever without even a blank shot, without observing any of the formalities accompanying the right of search, Ancona in the aforesaid mentioned the submarine encountered by the you?"—Louisville Courier Journal.

Ancona in the aforesaid mentioned circumstances opened fire on the unarmed passenger liner, ruthlessly shelling not only the wireless apparatus, sides and decks of the ship while she was at a stop but even the lifeboats in which the terrified passengers were seeking refuge. Many of the passengers were killed outright or wounded. Some who approached the submarine in hope of rescue were driven off with jeers. As a result of this inhuman procedure more than 200 men, women and children lost their lives.

"The Royal government regards it as a duty to denounce solemnly to all nations the circumstances described above. Their sentiments of justice and humanity will cause them without doubt to judge as it deserves the conduct of any enemy which is obviously contrary to the dictates of civilization and the recognized principles of international law.

NO LAW TO APPLY TO THE WAR PLOTS

Washington, Nov. 15—Handicapped by a lack of specific laws to protect the nation's neutrality, the department of justice has turned to one of its old standbys and is investigating war plots with a view to instituting criminal proceedings, under the Sherman anti-trust act.

The inquiry, it was learned tonight, is directed particularly at plots supposed to have been formed in connection with efforts of pro-sympathizers to cause strikes in munition plants in the United States. The department's theory is that if there is a conspiracy to interfere with the manufacture of munitions it is conspiracy in restraint of interstate and foreign commerce.

Publication of notices in foreign language newspapers calling on subjects of Austria and Germany to quit work in munitions plants is said to have been one of the many methods employed to being about strikes and disrupt the organizations of plants making war munitions for the allies.

The investigation has not progressed far enough to enable officials to tell whether indictments can be obtained or to develop who is at the head of the conspiracy, if one exists.

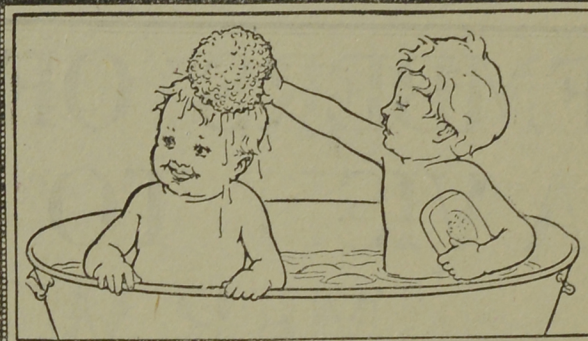

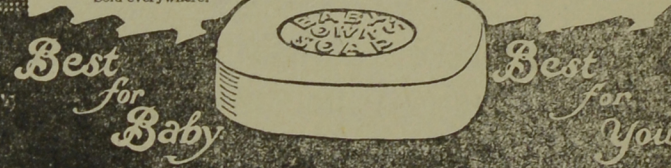

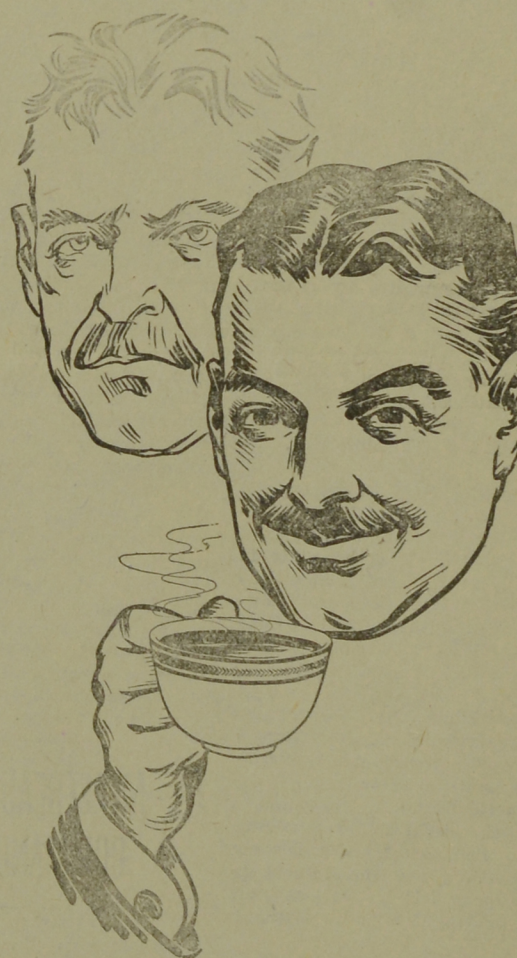
