TRANSCONTINENTAL RAILWAY GRADES

(Toronto Globe)

Conservative journals discuss the charges of increasing the grades on the National Transcontinental Railway in a manner suggesting timidity regarding the truth. To the charge that the grades are being increased there is cited the assurance of Hon. Mr. Cochrane not that the grades have been increased, but that "nothing is being done or will be done to impair the hauling power of locomotives." What does this mean? The hauling power of a locomotive cannot be impaired except by some injury to the locomotive. Its hauling power is as great on a bad grade as on a good one, but the same hauling power that would move thirty cars on a good grade might move only ten cars against an incline. Is this the interpretation of Hon. Mr. Cochrane's linguistic gymnastics?

It is supported by the citation of Mr. Leonard's assurance that the road is being finished "so as to give the greatest efficiency in the economical handling of heavy freight trains." A direct statement as to the percentage of the grades and the minimum radius of the curves would be much more satisfactory. Of course there are momentum grades that do not "impair the hauling power of locomotives," and do not even impair the results achieved by that hauling power, but these could easily be explained if a simple statement of the facts were published. Instead of this there is a switching toward remarks about temporary completion, haste, the avoiding of extravagant outlays, and the effecting of economies.

The people of Canada are building railway and have a right to know what is being done. There was full publicity under the Liberal government. If, as is currently reported, a change of policy has been adopted and economy in operation is being sacrificed to economy in construction the public should be informed of the fact. A description of railway construction is not a matter for indigestible juggling. Let the journals presenting assemblage of denying current rumors make some mathematical statements as to grades and curves.

HARVEY STATION.

Harvey Station Sept. 13—Harvesting operations have become general in this locality but are somewhat hindered by the wetness of the ground which interferes with the working of the reapers. The yield of grain will be about an average one.

A number of men and teams have been at work for the past three days removing a steam shovel from this station to the St. John River where it is to be used on the Valley Railway works. The machinery had to be all taken apart before it could be removed.

RURAL CANADA FOR THE LIBERALS

Ottawa, Sept. 17—Only seventy per cent. of the qualified electors exercised their franchise in the federal elections of last September. Out of a total of over 1,850,000 electors whose names were on the voter's lists, 1,307,528 cast their ballots. Of these 659,567 voted for Conservative candidates, 625,696 voted Liberal and 12,865 voted for Independent Labor and Socialist candidates.

The Conservatives polled 44,461 votes more than the Liberals, or only a little over 2 per cent. of the total electorate, despite a majority of 47, or 21 per cent. in the Commons.

The Conservative popular majority is due entirely to the city vote, the rural polls giving popular Liberal majority of upwards of 30,000.

These are some of the salient facts to be deduced from a study of a blue book just issued by the clerk of the crown in chancery. J. G. Loley, giving the figures by constituencies and by polling sub-divisions in last year's election.

One out of every four of the population, on the average, has the right to vote but the proportion of the voting to the non-voting population last September was only about one to six.

As compared with the elections of 1908 the Conservatives last September increased their total vote by 196,010, as compared with a Liberal increase of only 37,132.

The Socialist and Independent Labor vote fell off by 13,063 or nearly 50 per cent.

The vote in some of the larger cities indicates the comparative success or lack of success of the local organizations in "getting the vote out."

In Toronto out of a total of 77,131 names on the lists in the four ridings a little over 20,000 did not vote.

In Winnipeg the lists contained 27,451 names and only 4,328 failed to vote.

In Halifax out of 19,826 names on the list there were 6,000 missing at the polls.

In the two St. John constituencies 5,000 were missing out of a total of 21,599.

In Vancouver, the missing were nearly as many as the actual voters or 11,045 to 11,899.

Hamilton had 5,272 missing out of a total list of 20,141 and London 3,428 out of a total of 12,013.

WOODSTOCK MAY GET THE CAR SHOPS

Woodstock, N.B., Sept. 87—A. R. Gould met the town council tonight and submitted a proposition in reference to the location of divisional point, car shops and works of the St. John & Quebec Railway. Mr. Gould addressed the council at length, and had no hesitation in saying that Woodstock was the natural location. He wanted the council to aid in the effort to make the location at this point. His company would meet the council in any reasonable proportion. He felt that the government would be disposed to comply with the wishes of the company and saw no reason why it should be otherwise.

A resolution was passed that the council meet representatives of the company and arrange details of the proposition, as submitted by the company, which means that the town will buy the right of way and land required, the purchase price to be paid when the divisional point is established and the works completed.
