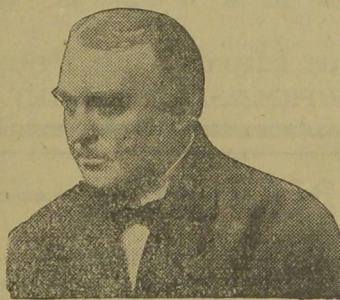

Philadelphia, Sept. 19—A Tuberculosis Tested Cattle Show said to be the first show of its kind ever held in this country, opened at Devon today and will continue until the end of the week. The purpose of exhibition is to point the way to improving dairy cattle. President Taft's cow "Pauline Wayne" is among the star attractions of the show.

### BIG SALE OF INDIAN LANDS

Lander, Sept. 19—There was opened here today under the direction of the Department of the Interior, the first of a series of public auctions for the disposal of 1,500,000 acres of Indian lands. The land comprises portions of the old Shoshone and Crow reservations in Wyoming, Utah and Montana. The sale here is to be followed by similar sales at Provo, Utah, and Billings, Mont.

## McBRIDE'S TRIBUTE TO SIR WILFRID

At the opening session of the Forestry Convention in Vancouver, Sir Richard McBride, the Conservative Premier of British Columbia, voiced the sentiment of the gathering, when he expressed regret at the absence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, to whom he referred amid great applause as "that great Canadian." After alluding to the efforts of his Government to make the gathering thoroughly representative of the whole Dominion and extending a welcome to the visiting Provincial Ministers, Premier McBride proceeded: "It is a keen disappointment to all of us that we are unable on this occasion to listen again to the inspiring words from the eloquent lips of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, but we know that that great Canadian is thoroughly interested in the progressive work being done. We know too that but for the unavoidable change in his itinerary he would have crossed the continent to be with us. He is a man whom British Columbia respects and admires, and while we are obliged to forego for the present the privilege of listening to his eloquent and instructive words we have noted with satisfaction the interest he has always displayed in the problems of national conservation and we believe that he will continue to show the same earnest and worthy desire to advocate the public interest today as he did when he occupied the chief position at the right hand of the Speaker in Canada's Parliament."

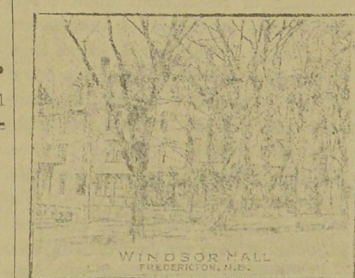
