SIR WILFRID LAURIER

AT STURGEON FALLS

Sturgeon Falls, Ont., Sept. 17.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier looked remarkably like himself, which is to say he was in good form, in good health and in good spirits, when he met the people here this afternoon, opening his Ontario campaign.

After a shower of flowers from little girls standing in arches, under which the procession passed, he arrived at the square, where the open air platform had been erected, and where temporary benches had been crowded. Here several thousand people assembled under a sky constantly threatening rain. Sir Wilfrid was greeted with a sincere welcome.

"As president of the Liberal Association," said Hon. MacKenzie King. "I welcome Sir Wilfrid Laurier and I think I can do so on behalf of all the people."

SORRY FOR IT NOW.

"You bet," roared an enthusiast. Mr. King alluded to the defeat of reciprocity.

"They are sorry for it," cited a voice. (Applause.)

"Yes, they are sorry for it as my friend remarked," asserted Mr. King, and cheered. "Sir Wilfrid is entering tomorrow upon a tour of observation and education," continued Mr. King, "which in a short time will bring about his return to power."

"In 6 months," shouted a man in the crowd. (Cheers.)

"This is the first time I have been the guest of Sturgeon Falls," began Sir Wilfrid.

"May God bless you," cried a friend below the platform.

"He has blessed me now for seventy years," replied Sir Wilfrid, "and I pray God will continue to do so."

"I come here today as a private citizen. I am a believer in British constitutions. I believe the British constitutions give us more liberty than that in the United States, but even under the British constitution people sometimes make mistakes. I believe they made one on the 21st of September last." (Cheers.)

"I ask every man who has any desire for this country's welfare to tell us now if the people did not make a great mistake in removing the last government. TWO-YEAR-OLDS

MADE NEW RECORD
ON HALIFAX TRACKBaring's Comet Covered Mile in
2.28 1-4--Gracie Mack and
Kremnut Won Other Races

Halifax, N.S., Sept. 18.—The Maritime Trotting record for two year olds went by the boards in today's exhibition of harness racing when Baring's Comet a Halifax colt by Baring finished a mile in 2.28 1/4 distancing the entire field and smashing the old mark of 2.30 made by Achilles the Great here two years ago.

Gracie Mack, a bay mare by Parkside and owned by Sydney Mines, won the 2.23 trot in three straight heats assuming the lead at the start and never being headed thereafter.

The 2.30 trot was adjourned till tomorrow afternoon after four heats had been trotted, two horses having a heat each and Kremnut two. Kremnut was the favorite in the betting and came last in the first two heats but the judges seeing that he had been held in replaced Cheverie, his driver with Jack Leonard. With Leonard up Kremnut came out and won the next two in fine style. The summaries follow:

L. C. Phair of Fredericton, sold the six-year-old stallion Bottom, 2:24 1/4, to the MacKinnon Drug Company of Charlottetown, for \$500. When he was two years old Bottom brought \$1,100.

Another horse to change hands was the gelding Frank I, 2:24 1/4. Frank I was bought by Charles Chandler of Charlottetown, from R. Moore of North Sydney.

New York is More Aggressive

New York, Sept. 11.—With the pennant race in the American and the National leagues about over and the flags conceded to the Boston and New York teams in their respective circuits, baseball fans are now beginning to talk of the world's series and the chances of their favorite clubs. According to the experts, the Giants and Red Sox are about evenly matched. The Boston team has more batting strength than the New Yorkers, while the latter aggregation is the more aggressive and has the best base runners. The Sox have the edge in fielding and have the stronger pitching staff. The Sox also have the best outfield and a stronger backstopping department. Much interest will be taken in the methods of the two managers, Jake Stahl and Johnny McGraw. The latter is one of the brainiest men that ever piloted a team, and much credit for the showing of the club this and last year must be given to him. With McGraw on the coaching lines the Giants will not make any costly mistakes. Stahl is a youngster in managerial experience, but has made good, and many look for him to put one over on McGraw.

FORMER FREDERICTONIAN

BEATEN TO DEATH

Boston, Sept. 18.—Fred B. Sears and John Leather, attendants at the insane hospital of the Bridgewater State Farm, will be given a hearing Saturday on a charge of causing the death of Charles B. Nevers, formerly of Fredericton. Both attendants are in Plymouth jail in default of \$1,500 bonds.

Nevers is said to have resisted being moved from one ward to another last Friday, and it is charged he was beaten by Sears and Leather. He had several ribs fractured and bore marks on the throat, and other bruises. He lingered several days.

Nevers was fifty-six years old, and a paper hanger. He was born in Fredericton, son of Charles and Martha Harris Nevers. He was arrested in Boston, July 27, as a vagrant and was in a pitiful condition from lack of food. It is said his mental weakness was due to a fall from a stag, ing! He had never been arrested before, so far as known.
