SUSSEX FIRM WINS.

A gold watch, donated by M. S. Brown & Co. of Halifax, for the best herd of dairy cattle shown at the Halifax exhibition, was awarded to McIntyre Brothers of Sussex, N. B., for their herd of Ayrshires. Each herd was shown before the grand stand and consisted of one bull, four cows (three years old and over), and four heifers (between the ages of one and three years). The award was made on the basis of 75 per cent. for correctness of type and 25 per cent. for show conditions.

ONTARIO FLOUR

The market for Ontario flour is quite firm at the present time, nor is there any likelihood of lower quotations. On the other hand there is a feeling that providing the weather continues favorable for the harvest in the northwest, Manitoba flour will be cheaper. In Ontario the wheat crop this year is only 13,000,000 bushels as against 19,000,000 in 1911. On the other hand it is confidently anticipated that the harvest further west will yield 180,000,000 bushels of exceptionally fine wheat as against 150,000,000 bushels of inferior quality in 1911.

CANADIAN CLUB
CONFERENCE OF 1913
TO BE AT HAMILTON

Business Conference Concluded This Morning—Mrs. E. A. Smith of St. John Elected Vice-President—Morning's Proceedings

The fourth annual conference of the Association of Canadian Clubs came to a close at one o'clock this afternoon after the program of resolutions had been discussed, reports heard and officers elected. The delegates from the west will leave for their homes this evening. This afternoon the visitors enjoyed automobile trips about the city and were entertained at an "At Home" by Mrs. A. R. Slipp at her residence.

Hamilton, Ont., was decided upon as the next place of meeting, the time of the meeting to be decided later. The presidency, which was held by Dr. W. S. Carter, goes to Ontario this year.

MORNING SESSION.

At this morning's session the first item of discussion was "Our Flag." Methods of having the national flag more generally recognized in the schools were dealt with and the question of a new Canadian flag discussed. It was decided that the subject was one upon which only a general recommendation could be made.

CANADIAN AUTHORS

Discussing a resolution introduced by the Women's Canadian Club of Vancouver on the advisability of public libraries acquiring the works of Canadian authors Mrs. E. A. Smith of St. John gave a brief description of the system employed by the St. John Public Library to afford an opportunity to children and others of reading books by Canadian authors and on Canadian subjects.

It was suggested that the resolution be altered so as to specify Canadian books rather than Canadian authors. An amendment to that effect was passed.

PANAMA CANAL

Mr. Guy M. Drummond of Montreal introduced a resolution to the effect that Canadian Clubs concern themselves in the subject of Canada's interest in the construction of the Panama Canal. It was regrettable said Mr. Drummond that the data gathered by the consular service with regard to the matter was not more closely and generally read. Canada no doubt was intensely interested in this great work and in Vancouver a movement to obtain information.

JOHN COMBES
WELL KNOWN CITIZEN
DIED ON STREET

Seizure of Heart-Failure Near C. P. R. Station Last Night Resulted Fatally
—Native of Barker's Point

John Coombes a well known resident of Fredericton died last night under circumstances which were tragic in their suddenness. Mr. Coombes had been at the C. P. R. station at the time of the departure of the outgoing train at nine o'clock. Soon afterward he was observed lying upon the ground. Bystanders hurried to his aid and it was seen that he was seriously ill. Medical assistance was summoned but death ensued shortly. Heart-failure was the cause.

The deceased was a native of Barker's Point but had resided in this city for many years. At one time he was associated with the late John Gibson in the management of coasting schooners. For some years past he had been in the employ of John Gibson & Son.

The late Mr. Coombes was sixty-eight years of age and survived by three sons and four daughters, Robert, Alfred and Leonard of this city, Mrs. James Patterson of Fredericton Junction, Mrs. C. W. Jones of this city and Miss Maude at home. The funeral will take place Friday afternoon at 2.30 p. m. the service being conducted by Rev. Canon Cowie of Christchurch Parish Church. Interment will be made at the Rural cemetery.
