SIR WILFRID'S STAND

"I affirm it with all my power that it is the duty of Canada to give to Great Britain in this war all the assistance that is in the power of Canada. My confidence in the present Government at Ottawa does not come from the soles of my boots, but at the outbreak of the war I considered it my duty to support it in its war policy. I have supported it in that policy ever since and I will support it again. The reason is that this war is a contest between German institutions and British institutions. British institutions mean freedom. German institutions mean despotism. That is why we Canadians have such a vital interest in this war."—Sir Wilfred Laurier at Sherbrooke.

REDMOND'S APPEAL

Mr. John E. Redmond, the gifted leader of the Irish Nationalist party, just back from the front, was the principal speaker at a great recruiting meeting in London on Tuesday evening. He delivered a stirring message from the men in the trenches and the effect upon his compatriots was so marked that at the close of the meeting, according to a press despatch, "men in the audience actually fought for the privilege of being the first to enroll in the London Irish Rifles."

Speaking of the splendid spirit of optimism which prevails among the men at the front, Mr. Redmond said: "There are no pessimists at the front, but there is a universal feeling of resentment among the gallant men in the trenches against that section of the press and people which is spreading the spirit of pessimism (Cries of 'Lord Northcliffe's Times and Daily Mail'). Over and over again the troops have asked 'Why not send the 'All is lost' brigade to the front?'"

"The truth is, so far as the western front is concerned, the Germans are beaten. Every day and every hour she is growing weaker while we are growing stronger. For every shell the Germans throw today we throw five."

"Anybody who would attempt to preach pessimism to the men in the British, French and Belgian lines would get a very hot reception. The men are all cheery, all are confident, well clad and fit. No armies in the history of the world are better looked after than the Allies."

Mr. Redmond, during his visit to the front, found Ulster Protestants and Irish Catholics fighting side by side and nobly upholding the honor of the Emerald Isle. Of this pleasing spectacle he said: "I found the Irish troops cheerful, confident and full of fight. I found the Ulstermen, thank God, side by side in the trenches with the Dublin (great cheering), fighting shoulder to shoulder like true comrades and brother Irishmen. I pray God that whenever a battalion of Nationalists go into action there will be a battalion of Ulstermen alongside. It will end the unhappiness and discords of Ireland, for no power on earth can make Irishmen who have risked their lives and split their blood together return to the home land as enemies."

After listening to an expression of such noble sentiments, it is not much wonder that Mr. Redmond's compatriots in the audience fought for the privilege of joining in the great struggle now being waged in the interests of freedom. Mr. Redmond, in the course of his speech, told of his interview with the Belgian king and of his message to that heroic monarch to the effect that Ireland was determined to stand by the independence of Belgium at any cost.

"Come weal or woe," declared he, "Ireland would have no peace that does not bring about the rehabilitation of Belgium."

When the Home Rule agitation was on a few years ago certain ultra-loyal newspapers both in Great Britain and this country were wont to call in question the loyalty of the Irish Nationalists but nothing of that kind is heard nowadays. When the war broke out the Germans were under the impression that be-

cause of internal strife over the Home Rule question Ireland would not give a united support to the empire. In this, as in other matters, they were sadly astray in their calculations. Irishmen of all creeds have nobly responded to the empire's call and no man outside of the British cabinet has rendered greater service in rallying men to the colors than Mr. John E. Redmond.

Before borrowing any more money for the St. John Valley Railway the provincial government ought to make some effort to round up that million dollars belonging to the province which is now in the hands of the Prudential Trust Company of Montreal. The fact that the contract with the Trust Company was tightly drawn has created the impression in some quarters that the money can be paid over only on the order of Mr. A. R. Gould, late president of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company.

It seems too bad that Canadian soldiers who have gallantly served the empire in France and Belgium and have become wounded and maimed, are compelled to return to Canada as steerage passengers. It is also regrettable that on their arrival in Quebec they are quartered in an immigration shed along with millions of vermin.

That the people of France have every confidence in the outcome of the war is shown by the rush of all classes of people to subscribe to new war loan. At the post office in Paris and at the banks on the opening day there was great crush of people anxious to subscribe. The largest subscription taken by a single individual was for five million francs, and the transaction was put through in exactly six minutes.

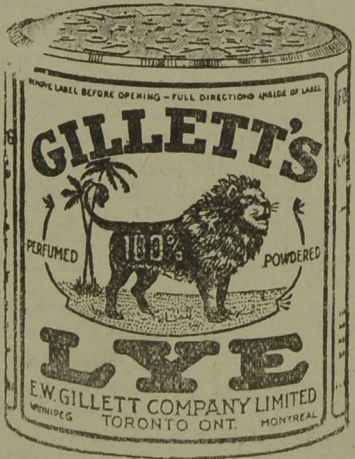

case of the extension of time, Sir Wilfrid naturally wants to know what is going to happen.

Four of the vacancies have been caused by the resignation of Conservative members. In Kings, Nova Scotia, and in Carleton, Ontario, Messrs. Foster and Garland resigned practically under compulsion, because they had been implicated in war contract irregularities. In Brandon and in Lisgar, Sir James Atkins and W. F. Sharpe resigned for purely political purposes in the hope of defeating the Liberal party in Manitoba.

No assurance has been given that these members will not, one and all, again seek re-election. In fact, it is known that both Mr. Foster and Mr. Garland are again out after the nomination and it is credibly reported that Mr. Foster, who was responsible for the Nova Scotia horse purchasing scandal, is practically sure of being nominated and has assurance that he will not be opposed by the government. Were the Liberals to consent to his re-election, or that of Mr. Garland, without a fight they would be partners to a crime against all public and parliamentary morals.

In the cases of the vacancies raised through death, namely, in Hamilton, Restigouche and Prince, P.E.I., there is, of course, no disagreement and these vacancies may be filled by acclamation whenever the government desires. It is plain, however, that in connection with the four other constituencies Sir Wilfrid Laurier would have no right to commit the party and the constituencies to the unconditional return of the former members.

The threats of an election in case Sir Wilfrid and the Liberals do not at once agree unconditionally to the proposals made by the prime minister are not taken very seriously in well informed political circles here.

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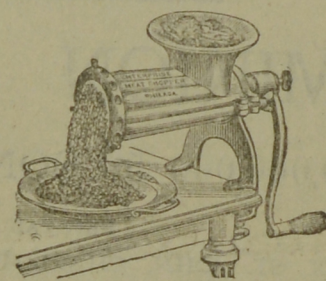
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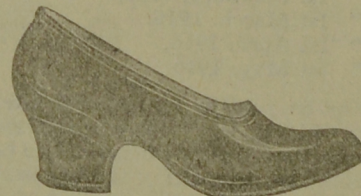
