m. of the same day.

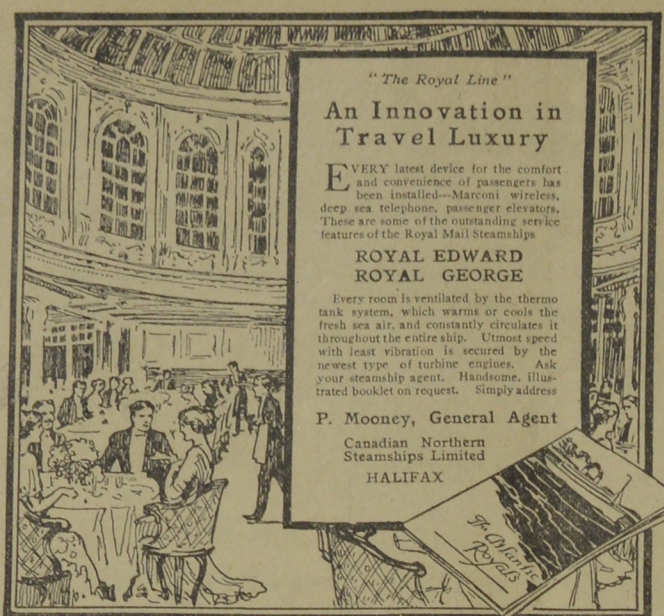
Nominations must be filed in the

NEARLY FIFTY MAJORITY
FOR PREMIER GOULIN

Montreal, May 15.—Liberalism
in Quebec was never more
virile and alive than it
is today. In spite of a bitter cam-
paign in which Nationalists and Con-
servatives were aided by the Ultra-
montanes and by ample funds and
ministerial campaigners from the
federal forces, the government of Sir
Lomer Gouin was returned to power
today with an increased majority.

AN INCREASED MAJORITY.

In the last House of seventy-four
members the opposition held sixteen
seats, while in the new House of
eighty-one they hold but seventeen.
This paltry gain of one seat is offset
by the loss of six, as Sir Lomer has
captured six out of seven of the new
seats added.

Two counties, namely, Gaspé and
Magdalen Islands, hold their elec-
tions later, but they are sure to go
with the government.

Sir Lomer is elected in the two
ridings of Port Neuf and St. John's.
In the former he was re-elected by
over 1,200 majority.

CABINET MINISTERS ELECTED.

With the exception of Hon. Mr.
Canton all of his cabinet ministers
were re-elected, many of them with
increased majorities. Mr. Canton is
reported defeated by only two votes
and may win on a recount.

A number of new and prominent
Liberals, such as Mr. E. A. Robert,
president of the Montreal Tramways
Company; Mr. Godfrey Langlois,
champion of better education meth-
ods, and many others are elected.
Mr. Robert redeemed Beauharnois,
which was previously held by the
Conservatives.

Mr. L. J. Marrechal, a prominent
Conservative lawyer of Montreal, who
was talked of as likely to be taken
into the Borden cabinet, was defeat-
ed in Chambly.

ARMAND SQUEEZED IN.

Armand Lavergne, the Nationalist
leader, was defeated in Montmorency
but managed to squeeze through in
Montmagny. Mr. Tellier, the Conser-
vative leader, barely escaped, and
Hon. Jean Prevost bit the dust in
L'Assomption, but carried Terre-
bonne by a reduced majority.

LIBERALISM TRIUMPHANT.

The day was an overwhelming
triumph for the cause of Liberalism.
It proves that the Liberal party and
Liberalism are not dead, but on the
other hand are in an exceedingly
healthy condition.

Sir Lomer Gouin went to the coun-
try on his record, which is one any
premier might be proud of. He has
spent much for education, for good
roads, in aid of agriculture and for
improvement of social conditions.
He has put the finances of the provin-
ce on a good basis, improved its
credit and in brief put its affairs on
a business basis.

POWERFUL COMBINATION.

In the present fight he opposed
single-handed the combined opposi-
tion of Nationalists and Conserva-
tives, as well as the influence of the
federal government, who poured funds
and speakers into the province in
the hope of defeating Sir Lomer
Gouin. He also met with strong op-
position from the ultramontane sec-
tion of the Catholic church, who are
opposed to his educational policy.

His return to power with an in-
creased majority means that Nation-
alism in this province is dead and
also means that Quebec is still loyal
to the cause of Liberalism and to
such leaders as Sir Lomer Gouin and
Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

CRUSHING BLOW FOR BORDEN.

The result is also a severe blow to
the Borden government, which assum-
ed a big share in the election. In all
the districts where the federal minis-
ters campaigned the Liberals have
gained materially.

In Quebec county and district Hon.
Mr. Pelletier's own riding where the
postmaster general fought the pro-
vincial battle the Liberals swept
every constituency.

In Charlevoix and Saguenay, the
riding of Hon. Rudolphe Forget, the
Liberals redeemed the seat by nearly
700.

LOYAL TO THE OLD CHIEF.

It is significant also that the two
ridings which Sir Wilfrid entered
rolled up huge Liberal majorities.
Arthur Gilbert, the Nationalist win-
ner of the memorable federal bye-
election of Drummond-Arthabaska,
went down to defeat in Arthabaska,
and in Wright, where Sir Wilfrid
spoke, the Liberal majority rose to
844.

It is evident that Quebec is still
loyal to the "Old Chief."

TORIES SORELY DISAPPOINTED.

The prime minister was correct in
his predictions, or about so, while
the opposition organizers were away
off in their calculations. They ex-
pected to divide the ten members
from the eastern townships, and
they did not get a single man. Mr.
Armand Lavergne's predictions were
also astray in the Quebec district as
his own county of Montmagny, Lévis
and Temiscouata were the only seats
left to the opposition from that part
of the province. Sir Lomer Gouin
carried St. John's by 400 of a major-
ity.

LEADER IS DUMFOUNDED.

After the fight Mr. J. M. Tellier,
the Conservative leader, said:
"I am at a loss to give a cause for
the rout. It was all over the provin-
ce and there was nothing in sight
that portended such a crushing de-
feat."

PREVENTION OF TUBERCULOSIS

an attendance of many noted medical
men, public health officials and oth-
ers. The convention will continue
in session over tomorrow.

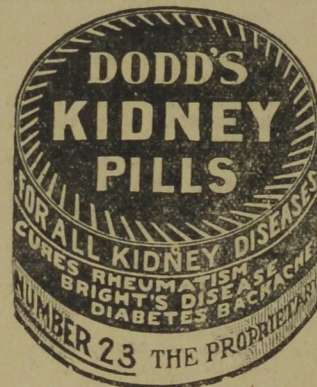
MOUNT ALLISON
