OUR NATURAL MARKET

Those who are in a fair position to make a correct estimate declare that the unfortunate defeat of reciprocity in September last has already cost the farmers and lumbermen of York at the very least the large sum of \$200,000. Taking into consideration the quantity of lumber and produce which is going forward from this county every week to the markets of the United States we believe the estimate to be a conservative one. The demand for our farm produce from across the line has been very keen this year but it is nothing to what it would have been had the tariff restrictions in natural products been swept away by the enactment of the reciprocity agreement. The Americans have been compelled during the past winter to import potatoes from across the Atlantic. The rate of duty levied by the government is the same against all countries so that potatoes brought from Scotland and Ireland pay a tax of twenty-five cents a bushel. Had reciprocity carried our potatoes would have gone into the United States free of duty and would therefore have had a decided advantage over tubers from across the water which would still have been subject to the regular tax. Under the favored nations treaty we might, had we cared to do so, have sold our entire crop of potatoes to Uncle Sam and then turned around and imported a supply for our own use at the same price which the Yankees are paying for theirs, less twenty-five cents a bushel duty.

Some figures relating to our export trade with the United States, supplied by Mr. W. W. Bryce, a local produce shipper, are found in another part of this issue and certainly make interesting reading. Mr. Bryce says that he paid out the sum of \$20,000 in six days to the farmers of this section in exchange for produce which he sent to the United States. He also says that he has so far this season shipped across the line 1,600 tons of hay, 4,500 barrels of potatoes and 12,000 barrels of turnips. He purchased them from people of all shades of politics, and we are not aware that as a result of the transaction, the parties to it are any less devoted to British institutions than they were a year ago. Certainly they have annexed a lot of American greenbacks, and we sincerely trust, for the good of the country that they will annex all they can lay their hands on in the same way.

Flag-flapping Tory politicians and newspapers are constantly singing the praises of the wonderful home market and there are one-horse farmers in some sections of this country who apparently take some stock in what they say. They evidently are unaware of the fact that the price of farm products is regulated by the law of supply and demand, and if it were not for the large quantities purchased in Fredericton for shipment abroad the prices would be a great deal lower than they are. Why a score or so of up-to-date farmers could easily raise all the produce that the Fredericton market requires. One Kingsclear farmer alone last year raised sixteen hundred barrels of potatoes or sufficient to supply every family in Fredericton for two months.

The quantity of produce shipped out of York County to the United States this season seems large, but after all what does it amount to. Why, we should be sending fifty times that quantity across the line every year and we would be doing it if we had free access to their great markets. All of the butter and cheese produced in this province last year could be consumed in the city of New York in a single day. All of the eggs laid in New Brunswick in 1911 would not last New York more than two or three days, while our total potato crop would be put out of sight in less than a fortnight in that great city. We have a fertile soil in New Brunswick and an intelligent class of farmers who if they were assured of a staple market, would have no difficulty in producing the goods. And

it is not an exaggeration to say that they can produce farm products of superior quality and at lower cost than can the farmers of the United States, and therefore would have nothing to fear from competition from that source if the duties were removed. Give the farmers of New Brunswick larger markets and cheaper money so that they would be in a position to make the great increase in their output which will then be necessary and the agricultural industry in this province will take good care of itself.

EVENING SERMON

In the evening an anniversary sermon was preached by the pastor from the text, "Feed my Lambs." He assailed vigorously our present methods of conducting public service morning and evening for the benefit of the adult or aged portion of the congregation and rarely any preaching service for the benefit of the children. It is universally admitted that the best work of the church must be done among the young. As a matter of fact conversions are becoming rare after forty or fifty years of age and the vast majority of conversions take place in early life; yet our churches insist upon cultivating as far as the preaching services are concerned the barren soils that yields practically the pastor must neglect the virgin little or no results. Consequently soils—the soils that alone will yield telling results. As far as men and women of mature life their habits of thought and action are formed and it is virtually impossible to move them from these.

"Let the morning service," said the preacher, "be devoted entirely to the young people. Let the preacher put his brightest and best thought into short, sparkling sermons and if he can't reach the head, let him at least reach the heart, and trust the Sunday School to reach the head. Let the parents cooperate with him in securing his morning congregation made up largely of the youth. Let parents discourage this disgusting lazy habit of lying in bed Sunday morning until near the noon hour."

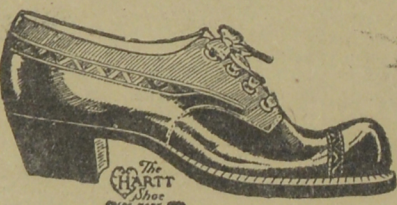
