SIR MAX AITKEN AND HOME RULE

Recent English papers report a
speech on Home Rule made by Sir
Maxwell Aitken at a meeting of the
Old Trafford Conservative Associa-
tion. He said in part:

The Insurance Bill was getting to
be an old story, and so the govern-
ment in order that they might have
diversity, had introduced the govern-
ment for Ireland Bill. Previous to
the introduction of the Home Rule
Bill he was an opponent of it—a Col-
onial opponent of Home Rule. They
were told there were no Colonial op-
ponents. That was false; for there
were as many Colonial opponents as
supporters, and even if those support-
ers were aware of the conditions pre-
vailing they would soon be opponents
(Applause.)

He had been told that the system
of government for Ireland was simi-
lar to the Colonial system. The con-
ditions were, however, entirely differ-
ent. The Colonies when they sought
governments had no representation at
Westminster at all. Ireland was in a
different position altogether. She had
representation at Westminster, and a
very generous representation. She
had as large a measure of Home
Rule as England enjoyed. (Hear,
hear.) They all knew what the Na-
tionalists wanted. They wanted the
control of the finances. (Hear, hear.)

It was a very happy outlook for
these Nationalist gentlemen, who
were waiting eagerly to get their
itching fingers on the spending of
that money. (Applause.) He be-
lieved that was the ambition and the
goal of the Nationalist party, and
that was why they had forced this
measure on a weak Radical adminis-
tration. Since the discussion on
Home Rule, in which the Colonial
allegory had been held and used as
an illustration, they had seen the Bill
and they saw that they had to pay
two millions per annum to Ireland.
Did it not bring joy to their hearts
to know that they were going to con-
tribute to the upkeep of every man,
woman and child in Ireland to the
tune of 10s. and that they were go-
ing to be asked to hand over to the
Irish people, so soon as that country
was ready, to receive and deal with
it, the Insurance Act? They know
what that meant. It meant that we
were still going to bear the burden of
the Act, and Ireland was going to
take over the administration, and
forthwith repeal it.

They could look forward to the
time when Ireland would expect to
reward their faithful friends in Amer-
ica who had helped them in their agi-
tation. Ireland would perhaps re-
ward America by a trade agreement,
or possibly even a trade agreement
with Germany. And to further
strengthen Ireland's position she had
got the right to impose taxes on all
articles on which the British Parlia-
ment imposed taxes, and in addition
Ireland had got the power to in-
crease them to the extent of ten
per cent. That was sufficient to make
a nice preference to the United States
of America for instance. (Hear,
hear.) The alternative policy of the
Unionist party was put into effect be-
fore their last administration fell—
the Land Purchase Act; and all broad
minded men would admit the great
good that Act did. (Applause.)
