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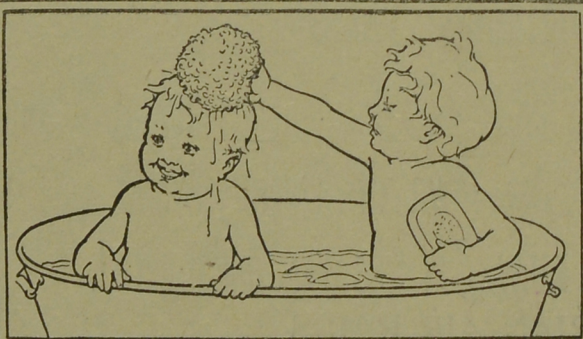

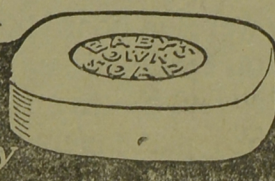

FRANCE HORRIFIED AT THE SINKING OF THE ANCONA

The European Public Has Ceased to Expect Any Act
of Virility From President
Wilson.

Paris, Nov. 25.—The sinking of the Ancona, has horrified every one here. It is conceded to surpass in bestial savagery the Lusitania crime and even the Falaba atrocity. The Germans who sank the latter vessel laughed at their helpless victims struggling in the sea. The crew of the submarine that torpedoed the Ancona put even that infamy into the shade. They shot down in the lifeboats helpless women and children who had succeeded in escaping from the sinking vessel.

Next to horror the prevailing sentiment is curiosity to know what the United States will do if any Americans were killed. The European public has ceased to expect any act of virility from Mr. Wilson, but it is opined that the American people will be less nonchalant.

It is fairly well established that the submarine which sank the Ancona was a German vessel, though flying the Austrian flag. It is believed that America cannot possibly overlook this breach of Germany's promise to cease her piratical warfare on passenger vessels. It is also believed the outrage may cause Italy to make a formal declaration of war on Germany.

Commenting in the Figaro on the sinking of the Ancona, Mr. Joseph Reinach, widely known as a political writer, declares that the victims of the Ancona tragedy died as a result of "the unpunished Lusitania murder." President Wilson could not say, adds the writer, that he was not warned that the tragedy would be repeated "if it were not avenged."

"Is America going to swallow this fresh insult," he continues, "and be satisfied first with explanations and then with deceitful promises, or is he going to demand from Austria expressions of regret, indemnities and the punishment of the officers who committed the crime and, taking up at the same time the Lusitania question, insist on receiving the same satisfaction from Germany? We hope so, not in our own interests, for America's neutrality, amply suffices, but in the interest of the great republic, for her independence is at stake—her independence already injured and daily threatened with increasing boldness, since for a whole year she has tolerated from Germany what she would not have tolerated for an hour from a nation less rich and powerful."

Washington, D. C., Nov. 14.—Only one cable report was received at the State Department today regarding the torpedoing of the Italian liner steamship Ancona. The text of that report, which was from Mr. Thomas Nelson Page, American Am-

bassador at Rome, was so confused that officials were unable to satisfy themselves as to its exact meaning. It read:—

"Officially reported still unaccounted for Mrs. Cecile Creil. Thought an American woman, reported saved believed to be her. Patattivo family and Pasquale Saurigo, names given my 428 and 427, also Mrs. Carmela Torrisi, whose husband (is) Giuseppe reported saved."

The punctuation of this message is added here, but even with this assistance it is not felt that the report is very clear. As nearly as can be told it states that one American woman still remains officially unaccounted for, while the others named are reported saved.

Absolutely no information was received regarding the circumstances of the attack on the Ancona and the press despatches do not satisfactorily clear up the many questions which have been raised. Consequently it is still impossible to obtain any official verdict here regarding the attack or the action which the United States will take in the case.

State Department officials say that they are doing everything possible to obtain information and are considerably exercised over the confusion and delay which has occurred. Instructions have been sent to have a consular official at a nearby post proceed to Trieste to obtain the depositions of survivors and first hand evidence of a reliable character. But until such information is received here absolutely no progress in the case can be made.

PASSENGERS PUSHED IN SEA

Naples, Nov. 14.—The owners of the Italian line steamship Ancona, sunk in the Mediterranean by a submarine have received the report of the Ancona's captain, in which he makes the positive charge that the submarine gave no warning to the ship or afforded those on board of her a chance to escape.

The first shot, the captain's report declares, was fired when the submarine was three miles distant. The captain immediately stopped the ship, he says, but this did not appear to satisfy the commander of the submarine, which continued to shell the vessel.

The captain without delay ordered everybody to take the boats, upon which, he declares, the submarine turned all her guns, killing and wounding many persons both in the boats and on the deck of the steamship. Some of the passengers who were thrown into the water and sought to save themselves by clutching the sides of the submarine were pushed away with jeers and insults.

Smart Fur Collars Outline The Chin
