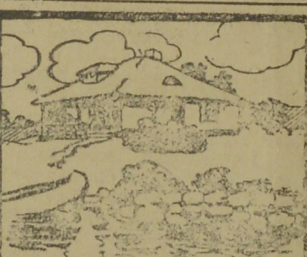

The season of the New Brunswick and Maine Baseball League ending Saturday with Fredericton breaking even with the St. John Marathons at St. John. The Pets lost the game 11 to 10 and won the second 6 to 1. Neither game was extra good baseball but as the wind up of a season which sees Fredericton champions of the N. B. & Maine League were of particular note.

RECEPTION FOR TEAM

Saturday night the local fans turned out in force to welcome the returning ball-players. On account of nursing connection at Fredericton Junction the players and the fans who had gone to St. John did not reach Fredericton until eleven o'clock. There was a big crowd at the C.P.R. station to meet the team and the 71st York Regt. band played from the depot to the Queen Hotel in front of which a bon-fire blazed. In response to repeated calls, Capt. Bob Ganley appeared at a window and made a brief speech. He thanked the crowd for the hearty reception tendered the members of the club and with characteristic modesty stated that Fredericton had won the championship because the Club was composed of good baseball players who had worked well together.

POST SEASON GAMES

Fredericton was to play the Marathons in St. John today but on account of the threatening weather the game was called off. According to arrangement the team is to go to St. Stephen to play the Lynn team of the New England League on Tuesday and Wednesday. On Thursday Lynn may play here.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The management of the Fredericton Baseball Club is preparing a financial statement which will be published and a copy of which, will be forwarded to each subscriber. The club has a deficit of some hundreds of dollars and the exact amount will be known within a few days. Great credit is due to local men who organized the club and stood behind it from the beginning of the season until the championship was won.

SATURDAY'S GAMES

The St. John Telegraph's account of Saturday's games is as follows:— "Twenty-two hundred fans witnessed a baseball burlesque in the closing games of the N. B. & Maine League at the Marathon grounds on Saturday afternoon. The Greeks were credited with 12 runs and the "Caps" 11 in the first inning, while the visitors made 6 to the locals' 1 in the second. Although only five hits were made off Winkler in seven and one-third innings his team mates supported him so disastrously that nine Fredericton men scored. Lynch, who pitched the first three and one third innings for Fredericton allowed eight hits and his fielding was unusually deliberate.

"The visitors fielding in the first game was peculiar and it looked as if the team had suddenly been stricken with stiffening of the joints. The Greeks' playing was startling. O'Brien and Pinkerton falling down at times.

GAME IN DETAIL.

Fredericton got three runs in the third on one lone single, a base on balls and a choice collection of errors by Winkler, Winter and O'Brien.

An error by O'Brien and a three-base hit by Harrington gave the "Caps" another run in the fourth and errors by Winkler and Dutton gave them another in the seventh without the semblance of a hit.

"Fredericton made their last score in the eighth when six runs came in while the crowd alternately groaned and laughed. A double by Hoyt, two passes and two errors gave the visitors four runs and Winkler was sent

to the bench with one out. Winter, who took up the task was touched for a two-base hit by L. Conley after B. Conley had been thrown out by Pinkerton, and two more men galloped over the plate. Pinkerton threw out Hoyt who had batted a second time. Winter however pitched mighty well and showed he can play when he gets down to business.

The Marathons made five runs in the third on a double by O'Donnell and singles by Riley, Winkler, O'Brien, and Fraser. The Greeks made four more in the fourth on a double by McGovern, a sacrifice by Winkler and singles by O'Brien, Winter and Fraser.

"The locals got another in the sixth, when Winkler singled and scored on O'Brien's two-base hit and the winning runs in the ninth when errors allowed two men to bases and Riley drove out the necessary hit.

SECOND GAME

The second game was one-sided. The Greeks got one safe hit, a double by Dutton in the second and it resulted in a score when Ramsey fell down on a grounder by Riley. The "Caps" got Barry for four two-base hits and five singles in the five innings before train time and they piled up six runs."
