SEVERES CONNECTION
AT MARYSVILLE

Completed Duties as Superintendent of Saw-Mill Saturday Night—Will Devote Attention to Mining at Grand Lake

CHANGES AT COTTON-MILL
ARE EXPECTED SHORTLY

Mr. Alex. G. Robinson, for some years superintendent of the saw-mill at Marysville and of the handling of lumber on the Nashwaak River, completed his duties in that connection on Saturday night and it is understood will devote his attention in the future to the development of coal-mining property in the Grand Lake region in which he is interested.

Mr. Robinson is a nephew by marriage of Alex. Gibson, Sr., and for years was in charge of the milling operations of the Alex. Gibson Manufacturing Company at Marysville. He afterwards was in the employ of the Edward Partington Company, which recently took over the Gibson Company's properties. Mr. Robinson is the second prominent official who has severed his connection with the lumbering enterprises of the Nashwaak since the Partington Company assumed control. Mr. Alfred Rowley, who was secretary-treasurer under the Gibson Company, having resigned some time ago.

CHANGES AT COTTON MILL.

AIR-SHIP SEEN
NEAR LAKE GEORGE
ACCORDING TO REPORT

Mysterious Craft has Appeared in That Vicinity at Various Times During Summer—Inhabitants say Its no Illusion

NUMEROUS CONJECTURES
CONCERNING AIR-CRAFT

Reports from Magaguadavic and Lake George are to the effect that a mysterious air-ship has been seen in the vicinity of those places at various times during the past summer but that nothing is known concerning it, its destination or starting point. Inhabitants of the localities mentioned who say they have seen the air ship are positive that there was no illusion concerning the matter the flying-machine appearing at various times and to all appearances being on long flights. The descriptions given of the aerial craft would indicate that it was of the biplane type and of large size.

There are numerous conjectures concerning the mysterious air-ship. Some think that it has started from some point in the New England States, on long flights which have terminated near the places named. Others think that Americans who have camps in the vicinity of Magaguadavic own the machine and have been making trial flights with it.

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


