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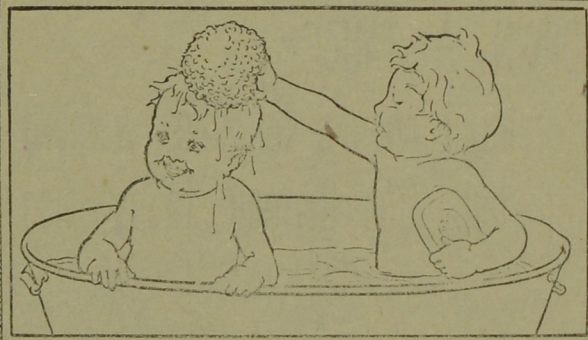

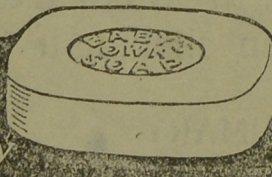

SAW THE IMPHANT SOUTH AFRICAN TROOPS RETURN

Montreal, Nov. 2—Two vessels are in port from South Africa the Benin and Kudana. The officers of the Benin saw the triumphant return of General Botha and his army from Southwest Africa and say they never saw such wholesale rejoicing.

"The finishing touch to the whole merry occasion," said the Benin's second engineer, "was that Botha and his army returned in German vessels which the British navy had captured in the Kamerun. There were about eleven of these vessels and all of them were liners."

"In Port Elizabeth where we were moored, interest centred towards the end of our stay, in the coming elections. It is a mistake to think the Germans have any influence in Cape Colony for they are absolutely downed and know it. Not a word do you hear from any of them. Dutch nationalism is the only resplendent factor, and it is pro-Dutch, not pro-German or anything like it."

One of the vessels which took home Botha's victorious army was the Professor Werman, a palatial passenger liner built in Germany. The story of her capture is told by third officer Flowerdon on the Kaduna, who saw her towed into Cape Town. "She mistook your old friend, the Carnarvon for a German cruiser," he said, "and steamed innocently up to meet her. Whether the Carnarvon fooled her into that impression or not I can't say but she never had a chance. The following night, however, he doused her lights and tried to escape. The Carnarvon picked her up immediately. An interesting conversation followed:—

"You follow me to Sierra Leon."

said the Carnarvon's commander, "or to the bottom. Take your choice."

"The Professor Werman went to Sierra Leon where her general cargo valued at \$5,000,000 was dumped on the beach and auctioned off."

The same officer saw the riots in Durban when news of the Lusitania outrage arrived.

"Five apprentices on the British sailing ship Isle of Man, led the rioters," he said, "In fact they started the whole shooting match, borrowing three automobiles with extra supplies of benzine and coal oil and leading three parties. Biscuit factories, sheds, warehouses, shops, and aloons belonging to Germans were destroyed that night."

"Finally the three parties met outside the German club and gutted it of its fine furniture. A grand piano was taken into the street and 'The Watch on the Rhine' was played on it with a hammer. One woman passed me with quite a load of furniture and said, 'I never knew I was such a good furniture mover before.' It which everybody laughed. It was a real riot that night. Its effects were thorough."

The well known Montreal vessel Mount Temple arrived here this morning after spending a year in the Ross channel trade, carrying troops. She carried the forty-eighth Toronto Battalion to St. Nazaire shortly before the Neuve Chapelle light.

"The Germans," said an officer, "made a dead set to get the Canadian troops, but although they were waiting for us, they could do nothing. Our patrols were on the job."

The Statesman is also here today, on her fourth trip, and confirms the report of bad weather in the Atlantic.

HOW HUN SUBS ARE GRABBED

Louisburg Oct. 28—Captain Inch, formerly commander of the liner Ueturna, which was burnt at sea over two years ago, is now at Louisburg in command of the C.N.R. steamer Principe. This ship is on her way from the Old Country to the States for a cargo of horses, it is said.

Captain Inch has some interesting things to tell about the winding up of the German undersea menace. A great deal of publicity was given some months ago regarding the new and large type of Hun submarines which has been despatched from the naval bases to wreak destruction on all the sundry ships that came within torpedo distance. Capt. Inch says that these have proved a magnificent failure. These new undersea craft are so bulky that they leave an enormous water-wake after them and this enables the patrol boats to get them without much trouble. The scout ships got the submarine that sank the Hesperian twenty-four hours after the disaster, and the one that was sent to replace the one that destroyed the Hesperian lasted only four hours after reaching the British coastal waters, which is now being policed to the front by patrol boats.

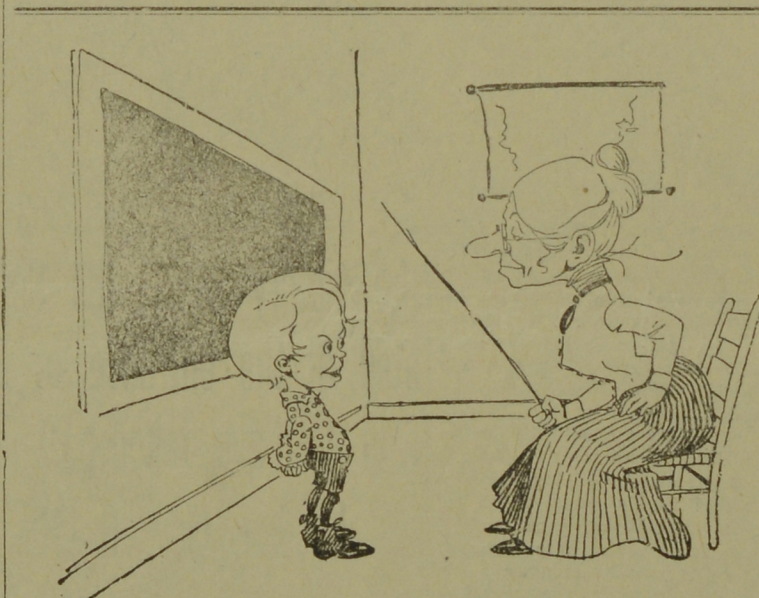
THOSE FALLING LEAVES
