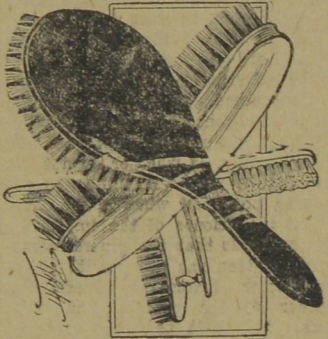

THE OPPOSITION PLATFORM

The new administration will inaugurate a POLICY FOR
 THE RELIEF AND BETTERMENT OF AGRICULTURE.

By introducing legislation with a view to assisting provin-
 cial farmers, who lack the necessary capital to bring their lands
 up to a satisfactory productiveness, such assistance to be by
 financial aid under proper safeguards, by long term loans upon
 the provincial credit, at a low rate of interest and easy terms of
 repayment, thereby increasing development and production and
 encouraging our farmers and their sons to remain in the pro-
 vince—

By associating a practical farmer with the administration
 of the Department of Agriculture—

By abolishing unnecessary offices in the Department of
 Agriculture so that the appropriations therefor may serve their
 purpose and no longer be largely wasted in the salaries and
 travelling expenses of useless officials—

By aiding the establishment of cheap rural telephone ser-
 vices throughout the province—

We will also remove the administration of the roads abso-
 lutely from politics, and place the expenditure of the road monies

We will promote and encourage the colonization and settle-

We will not permit any legislation or departmental regu-
 lation to interfere with the customary privileges of the fishermen
 respecting the oysters, clam and quahaug beds along our shores
 or support the creation of any monopoly in such oyster, clam
 or quahaug fisheries to the injury of the small fishermen—

We will introduce legislation to set aside certain streams,
 lakes and rivers, wherein the residents of this province, upon
 the payment of a nominal license fee and subject to proper regu-
 lations, may have the right to fish—

We will give careful attention to the development of the
 various water powers of the province under government control
 with a view to transmitting and supplying electricity at actual
 cost to manufacturers, farmers and others who might with ad-
 vantage, use this modern source of heat and power—

We will no longer permit the granting of these valuable
 water powers and franchises to companies for the purpose of
 private speculation to be held for gain against bonafide man-
 ufacturing interests seeking cheap power—

A WARNING

If the provisions of the Elec-
 tion Act are enforced, nothing
 can save the government from
 defeat. Let Liberals every-
 where be on their guard and
 ready to secure evidence nec-
 essary to convict anyone who
 attempts by bribery to defeat
 the will of an aroused elector-

Advices from various points
 in the province indicate that
 the government forces are mak-
 ing the most shameless use of

DUTY ON CEMENT

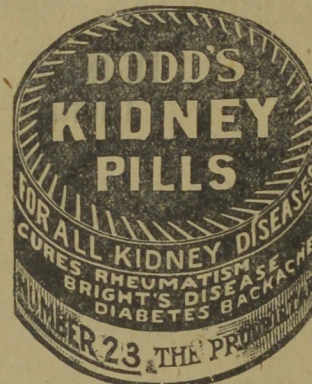
HAS BEEN REDUCED

The duty upon cement has been cut
 in two as a temporary measure, on
 the ground, as stated by the Minis-
 ter of Finance, that "a serious
 shortage of cement exists in various
 sections of the Dominion, due both to
 an unprecedented demand for the com-
 modity and to the difficulty experi-
 enced by Eastern producers in
 promptly making shipments by rail
 and water." The reduction will
 amount to 26 cents per barrel under
 the general tariff, 23 under the in-
 termediate, and 17 under the prefer-
 ential.

The immediate effect will be to pre-
 vent the importation of cement in
 considerable quantities all along the
 boundary from Winnipeg to the Roch-
 esters, where the shortage is most felt.
 In the East there will be very little
 importation for the cement compa-
 nies of Ontario and Quebec have large
 stocks on hand, and will no doubt be
 forced to reduce prices to prevent im-
 portation and hold the Eastern mar-
 ket. They complain bitterly that
 they have been made the scapegoats
 for the railways, which have been
 unable to carry their product to the
 west in sufficient volume to meet the
 demand. The consumption of cement
 in Canada in 1911 was 5,600,000
 barrels, and the importation 662,000
 barrels, or about 12 per cent.

The Government has reduced the
 duty on cement as an emergency mea-
 sure, and not because it believes the
 tariff is too high under normal con-
 ditions. The people who use cement
 will be very glad to learn of the de-
 cision. It will be shown by the great
 freedom of importation and the in-
 evitable reduction in price that the
 tariff is a tax, and that the consum-
 er pays the duty. The hope of Mr.
 Borden and his colleagues is that
 the West will be grateful for the re-
 duction and regard it as the advance
 courier of greater favors to come.
 The Hon. Robert Rogers will make
 much of the incident during the ap-
 proaching Saskatchewan elections,
 but it is not at all likely that he
 will be able to fool the electors
 there. They have been demanding the
 widest possible liberty to sell their
 grain in the markets of the United
 States. The adoption of the recipi-
 city agreement would have resulted
 in the removal of the United States
 duties that prevent free trade in
 wheat, barley, oats, flax, cattle and
 practically all other farm products.
 Mr. Rogers and his friends prevented
 the West from obtaining that great
 boon. The Western farmer may build
 a house or a barn with a cement
 foundation once, or at most twice,
 in a lifetime, but he sells wheat
 every year. He will now throw his
 hat in the air when Mr. Rogers tells
 him that instead of a duty free
 market for his products he is to get
 a reduction of 26 cents a barrel on
 cement for four and a half months.

The reduction of the cement duties
 is a good thing in itself, but as a
 stepping-stone to office in Saskatche-
 wan it will be a hopeless failure. It
 will take a lot more than twenty-
 six cents a barrel on cement to pur-
 chase the forgiveness of the Western
 farmer for the great wrong done to
 him in the defeat of reciprocity.
