Lajoie and McDonald Head Lists

"Larry" Climbed to Top of American League with Three Hits Saturday--Tris Speaker Running him Close Second--Mike Donlin's Good Stick Work

By virtue of his three hits in last Saturday's game, "Larry" Lajoie of Cleveland, crowded Tris Speaker of the Red Sox, out of top place in the American League batting list, the Boston wonder having the Nap slugger beaten by .386 to .381 before the closing games of the week were played. Lajoie finished the week with an average of .391, while Tris is close up with .388.

Six new names appear in the league's .300 list now, and a seventh, Bedient of Boston, re-appears after a brief absence. Three of the new-comers are Washington players, Moeller, Milan and Gandil having batted their way into the heavy hitting class. Larry Gardner of the Red Sox, also entered the .300 group, as did "Rube" Oldring of the Athletics, and O'Neill, the Cleveland catcher. Incidentally, seven Senators are now batting for better than .300.

Joe Jackson of Cleveland, is third on the list, Artie Griggs, another Nap, is fourth, and then comes Ty Cobb of Detroit, with an average of .358.

Seven players dropped off the .300 list last week, among them being Manager Jake Stahl and Charley Hall of the Red Sox. Most conspicuous among the other five is "Stuffy" McInnis of the Athletics. The Gloucester boy has gradually but steadily fallen off in his batting in the last three weeks, and is now hitting for .291. The others who have disappeared from the .300 ranks are Martin, Gardner and Warhop of New York, and Lange of Chicago.

There are now 27 hitters in the National League who have a mark of .300 or over in batting.

Mike Donlin of the Pirates, has passed Zimmerman of the Cubs, having increased his figures to .427. Zimmerman was suspended for several days, and did not have a chance to improve over .415. C. McDonald of the Cincinnati team, who has been doing a lot of fine pinch hitting, has made 12 hits in 25 times at bat and is at the top of the list with .480. Meyers of New York, got 10 hits last week and has advanced to .376, while Doyle, his team-mate, is only three points below him. The good all-round hitting of the Pirates continues, Wagner having come up 28 points during the week to touch the even .300 mark.

GANDIL MAKING GOOD AT FIRST WITH SENATORS

Ex-Montreal Player Chosen by Americans as Coming First Sackman of American League

Gandil, the first baseman Clarke Griffith bought for Washington from Montreal a month ago for a price said to have been \$10,000, is having an experience like that of Moran. The Chicago White Sox have been fishing for a first class first baseman ever since Jiggs Donohue hit the toboggan, but have had only fisherman's luck to show for their pains and money. Among those to whom they gave a thorough trial was this same Gandil. He certainly did not look highly impressive when with the Sox and all that could be said for him was that he seemed about as good as any of a bad lot. So hard pressed did the Sox become for a man at the first corner that they switched Lee Tannehill, who is a third baseman and shortstop by trade, over there, and fired the whole bunch of recruit aspirants for the berth. Gandil went with the others, and was shipped to Montreal. Now he is back in the American League again and the newspaper men with the Washington team are unanimous in saying that he exactly fills the bill at first for the Nationals, who have not had a top-notch man on that bag for ten years.

BROOKLYN PHENOM AT YOUNGSTOWN

A Brooklyn ball player who is delivering the goods in large quantities is Walter Swenson, who is pitching for Youngstown in the Central League under the name of Stevens. His latest feat was to shut out Tyre Haute last Thursday, allowing five hits. Nine men reached first, but not one got to second until the ninth inning, when an error was made behind him. Swenson has won four out of his last five games and is largely responsible for Youngstown's batting for second place in the twelve club circuit. He is not yet 21 years of age and has a bright future. Last year he pitched for semi-professional teams and attracted attention. He is also known as a star basketball player.

RYAN QUILTS FLYNN

Las Vegas, N.M., June 17--Tommy Ryan, retired middleweight champion, today resigned as trainer in charge of the camp of Jim Flynn, who is to meet Jack Johnson here for the heavyweight championship of the world on July 4. There has not been harmony between Flynn and Ryan since the arrival of the trainer and a disagreement arose between Ryan and Curley. The cause of the disagreement is not known.
