## RIVER COMMISSION.

The St. John River Commission will meet again in Van Buren, Me., on Friday, June 21, to continue the taking of evidence. Several witnesses are to be heard and it is probable that the sessions will continue into next week. The New Brunswick commissioners, M. G. Teed and John Keeffe, will leave St. John on Thursday evening. The report of the engineers who have been at work along the river has not yet been completed.

## THE STRATHCONA FUND

ANOTHER ATTEMPT  
AT "HOLD-UP" IN  
CITY REPORTED

Attempt said to have been made on Regent St. late Saturday Night--Undesirable Population is Increasing

"HAND-OUT" ARTISTS  
ARE ALSO OPERATING

It is reported that an attempt was made on Saturday night last to hold up Mr. Thos. O'Leary of New Maryland, while on his way to his home. The attempt was made on Regent street but was unsuccessful, the assailants being frightened off. This attempt following almost immediately after that upon Harry Pond on Queen street the night before, shows that a large number of undesirable characters are in the city and vicinity. The police are on the watch for the men supposed to have been concerned in Friday night's attack, but say that since the occurrence there has been no trace of them about the city.

The influx of undesirables is said to be due to the railroad construction work now under way on the Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway and which is expected to begin on the St. John & Quebec Railway. Work of this kind always results in an increase in the floating population to which the men referred to belong. It is also reported that residents of the city are being annoyed more than usual by applications for "hand outs" made by those who claim that they are destitute and unable to procure food.

"GAY MUSICIAN"  
SCORED BIG SUCCESS

Bright Musical Comedy Drew Big Audience at Opera House Last Night

"The Gay Musician" which was presented to a capacity house last night proved to be well up to the standard of musical shows which have been seen here in recent years but the lack of stage room prevented the full production from being put on. Bright music, clever comedy and pretty dances made the opera most attractive and the usual number of song hits were made. The principals were excellent and received good support from a well-trained chorus. In the title role of Eugene Dubois the gay musician, Harold J. Rehill was well received. He has a pleasing voice and a good stage appearance. His song Lovelight, which runs all through the play, was very appealing a haunting melody which was well rendered, as were his duets with Miss Gertrude Taylor and also with Miss Kendall.

Miss Gertrude Taylor, as Maud Granville, and Miss Lottie Kendall as Marie Dubois also had plenty of opportunity to display their ability. Miss Taylor was encored several times in her captivating little song A Cup of Tea, while Miss Kendall was heard to good advantage in A Saucy Sparrow and other solos.

Harry Short as Samuel Lyons, theatrical manager, was very funny and repeated the success he attained here when he was with the Madame Sherry Company. His song Run, Tum Tiddle had the audience in roars of laughter and he was forced to respond to six encores. On the last encore he and the chorus ran through the aisles of the house singing the song. He was also especially good in the second act, when with Miss Taylor, Miss Kingle and Hayden Clifford, he played several burlesque scenes, including a baseball game, a game of poker and a tragedy. These burlesques were very cleverly executed and were loudly applauded particularly the ball game in which a number of local hits were worked in.

Miss Isabelle Miller as Matilda Yager, Dubois' mother-in-law was very funny in character work, and assisted greatly with the comedy. Her Dutch dialect was very good. She had several good scenes with Roy Torrey as Captain Fish, and was well played. Their song "I Want to be Your Blue Eyed Baby Boy," in the last act was particularly good and they received several hearty encores. The captain also received an ovation when he sang "That's How I Get Treated," in the first act.

Miss Fritzie Kingle in the role of Hilda Branson, the soubrette, was very captivating, and sang and danced her way in the hearts of the audience. She is an exceptionally graceful dancer and possesses a clear musical voice which was heard to good effect throughout the performance. Hayden Clifford as Hon. Clarence Beresford and W. F. Ryan as A. Corker also assisted in the fun making. They had minor roles but played them well.

REMOVE TO TEXAS

Popular Marysville Physician to Locate in Southwestern States--Brother-in-law at Present Residing there

SECRETARY OF PROVINCIAL  
BOARD OF HEALTH SOME YEARS

Dr. E. B. Fisher who has practised for some years at Marysville has decided to remove from that town and will locate in the State of Texas in the near future. Dr. Fisher has not yet completed the details of his removal but expects to leave for that part of the United States during the latter part of the summer probably in August. His family will follow him to their new home.

Mr. Harry L. Fowler formerly of this city and brother-in-law of Dr. Fisher has been located in Texas for a number of years and Dr. Fisher will probably take up his residence near him opportunities being good in that section of the State.

Dr. Fisher took up practice of medicine in Marysville upwards of fifteen years ago and has a large number of friends in this part of the province who will regret his removal. He has occupied the office of secretary of the Provincial Board of Health for about ten years and in that capacity proved a capable and energetic official whose place will be hard to fill.

FOR GRANT FOR OLD

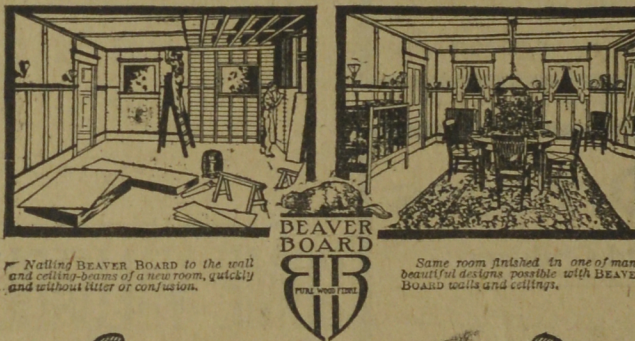
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
