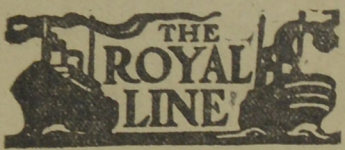

CITY ELECTION

The Election for one Alderman for
Queen's Ward in the City of Frederic-
ton for the current year will be
held on Monday the 27th de- of
May inst. At the following places,
Division No. 1—For all voters resid-
ing or owning property above
the centre line of Carleton Street pro-
longed, at or near the City Hall in
the said City.

Division No. 2—For all voters re-
siding or owning property in the re-
mainder of the said City, not in-
cluded in Division No. 1, at or near
the County Court House in the said
City.

Polls will be opened at the above
named places at nine o'clock, a. m.,
of the said day of Election, and will
close of the hour of four o'clock, p.
m. of the same day.

Nominations must be filed in 'the
office of the City Clerk, City Hall, at
or before four o'clock on Monday, the
20th day of May instant, and must be
signed by at least two qualified
Electors, and the signatures attested
to under oath.

the Candidate have been paid within
the time required by law must be at-
tached to each Nomination Paper.

OLD BURYING GROUND

Editor of The Mail—

I was very much surprised on
Thursday in common with many oth-
er readers of your popular and wide-
ly circulated journal to read of the
proposal of the City Council to erect
a Fire Station in the Old Protestant
Cemetery. I was also surprised that
only one alderman, Ald. Burchill had
the good taste to oppose the motion.
It is the custom with all civilized
communities to have a proper regard
for the last resting place of their
dead and this has been so in all ages
and not only among Christians but
among heathen peoples as well. This
rule is observed nowadays among
civil engineers in railway work and
while they may go through private
property they are not allowed to run
their lines through the sacred resting
place of the dead.

It is true as one alderman
stated that a building was
erected by a city congregation on
their graveyard a couple of years
ago but if they thought that they
were doing the proper thing that was
their own business. The Old Protest-
ant Graveyard is, however under pre-
sent conditions in a manner public
property and there is enough regard
for the fitness of things, among those
immediately interested to see that
this spot is not desecrated.

In this graveyard repose the re-
mains of "The rude forefathers of the
hamlet"—the men who in one walk
and another were leaders in the early
life not only of this community but
in many cases in the province. Noth-
ing but the most unlimited amount
of nerve could have induced Ald.
Cruikshank, a new-comer to the city
to make the proposal he did in re-
gard to the fire station.

It is understood that by the terms
of the trust deed under which the
property is put in the possession of
the city that this sacred spot shall
be used for cemetery purposes only,
forever, and it is hoped that those
who have authority to enforce the
conditions of this deed will see that
they are carried out.

It would be better for the City
Council to do something towards im-
proving this old cemetery than to
plan for its desecration.

In conclusion Mr. Editor "Hands off
The Old Cemetery."

5000 SKAT PLAYERS COMPETE

Chicago, May 25—Skat players from
all over the United States and Can-
ada, more than five thousand in num-
ber, are assembled in this city to
take part in the fifteenth annual
tournament of the North American
Skat League, which opened here to-
day and will continue until Monday.
In recent years the interest in Skat,
which is the great national card game
of the Germans, has increased won-
derfully in the United States and Can-
ada and the number of American de-
voted of the fascinating game has in-
creased at a rapid rate. The annual
tournaments held under the auspices
of the North American Skat League
have contributed materially toward
stimulating the interest in the game
and from year to year the attendance
and the number of contestants at
these annual tournaments has in-
creased. At the present contest \$10,-
000 in prizes will be awarded to the
victors in the various contests. The
principal prize is \$1000 and there are
also several prizes of \$200 and \$100
each, with a long list of minor
awards.

ELECTRIC LIGHT MEN'S TOUR

New York, May 25—Two trains car-
rying the largest special excursion
party ever headed west will leave to-
morrow, one from this city and one
from Boston. The trains will carry
the Eastern and New England dele-
gates and their friends to the thirty-
fifth annual convention of the Na-
tional Electric Light Association,
which is to be held in Seattle from
June 10 to 14. There will be all man-
ner of electrical contrivances aboard
each train including electric curling
irons for the women's boudoirs and
electric afternoon teas will be served
each day. On the observation cars
there will be giant electric signs ex-
plaining the excursion.

DR. HYDE TO FACE
MURDER TRIAL

Kansas City, Mo., May 25—The
trial of Dr. B. Clark Hyde, charged
with the murder of Colonel Thomas
H. Swope, is scheduled upon the docket
of the criminal court to begin
next Monday, but it is quite likely
that the State will ask for another
continuance, as the special prosecu-
tor, United States Senator J. A.
Reed, is still detained in Washington
by his duties in Congress. If another
postponement is asked for and
granted the case will probably not
come up until after the adjournment
of Congress.

At the first trial, in the Spring of
1910, Dr. Hyde was found guilty and
was sentenced to imprisonment for
life, but a new trial was granted,
which came up last year. Hyde's
second trial ended abruptly when
Harry Waldron, one of the jurors,
escaped from the marshals. The third
trial was to begin on January 2,
1912, but at the request of the prose-
cution it was postponed until May
27, in the hope that by that time
Senator Reed would be at leisure to
give his attention to the case.

Dr. B. Clark Hyde had been under
suspicion in connection with the mys-
terious illness and deaths in the
Swope family ever since the death of
Colonel Thomas H. Swope on Octob-
er 3, 1909. The death of Colonel
Swope followed soon after he had suf-
fered a severe convulsion and this
convulsion, it was charged by the
members of the Swope family, fol-
lowed immediately after the adminis-
tration of a capsule given by direc-
tion of Dr. Hyde. Dr. Hyde said it
was a digestive tablet.

It was proved at the trial that Dr.
Hyde had purchased cyanide of potas-
sium in five-grain capsules. Dr. Hyde
claimed he bought the cyanide cap-
sules to kill roaches in his office.

Two days before the death of Col.
Swope, a cousin of the millionaire
philanthropist died at the Swope
home following a stroke of apoplexy.
Dr. Hyde and Dr. G. T. Twyman of
Independence treated Hulton. The
patient was bled profusely, it is
charged at the suggestion of Dr.
Hyde. Beginning early in December,
an epidemic of typhoid fever broke
out in the Swope household during
which ten members of the family were
stricken and one Chrisman Swope, a
brother of Dr. Hyde's wife, died.

Chrisman died after taking a cap-
sule given at Dr. Hyde's direction
and after suffering a convulsion simi-
lar to the one that attacked Colonel
Swope. Margaret Swope, Chrisman's
sister, was also treated by Dr. Hyde,
had a convulsion after taking a cap-
sule, but she was given an emetic at
once by Dr. Twyman, and recovered.

In all, Dr. Hyde was indicted on
eleven counts, the remaining indict-
ments charging him with trying to
murder members of the Swope family
by introducing typhoid germs and
poisons into the medicines adminis-
tered by him.

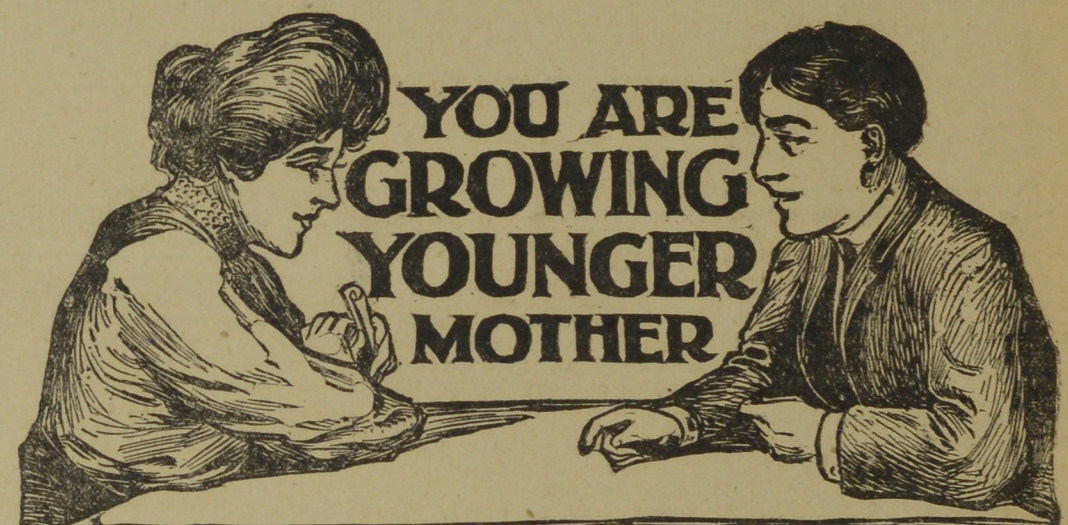
