## MEXICAN REBELS SUFFERED BIG LOSS

(Canadian Press.)  
At the Federal Front, Rellano, Mex. May 25—Gen. Huerta last night said his men had found 800 rebels dead and wounded on the field. He estimated that of the 8,000 men under Orozco 2,000 had deserted during the fighting.

The federal commander said he took 400 prisoners. His own losses, he asserted, were only 10 dead and 38 wounded.

## COUNCIL OF WOMEN MEETING AT LONDON

London, Ont., May 27—Mrs. Bullock of St. John was a leading figure yesterday, at the nineteenth annual meeting of the National Council of Women replying to the address of Welcome, read by Mrs. Boomer, president of the local council, and London's "Grand Old Lady."

Lady Aberdeen sent a parcel of flowers, the same as the council colors, given to each delegate present.

"In the national council of Women," said Mrs. Boomer, "is a living monument to lady Aberdeen's stay in Canada."

The Duke and Duchess of Connaught and Princess Patricia will visit the council next week. Mayor Graham has "posted up" the ladies as citizens of London, offering them the freedom of the city, and Bishop Williams of Huron has given them the freedom of the churches. The Bishop paid the council the compliment of having improved very largely the social economic conditions of women in this country.

## BALLOON BLOWN TO PIECES

(Canadian Press.)

Leipzig, Germany, May 25—The dirigible balloon Parseval VI was completely destroyed here this morning by being torn from her anchor by a squall of wind. One of the soldiers on guard near the balloon was injured by the flying tackle.

The Parseval VI had arrived only this morning and had been anchored in an open field.

The flexible dirigible balloons of the Parseval type have been almost as unlucky as the rigid Heopplin dirigibles. Parseval VI, which was destroyed this morning, had already met with several accidents.

## LEPER MAKING TROUBLE

Montreal, May 25—There may be another addition to the leper colony at Tracadie, N. B., in Chan Chuen, the Chinaman, who is living in a guarded shack in an unknown part of the city, is the bone of contention between city and Dominion health officers.

"If the Dominion immigration authorities do not take charge of the Chinese leper, and deport him, we will send him down to Tracadie," said Dr. Laberge, city health officer. "We don't intend to keep him here in Montreal."

"Dr. Bryce of Ottawa, has the case before him, and we are waiting his report."

Chan Chuen is in custody, but his whereabouts are carefully guarded.

As the Chinaman has been in this city, is that he should be sent back to China as an undesirable immigrant, as he is suffering from an incurable disease.
