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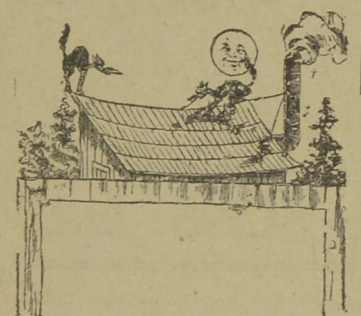

FRANK PATCH
MATCHED WITH
GALLAGHER

Two Noted Halifax Horses to Race
 for \$1000 a Side June 26—F. J.
 Power Starter

Thursday's Acadian Recorder has
 the following.

"For some days there has been talk
 as to the merits of the stallion
 Frank Patch, 2:13½ the champion
 pacer of the provinces last season,
 and the noted gelding Gallagher
 2:03½ owned in this city which re-
 sulted yesterday in the horses being
 matched to race for \$1,000 a side.
 Yesterday afternoon J. B. Mitchell
 and L. R. Acker met at the Recorder
 office, when articles of agreement
 were drawn up and \$100 a side de-
 posited to bind the match. Both par-
 ties were ready for business; there
 was no haggling whatever, and there
 was no trouble in arranging details.
 The date of the race was set for
 Wednesday, June 26, at 2:30 p.m.,
 and to take place at the Halifax Ex-
 hibition track and if the same can-
 not be secured to take place on some
 track to be mutually agreed upon.

Frank J. Power was selected as
 presiding judge and starter, with F.
 W. Budd, who officiated throughout
 the seven days of last year's Exhibi-
 tion meeting, and R. H. Edwards the
 veteran horseman, as his associates.
 In event of either of the judges being
 unable to act, Mr. Power is empow-
 ered to appoint a substitute or sub-
 stitutes.

The sum of \$100 a side, was depos-
 ited with James W. Power sporting
 editor of the Halifax Recorder who
 was appointed final stakeholder. The
 balance of the stakes, \$900 is to be
 deposited with him by noon Tuesday
 June 25th, the day before the race.
 The full amount of the stakes are
 to be to the winner as also are the
 share of the gate receipts to the par-
 ties to the match.

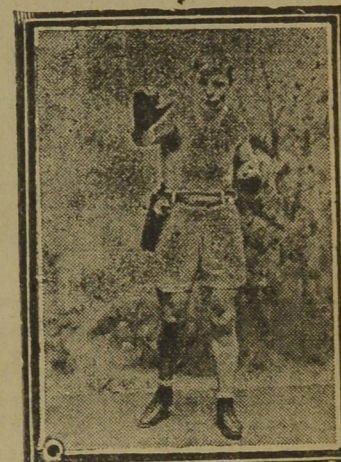
The race is to be governed by the
