LABRADOR COAST SWEEP BY HURRICANE

St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 10—Wireless messages from Labrador tell of the havoc wrought by a hurricane which swept that coast last week. The reports indicate extensive damage to fishing vessels and in villages along the coast.

One schooner was driven in the rocks at Out Throat and four of the crew drowned. The greater portion of the fishing fleet is on the way from the extreme north of Labrador, a section dotted with islands exposed to the fury of the storm.

Tragic news is expected from that section.

FIRST OF ITS KIND IN AMERICA

Cambridge Springs, Pa., Sept. 10—The National Polish Preparatory Academy, the first national school in America intended solely for the education of young Polish-Americans, was opened to the reception of students today. The new institution is a project of the National Polish Alliance, which has 80,000 members among the leading Polish citizens of the United States. The school opens with students enrolled from New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Michigan and several other States.

TRAGIC END OF NOTED BALL PLAYER

Chicago, Sept. 9—Fred Cigarz, twenty-three years old, was arrested today and confessed to assaulting Arthur L. Raymond, former pitcher of the New York National Baseball Club, Sunday, Sept. 1, at a semi-professional ball game.

He said Raymond was a spectator at the game and that some one threw a piece of pottery, which struck the pitcher on the face. Raymond picked up the missile and struck Cigarz with it and in the fight that followed Raymond was knocked down and kicked on the head a number of times.

Cigarz said he had no idea that Raymond was seriously injured. He told the police he had known the pitcher fifteen years.

While Cigarz was being taken to a police station the funeral cortege of Raymond passed and the prisoner wept as he told the story of the assault.

At the coroner's inquest which began today, Dr. Springer reported that Raymond died from hemorrhages due to a fracture of the skull. Cigarz's arrest followed. He will be held pending the outcome of the inquest.

Raymond was found dead in a downtown hotel Saturday and it was at first reported that his death was due to heart failure aggravated by the heat.

ARKANSAS COTTON MEN ORGANIZE

Little Rock, Ark., Sept. 10—Representatives of the cotton industry in Arkansas met here today to organize a State Association for the protection of their mutual interests. One of the principal aims of the association will be to bring about the repeal of the anti-future dealing law, which is declared to be seriously interfering with the cotton business in Arkansas and subjecting the planters and buyers to an unnecessary loss of both time and money.

ADDRESSES VETERANS

Atlantic City, N. J., Sept. 10—Governor Woodrow Wilson came to Atlantic City today to review the parade and deliver an address at the national encampment of the United Spanish War Veterans. The Governor was given an enthusiastic reception.

FIRE CHIEFS MEET IN DENVER

Denver, Col., Sept. 10—Fire chiefs representing many large cities of the United States and Canada are attending the annual convention of the International Association of Fire Engineers, which met in this city today for a three days' session. The program provides for papers, addresses and discussions covering the entire field of fire fighting. In connection with the convention there is a large exhibition of the latest improvements and inventions in fire fighting apparatus.

St. John, Sept. 10—When the steamer Titanic sank there went down with her seven city of St. John forty years \$500 debentures due in 1912 bearing 3 1/2 per cent interest. The city has agreed to pay the owners the value of the securities at \$7.35. The bank of Montreal has agreed to identify the city in the case of the original bonds turning up for payment.

THE TRUE MISSION OF LIBERALISM!

(Sir John Simon, Solicitor General at Manchester)

Let me, in a concluding sentence, express to you what I from my heart believe to be the real basis of Liberal government as expressed in these measures. It is this. We are not so foolish as to suppose that we can bring equal happiness, equal fortune and equal success into every home. Of course, we cannot. But we can appeal to the good sense of the community and point out that the enormous inequalities of wealth and happiness in this country require on the meatest motive of self-preservation, that there should be a united effort to assist to help those who need it most. That has been the basis of the whole Liberal social programme. The Budget was an appeal to people to contribute to a common purpose, according as they could spare. Having collected your money you have to appeal to the conscience of the community, to help the aged with old age pensions to help the unfortunate to help the workman's wife in the moment of her agony, to search this country from end to end in order to see whether it is possible by human organization really to bring the most miserable and hard pressed of the people something nearer to a minimum standard of health and happiness. That is the whole essence of Liberal policy, and I say that the people of Manchester show themselves as it seems to me lacking at once in imagination and sympathy if they are prepared to stand by and see this great Act of Parliament rightly by little innuendoes and by single cases of hardship. Just as this is a rich and prosperous country that can well afford to bear these burdens, if they are wisely spread, so we ought to be in the van of human progress among the nations; so we ought not to allow our riches to blind our sympathy with the poor people, with the man who, in a prosperous country is struck down and unfortunate. And the real task of modern government is to inspire and organize the community that it is ready to come to the help of such who need it most.

FORMER MAYOR FACES PRISON

Bemidji, Sept. 10—Dr. D. F. Dumas the former mayor of Cass Lake who is under conviction on a charge of arson, will be arraigned for sentence at the term of court which convened here today. It is expected the attorney of Dr. Dumas will argue for a new trial. Should this plea fail, sentence will be pronounced and the former mayor will be taken to Stillwater penitentiary.

The sentence of Dumas will end one of the most noted criminal cases with which the courts of Minnesota have had to deal in years. At the time of his arrest a year ago last June Dumas was mayor of Cass Lake and was respected both as a physician and public official. His arrest followed the alleged confession of two yeggmen who had been shot and captured while cracking a safe in the town of Puposki. According to the stories told by the yeggmen the physician-mayor was one of the ring leaders of a band of criminals who had carried on a State-wide campaign in arson and safe-breaking. Dumas was tried and convicted on a charge of arson.

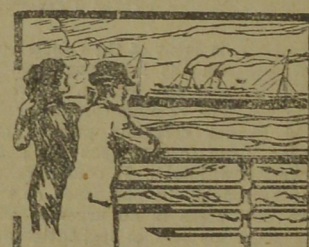

London, Sept. 7—It is definitely stated in naval service quarters (says the Manchester Guardian) that the permanent naval policy, as decided upon by Premier Borden and his colleagues while in London will consist in the main of the Laurier policy with a representation for Canada in the Imperial Parliament.
