

EUCCHARISTIC CONGRESS IN VIENNA

Vienna, Sept. 10—It is no exaggeration to say that the eyes of Roman Catholics throughout the world will be fixed on this city during the remainder of this week, the occasion being the meeting of the Eucharistic International Congress. This is an annual gathering of Catholic prelates from all parts of the world and is designed to celebrate the Holy Eucharist and to seek the best means of spreading its knowledge throughout the world. Vienna has never before had the honor of entertaining the gathering since it assumed its present world-wide character. Two years ago the Congress assembled in Montreal the meeting being the first held in the western world. Last years congress met in Madrid.

The cardinal-legate sent by the Pope to attend the congress arrived in Vienna today and met with an enthusiastic reception. Scores of other prelates from England, Italy, Spain, Germany, France, Belgium and from the United States, Canada and Australia, are due to reach Vienna within the next day or two. Nearly all of the principal streets and squares of the city are decorated in honor of the occasion.

The formal opening of the congress is fixed for Thursday, which will be the anniversary of the day on which King Sobiesky in 1688 having taken the Holy Communion, moved his troops toward Vienna for the memorable battle in which the Turks were conquered.

The sessions of the congress are to be held in the Auserer-Burgplatz, which is conveniently located in the heart of the city. The gathering will conclude on Sunday with a great procession in celebration of the feast of the Name of Mary which was specially established in memory of the liberation of Vienna from the power of the Mussulman.

WOODSTOCK WANTS TO BE DIVISIONAL POINT

Woodstock, N.B., Sept. 10—Dr. Siris was before the police magistrate today to answer a charge of breaking jail. He elected to be tried under the speedy trials act and the 18th inst. was set as the day of the trial. W. P. Jones will probably appear for the prisoner. Siris, who is confined for obtaining money under false pretences, has made three attempts to break jail and nearly succeeded the last occasion. It is said he has also tried to bribe the jail officials in order to obtain his freedom.

A. R. Gould met the town council last night in reference to the location of the Valley Railway divisional point. He is to return here tomorrow and give the council his answer to the proposition submitted. The decision in this matter is of vital importance to the residents of the town as it involves a bonus to the railway of \$16,000. The council presented their case in the strongest possible manner and if accepted by Mr. Gould the people's interests will be well guarded.

BRANDYWINE ANNIVERSARY

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 11—The patriotic and historical societies of Philadelphia and vicinity today joined in the customary observance of the anniversary of the battle of Brandywine, where, on September 11, 1777, for the first time the continental army carried the Stars and Stripes into battle.



WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE.

New York, Sept. 7—One of the latest achievements in the woman's suffrage line is the organization of a National Wilson-Marshall society or party consisting of suffragettes and headed by Mrs. Borden Harriman. The members of the organization are busy as bees and expect to be of great help to the Democratic national ticket. They even have a "poetess" among them, who has undertaken the job of supplying the women with campaign songs. Her first effort, to be sung after the melody of "My Pretty Maid," is a somewhat trite adaptation of that same poem. However, the women are delighted with it and will sing it with vigor and emphasis when the occasion arises.

GRAND JURY ENCAMPMENT

Los Angeles, Ca., Sept. 10—The arrangements for the forty-sixth national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, with its several affiliated bodies, which will open in this city tomorrow, were completed today. Commander-in-Chief Trimble and the other national officers, together with veterans and other visitors estimated to total nearly 40,000 are in the city in readiness for the opening.

In connection with the meetings of the Grand Army there will be held the annual gathering of the Women's Relief Corps, the Ladies of the G. A. R., the Daughters of Veterans, the National Association of Army Nurses of the Civil War, the National Association of Naval Veterans, the National Association of Union Ex-Prisoners of War, and the National Association of Civil War Musicians.

The meetings and reunions of these various organizations will continue until Saturday. The big feature of the week will be the parade of the Grand Army tomorrow, when, it is estimated, veterans variously estimated at from 15,000 to 25,000 will be in line.

The business sessions of the Grand Army encampment will begin Thursday. Much interest centers in the choice of the new commander-in-chief. For this office there are already several candidates in the field.
