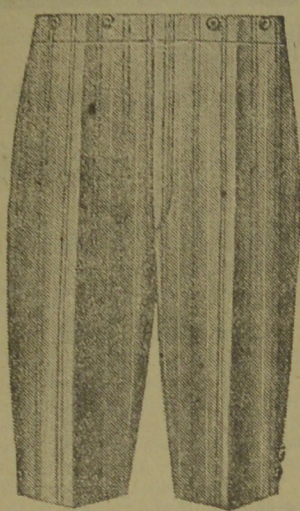

LABOR CONGRESS IS
AGAINST ORIENTALS

Guelph, Ont., Sept. 10.—At the Trades and Labor Congress this morning the annual reports were tabled and read by secretary James Simpson. The legislative committee report covered a wide field from a scarring of the industrial disputes, set to a denunciation of war scares. The idea was put forward that as the capitalists for the world cause all the wars they should be allowed to do the fighting. Sympathy with the workers in Germany, France and Italy and other countries with whom we have no quarrels was expressed. "We have no quarrel with the Orientals" the report stated, except, that being an entirely different race and dissimilable we demand that they seek their own industrial salvation in their own country without being used to lower the standard of living in Canada." The condition of workers in the steel works and mines of Nova Scotia it was stated are of such a nature as to call for immediate action. It was urged that a royal commission be appointed to make a thorough investigation.

Touching on the old age pension question, the legislative committee recommended that a special committee be appointed to prepare a brief statement of the position of the congress and a basis for legislation. Referring to workmen's compensation, things are shaping themselves, the report continues, as to indicate that a real good piece of legislation is on its way in Ontario very late it is true, but never the less acceptable when it arrives. The report took a fling at Arthur Hawkes, the new apostle of immigration, who had studied the industrial situation in Canada, from a car window while making a flight from coast to coast.

REPUBLICANS WIN
MAINE ELECTION

Portland, Sept. 10.—The political overturn in Monday's Maine State election in which the Republicans won back the governorship and state auditorship and secured three of the four congressmen, a majority of the county electors and a sufficient majority on a joint ballot in the legislature to assure a Republican United States senator, became more apparent Tuesday with revised and additional returns.

William T. Haines, of Waterville, the Republican ticket leader was elected governor by a plurality of 3,757 over Gov. Plaisted, Democratic candidate of Augusta the vote being with 28 small towns missing, as follows:

Haines, Republican, 79,072; Plaisted Democrat, 66,515.

Two years ago the vote for governor was as follows:

Bert M. Fernald, Republican 64,672; F. W. Plaisted, Democrat, 73,125.

THE LIQUOR QUESTION.

At Maine Elections The results of the contest cannot be construed in any way as reflecting conditions that will obtain in the state at the November election.

With the election of Governor Haines, the alliance between the old line Republicans and the Bull Moose party comes to an abrupt end. The fight for governor was conducted simply on local issues, with the enforcement of the liquor law occupying its usual prominence.

Governor Plaisted stood for local option and the Republicans for the enforcement of the prohibitory law.

At no time during the fight did Mr. Haines declare whom he favored as between President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt. He was repeatedly asked to state his preference by the Democrats.

Ex-Governor Utter, Congressman Campbell of Kansas, and Congressman Samuel McCall of Massachusetts, stand pat Republicans, who stumped the state for Mr. Haines, received explicit instructions not to mention the names of either Taft or Roosevelt.
