

Pitcher William Jensen of the New Haven team one of the stars of the Connecticut League, has been sold to the Detroit Tigers.


It is said that Pittsburgh will send Alther King Cole or Eddie Warner to Columbus in part payment for Pitchers Sisler and Cooper.

WALTER COX ADDED TO WINNINGS AT SYRACUSE

Won 2:07 Pace With Sara Ann Patch
---Big Field in 2:15 Trot---Axworth Went Fast Mile

Syracuse, Sept. 9.—The Grand Circuit meeting held in connection with the New York State Fair opened here this afternoon with all conditions favorable, including large fields. The 2:12 pace developed into a seven-heat affair, the first of the season on the Grand Circuit. The only performer of the afternoon to show anything out of the ordinary was the three-year-old colt Axworth, which won the Kanoonoa stake for trotters of his age, jogging the first heat in 2:12.

The most valuable event of the day was the \$2000 Conway stake for 2:07 paces, and this went to swell the coffers of the New Hampshire trainer, Walter Cox, who won it with the Boston mare Sara Ann Patch.

One of the biggest fields of the season appeared in the 2:15 trot, twelve scoting before Starter Upton. The race was easy for the Massachusetts trotter, Baron Aberdeen, in straight heats, the bad-mannered Ucon getting second money.
