SIR WILFRED LAURIER'S SPEECH AT NORTH BAY

The Old Chieftain Tendered a Surprise Party By Several Thousand People—Prouder of Defeat Than of Victory

North Bay, Ont., Sept. 25—North Bay and the surrounding districts celebrated the anniversary of September 21st by tendering a genuine "surprise party" to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The Liberal chief had completed his present tour of Northern Ontario and was to reach this town on his return trip to Ottawa. For two hours his car was scheduled to wait at the station here after the arrival of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario train, till the departure of the Canadian Pacific train east.

SURPRISED THE CHIEF.

There was no arrangement for any meeting or function as Sir Wilfrid passed through, but the people of the district decided to take matters in their own hands and, without notifying any of the touring party, to inaugurate an impromptu commemoration of the last federal election, which would serve to show the "Chief" that the event of a year ago had only served to intensify their loyalty and devotion with which he is regarded by a large and growing section of his fellow Canadians. Among the quotations shouted up from the gathering were Wendell Phillips' axiom: "Defeat is nothing, but the first steps of something better," and Henry Ward Beecher's assurance: "You are never so near victory as when defeated in a good cause."

CAUSE WILL TRIUMPH.

Sir Wilfrid and his party were having supper at the station when the celebrants, some two thousand strong and accompanied by band and torches, arrived in quest of the Liberal leader. The gathering surrounded the car, cheering and acclaiming their mottoes. Sir Wilfrid smilingly relinquished his meal, donned his overcoat and permitted them amid enthusiasm, to almost carry him to a waiting automobile, in which he was driven in triumph procession through some of the principal streets of the town. Returning to the station, Mayor G. A. McLaughlin mounted the platform and gave expression to the welcome of the people.

"We thought," said he, "that this day of all days was the one in which to testify of our intensified and renewed allegiance to the greatest of our countrymen, the man who a year ago placed principle before power, and who sacrificed office and prestige in the cause of an enlarged and more prosperous Canada, a cause we believe he will live to see triumph." (Prolonged cheering.)

WENT DOWN IN NOBLE CAUSE.

Sir Wilfrid was greeted with enthusiasm. He spoke feelingly and was evidently touched by the unexpected tribute.

"This is indeed a surprise," said he. "It is altogether unexpected and all the more appreciated since we were just passing through your town and had no intention of stopping. I can tell you it warms my heart. Like you, I have not forgotten that a year ago tonight, the cause which I had the honor to lead went down to defeat. Today they tell me our opponents are celebrating their victory. I join heartily, ay, enthusiastically in celebrating our defeat, for we have more reason to be proud of the defeat than they have to be proud of the victory. We went down in a noble cause, standing for what we believed was the best for our common country. (Cheers.)

DEFEAT HAS NO TERRORS.

"Defeat has no terrors for the fighter who knows his cause was just and right," continued the Liberal leader amid renewed applause. "We take our defeat gamely, and we gird our loins and still press onward, knowing that time is with us. I am a believer in British institutions, in the government of the people. I still have confidence, lots of it. (Cheers.)

"Let us press onward manfully together, and when the mists of misunderstanding and prejudice have cleared away as they will clear away—may as they are clearing away—the people

who defeated us last year will rally once more and stronger than ever to the cause and it is their cause, the cause of the country. (Cheers.)

PARTY OF PROMISES.

"The people cannot be misled all the time," continued Sir Wilfrid. "A year ago, my friends of North Bay, you remember that our opponents issued a promise: 'If the Laurier government is defeated, you will have the Georgian Bay Canal within a year.' (Laughter and cries of Hear, Hear!)

"The year has gone and it is my privilege to pass by this way. I say to myself I will have the opportunity to see the work of construction going on upon the Georgian Bay Canal. I ask my friends to take me to see it. They look at me surprised. I say, 'Take me to see it; it must be there because it was promised within this time.' They smile at me. Again I ask, 'What have they done?'

"Not a thing," shouted a voice from the crowd.

"I'm afraid not," observed Sir Wilfrid. "I'm afraid we will have to wait till the return of the Laurier government to power before we can hope to get much done. They do not seem to take even their promises seriously."

"And we won't have to wait very long," shouted a man in the gathering, amid renewed cheering.

"Till the next election," smilingly responded the Liberal chief, and again the applause broke forth.

Sir Wilfrid addressed his compatriots briefly in French, after which, on calls from the crowd, Hon. Messrs. Murphy, Graham, Lemieux and King each spoke briefly. Hon. Mr. Graham expressed his sympathy with the idea of a Canadian Lloyds and concluded by assuring the people that "the chief is the youngest and strongest man among us. He is in this fight with you to stay and to win."

Until the train pulled out the big gathering remained enthusiastic and cheering.
