REUNION OF VIRGINIAN VETERANS

Pulaski, Va., Sept. 25—Remnants of the gray-clad host of the Confederate army rallied here today for the annual reunion of the Grand Camp of Virginia, United Confederate Veterans. The reunion will last three days and present indications point to an unusually large attendance of the old soldiers with their affiliated "Sons" and "Daughters." Col. Tom Smith of Warrenton, is slated to succeed Major Harry Wooding of Danville, as grand commander. Roanoke is making a strong bid for the next reunion.

POOR HUSBAND GOES TO JAIL

London, Sept. 21—Mark Wilks, a schoolmaster of Clapton, has leaped into fame because his wife possesses an income of her own. Mrs. Wilks is an ardent suffragette and refuses to pay her income tax to the government which imprisons militant workers in woman's cause. Consequently Mark Wilks has to go to prison for her. For even if he were willing to pay, he has not enough money of his own to do so.

Mrs. Charles Stanfield, a sister of Mrs. Wilks, has given a clear exposition of the case.

Mr. Wilks is in prison, she said, because he has not got £37 (\$185) to pay the tax on property he does not own and cannot control. That is really the whole case.

Under the Income Tax Act the property of his wife is his property for the purpose of taxation, but under the Married Women's Property Act it is entirely out of his control.

Every man who is married to a woman with an income of her own is in that position, and if he cannot pay his wife's taxes, he is liable to imprisonment. It seems to place an enormous weapon in the hands of wealthy wives.

It seems that in 1909, Mrs. Wilks refused to make a return of her income to either the inland revenue authorities or her husband, and in consequence the furniture, which was hers, was seized and sold.

In 1910, her sister explained, she asserted that such distraint was illegal, declaring the under the income Tax Act she, as a married woman, was exempt from taxation. As a consequence all the taxes charged upon her were withdrawn and the authorities contented themselves afterward with making their claims sometimes on Mr. Wilks and sometimes on both conjointly, and finally on him alone.

"All this interesting," added Mrs. Stanfield, as showing the ridiculous position that arises through the operation of the two acts, but the serious side of the matter is that Mr. Wilks is in prison for the debt, and position as master in the London County Council schools is much endangered.

He does not know for what period he will be in prison and he has no possible way of settling the debt."

The irony of the affair is that suffragettes are making a campaign on behalf of Mr. Wilks. A demonstration in Trafalgar Square, processions and meetings outside the jail, and an address by G. Bernard Shaw are the program.

What Mr. Wilks thinks of all these efforts in his behalf, while he is languishing in prison because his wife not stated.

DID SENATOR

LANDRY DECLINE

Toronto, Sept. 21—An Ottawa despatch to the World says:—

"There is a report up from Montreal today that the Hon. L. P. Pelletier is to meet Sir Rodolphe Forget, and that an order is to be made to patch up the difficulties besetting the Conservative party in the Quebec district.

"It appears that Senator Landry declined to attend the banquet at Levis, replying that in view of the charges he made at the dinner given to Hon. F. D. Monk, at the Garrison Club a few weeks ago, he could not see his way clear to be present.

The senator specified his accusations against the Hon. Mr. Pelletier, and asked that a committee be appointed alleging that if the charges were not proven he might be classed as a prevaricator all the rest of his life. A copy of the document was also sent Premier Borden.

The rumor of Dr. Paquette's appointment as deputy minister of inland revenue is revived. Mr. Armand Lavergne says if the people want him he will be a candidate saying that he is a supporter of the government, provided they give a referendum on the naval question.

Later despatches from Quebec says that Hon. J. D. Hazen announced that the people would be called upon to pronounce on the naval question."

Montreal, Q., Sept. 25—Traffic through the Lachine Canal was partially resumed today and by this evening the Canal Department hope that practically every trace of yesterday's smash, when the Canadian lake liner Nevada carried away the Seigneurs Street Locks, will have been removed.

About eight to ten steamers and fifteen to twenty barges are held up at Montreal and Lachine but by tomorrow it is hoped that everything will be running smoothly again.

London, Sept. 25—Leonardo Da Vinci's stolen masterpiece, "Mona Lisa," is hanging on the walls of a private gallery in St. Petersburg, according to a report published in a Russian paper and transmitted today to a news agency here. The mysterious disappearance of the priceless picture, popularly known as "La Joconde," from the Louvre Museum in Paris, caused world wide sensation in August last year. Search has been made for it in every country without success.

Winnipeg, Sept. 25—Snow fell steadily at Kenora all Tuesday and three to four inches lay on the sidewalks. Frost is reported again last night from many points in the west and cool weather is prophesied. In spite of frost and rain, little has apparently been done to crops still standing in Manitoba, especially in the north.

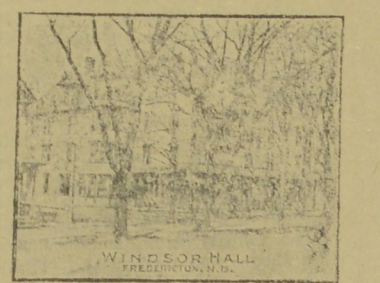

SCORES CANADIAN

PATENT OFFICE

Ottawa, Sept. 25—Another hundred or more delegates to the Canadian Manufacturers' Association arrived this morning. There are between four and five hundred present. It was expected that this convention would be the most successful in every way of the forty-one the association has held and President Nathaniel Curry said today that the most hopeful expectations of success had so far been exceeded.

Some important matters were dealt with in the report of the parliamentary committee this morning. A close watch is being kept on the legislation in the different provinces, regarding company incorporation and registration.

The report continues to deal with the Canadian patent office. Among the criticism made are that the staff is inadequate and that the alleged shipshop methods prevail in the Canadian patent office have made patents issued by it of practically no value until they have survived the test of a law suit.
