## TECHNICALLY IN NASON CASE DOES NOT AFFECT CONVICTION

Nason, on purely technical grounds the warrant itself was set aside. If the magistrate had simply imposed the fine without holding part of it over as a guarantee for future peace there can be no doubt that the defendant would still be serving the balance of her time in Burton jail, provided she had not in the meantime paid the amount of the fine and costs.

The evidence of the prosecution before Colonel Alexander showed that Mrs. Hardy Nason had been set upon and beaten in a most terrible manner although she was exercising her perfect rights to occupy and be upon her own property to the exclusion of her assailants and who, in fact, had been warned on previous occasions not to trespass.

The people at Fredericton Junction have sufficient confidence in the judgment and reliability of Colonel Alexander to decide this or any case according to the evidence brought before him, and after having come to the above conclusion and convicted Minnie Nason they feel satisfied that this particular case was decided as the facts warranted, regretting that only a quibble of the law or technical defect in the warrant itself should have allowed the person to escape the punishment inflicted by the court.

## MANY PAY TRIBUTE TO LATE SIR RICHARD CARTWRIGHT

Kingston, Ont., Sept. 26.—This afternoon the remains of the late Right Hon. Sir Richard Cartwright were laid to rest in the family lot at Caragu cemetery. At 1.30 o'clock the remains left the family home, "The Maples" attended by the mourners, the pall bearers, representatives of the Kingston Reform Association, Senator G. A. Loughheed, representing the Dominion Government and others. The immediate mourners were the four sons of the deceased statesman, Dr. R. C. Cartwright, Napanee; A. D. Cartwright, Ottawa; Capt. Frank Cartwright, of Winnipeg and Henry Cartwright of Toronto. The pall bearers were Col. R. Smith, Col. S. McGill, and Messrs. J. B. Williams, K. C., Francis Dobbs, John Dobbs, and F. C. T. O'Hara, Ottawa, for years private secretary of Sir Richard. Arriving at St. George's Anglican Cathedral, the remains were met at the entrance by the Dean of Ontario, Rev. O. G. Dobbs, Brockville and others of the Cathedral clergy. As the body was conveyed up the main aisle to the chancel, Chopin's funeral march was played. The service which was full orchestral was conducted by the Dean. The hymns sung were "Lead Kindly Light," and "Now the Laborer's Task is O'er." The Dead March in Saul was played as the body was borne from the Cathedral to the funeral carriage. The cortege from the Cathedral was a lengthy one. Among the prominent men in it were Senator Loughheed, Senator R. Jaffray, Toronto; Hon. Chas. Murphy, ex-Secretary of State,

At Caragu cemetery the service prayers were said by Rev. O. C. Dobbs, and the final collect and blessing by the Dean of Ontario. Among the floral tributes, were wreaths from the Dominion Government and Senate, the Montreal Liberal Club and the Kingston Reform Association.
