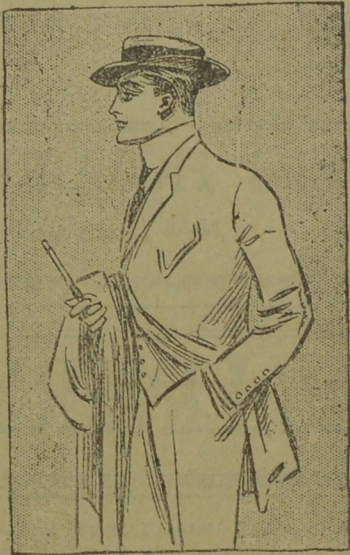


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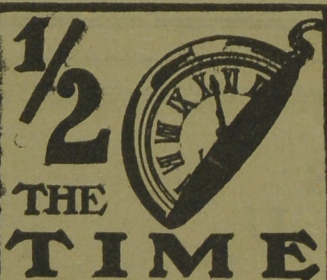
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U. N. B. RUGBY PRACTICE

VESTA BOY WINNER OF SYDNEY FREE-FOR-ALL

Sydney, N. S., Sept. 25—Two great races marked the second day of the Cape Breton Island exhibition. The classes were the free-for-all and 2:30, and both, particularly the former, were close and fast.

The honors in the free-for-all went to Vesta Boy, a Summerside horse, who took it in three straight heats, after Spoony Boy had captured the first heat in the fastest time of the day, 2:17. Prince Wilkes and Meadowdale fought it out for third place, the Halifax horse taking the honors. Gallagher, driven by Peter Carroll, took sick after the third heat and was withdrawn.

The 2:30 was ever closer, Robert L. winning out with two firsts and two seconds. Montrose Jr. had also two firsts but was placed fourth in the second heat. Robert L. came in first in the fourth heat but was put back for interfering with Montrose.

WORLD'S SERIES

TO OPEN OCTOBER 8
AT NEW YORK

Umpires Will be Klem and Rigler,
O'Loughlin and Evans—Aim to
Stop Speculation

New York, Sept. 25—The opening game of the world's baseball series will be held in this city on Tuesday, Oct. 8. The games will alternate between here and Boston, one game in each city, until the series is concluded.

The toss of a coin decided which city was to get the opening game. President McAleer of the Boston club chose head; the coin fell tail and the game went to New York.

A second toss, with similar results, fixed the opening game for Tuesday, Oct. 6. The Boston club preferred Monday, Oct. 7.

The Boston club will control the sale of tickets in that city. This is a victory for Ban Johnson in the American League.

The umpires selected were:
National League, Klem and Rigler.
American League, O'Loughlin and Evans.

In New York the sale of tickets will be handled by the National Commission. Boston has worked out a plan, it was announced, whereby tickets would be delivered so far as is practicable to persons who have already made application. The applications have been filed and they have been notified to send money. Tickets, good for three games each, will be issued.

In New York, with a view to defeating the speculators, the only seats reserved are a block of 8,500 in the upper grand stand. Seats in the lower grand stand and bleachers will be sold at the Polo Grounds and each person purchasing a ticket must pass into the grounds.

**JOE PATCHEN II
WON HIS SIXTH
\$5,000 STAKE**

Captured the Hartman at Columbus
in Straight Heats—Braden Direct
Won 2:07 Pace

Columbus, O., Sept. 24—Big fields but straight heat racing featured the opening of the two weeks' Grand Circuit meeting at the Driving Park here today.

It was a day on which the pacers were featured strictly, the \$5000 Hartman stake for 2:13 pacers and a \$3000 event for the 2:07 class being carded.

Joe Patchen II made his record for the season stand 11 victories out of an even dozen starts by landing the Hartman event very easily, while Braden Direct had just as easy a time in taking first money in the event of lesser value.

Both of these were favorites, but in the 2:10 trot Echomore, the first choice, failed to make good, Eva Cord, driven by her millionaire owner, Frank G. Jones, showing the field the way to the wire in three straight heats.

The track was in very bad condition when the racing started, but became fast before the close of the day's sport.

Joe Patchen II was a \$50 to \$10 favorite over the field for the Hartman stake, while the local four-year-old Wydrad had the call in the pooling, with the "Big Train" barred. Wydrad made a strong bid in the first heat and was only beaten a length, but broke in the second, in which Grand Opera secured the place. In the final Wydrad made the Patchen horse step in 2:03, to beat him. It was the sixth \$5000 stake which Joe Patchen II has won this season, three of them within two weeks.

TROTTER.

Braden Direct, the world's champion four-year-old, which the critics have all picked as the most likely of the stake pacers to take the measure of Joe Patchen II, was favorite for the 2:07 stake, selling at \$25 against \$11 for Knight Onwardo and \$10 for the field. Like the Hartman stake winner, he took the lead at the start and gave it up but once during the race, Judge Ward leading him for a short distance in the final heat.

In the first two rounds Longworth B from the Murphy stable, was his chief opponent, but in the final Nat Ray got his ill-tempered pony Knight Onwardo going right and finished a close second to the victor.

New York, Sept. 26—Billy Papke of Kewanee, Ill., who claims the middleweight championship out fought Jack Denning of New York in a ten round bout last night. Denning carried a lead on points during the first four rounds but thereafter Papke slowly wore him down with effective blows.

Geo Kirkwood of St. Louis received a setback from his recent successes when he met Johnny Dundee. After Kirkwood had been conceded the first two rounds by a fair margin, Dundee began landing repeated lefts to the face and with his kangaroo hopping tactics had the better of the St. Louis man for most of the bout.

The winner and Joe Patchen II are both named to start in the Tennessee stake during the first week of the Lexington meeting.

Two trotters owned by Frank G. Jones started in the 2:10 trot, the owner having the mount behind Eva Cord and "Pop" Geers teaming Pee Wee. The mare was the real trotter and won in straight heats, while the red flag was the portion of Pee Wee in the second heat.

Newell, Derby Boy and Marigold look turns in chasing Eva Cord, but she had something on all of them and won handily, traveling two of the heats better than 2:10. The favorite, Echomore, was not a serious factor at any time.

Fourteen pacers, the majority of them half-mile track campaigners, making their debut on the Grand Circuit, scored in the 2:15 class, this being the largest field of the season in the big ring. The Iowa mare, Bessie Bee, who has been winning consistently during the past few weeks, was first choice in the auction, but second in the second heat was the best she could do, Carma G winning the two heats, after which the race was postponed until tomorrow.

OTTAWA WANTS SEVEN MAN HOCKEY TEAM AGAIN

Ottawa, Sept. 25—The first gun will be fired in the campaign for the return to seven man hockey either today or tomorrow when Secretary Martin Rossenthal of the Ottawa club, will send a request to President Emmett Quinn of the N.H.A., requesting him to bring the matter up on behalf of the Ottawas at the next meeting some time early in November.

The locals ask for the seven man game and also the old penalty system and they claim to have the support of the two Toronto Clubs in their demand. It is felt in Ottawa that the game will suffer should the six man hockey hold sway again next winter and the local magnates are out to look after their hockey-ists.

Scouts from the Patrick League have been in town interviewing Ottawa players, but so far have not signed up any of last year's team. The Ottawa executive claim that they will have all of last season's material they desire and that they will also have Gerrard, Kendall and Benedict of the Interprovincial champion New Edinburgh team.
