THREE CHILDREN HAD NARROW ESCAPE

Moncton, Feb. 14.—Three children of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Hope had a close call from being burned to death as a result of a fire in their home on Cornhill street between five and six o'clock this morning.

The fire caught in the woodwork around the chimney and extended to the bedroom, in which the three children were sleeping. Fortunately the little girl, eight or nine years old, awoke as the fire caught in the bed clothes and her screams quickly brought her parents to the rescue. The little girl was badly burned about the face and arm, but the two younger children escaped injury.

Mr. and Mrs. Hope, in rescuing the children and putting out the blaze, had their hair singed, but were not seriously burned. Their little girl's burns, while painful, are not considered dangerous. Very little damage was done to the house, which is owned by James Weldon.

TO SAVE NEBRASKA CORN CROP

Lincoln, Neb., Feb. 16.—Recent experiments are said to have indicated that seed corn in Nebraska is in the worst condition in its history, and that unless something is done at once to remedy existing conditions the crop this year is likely to fall short by about 50 per cent. In an effort to save this probable loss of \$25,000,000 to \$40,000,000 a whirlwind educational campaign is being planned by the business interests. During the coming week half a dozen seed-testing trains will be started over the state to get the farmers to test their corn before it is planted. Each train will be in charge of experts of the Nebraska State Experiment Station. Stops will be made at every town and village to give the lecturers an opportunity to explain the situation to the farmers and instruct them in the methods of testing seed corn.

CENTENARY OF HENRY WILSON

Boston, Mass., Feb. 16.—Today witnessed the centenary anniversary of the birth of Henry Wilson, the "Natick Cobbler," who was vice-president of the United States during the first two years of the second administration of President Grant. Wilson was a native of New Hampshire, but resided in Massachusetts during the greater part of his life. He was of gypsy or Indian blood and his original name was Jeremiah Jones Colbath, which he had changed to Henry Wilson by legislative enactment. Though not a man of intellectual grandeur, Wilson was an able writer and an eloquent speaker and lent valuable assistance to the anti-slavery cause.

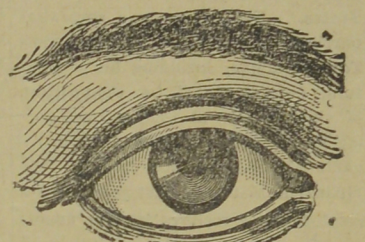

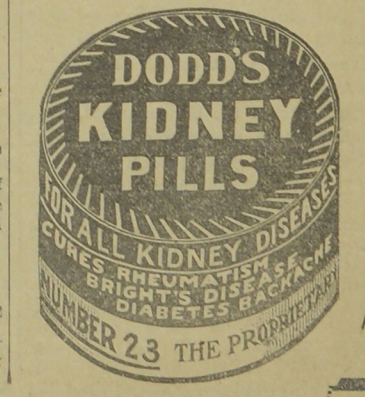

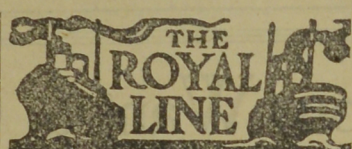
