## CITY ELECTION

The Election for one Alderman for  
Queen's Ward in the City of Frederic-  
ton for the current year will be  
held on Monday the 27th day of  
May inst. At the following places,  
Division No. 1—For all voters resid-  
ing or owning property above the  
centre line of Carleton Street pro-  
longed, at or near the City Hall in  
the said City.

Division No. 2— For all voters re-  
siding or owning property in the re-  
mainder of the said City, not in-  
cluded in Division No. 1, at or near  
the County Court House in the said  
City.

Polls will be opened at the above  
named places at nine o'clock, a.m.,  
of the said day of Election, and will  
close of the hour of four o'clock, p.  
m. of the same day.

Nominations must be filed in the  
office of the City Clerk, City Hall, at  
or before four o'clock on Monday, the  
20th day of May instant, and must be  
signed by at least two qualified  
electors, and the signatures attested  
to under oath.

Forms for Nomination may be pro-  
cured at the City Clerk's office.

A Certificate of the City Treasurer  
showing that all Rates and Taxes of  
the Candidate have been paid within  
the time required by law must be at-  
tached to each Nomination Paper.

## A Law Regulating The Sale of Milk in the City of Fredericton.

1. No person shall sell or offer for  
sale milk in the City of Fredericton  
without having first procured a li-  
cense so to do, from the local Board  
of Health.

2. Every person applying for a li-  
cense to sell milk within the City of  
Fredericton shall, with the applica-  
tion therefor, furnish the Board with  
a declaration in writing that all  
cows belonging to him which supply  
milk for the purpose of sale have  
been tested with the Tuberculin with-  
in one month from the date of such  
application by a veterinary surgeon,  
recognized as such by the Board, for  
the diagnosis of tuberculosis and  
that he will not sell or offer for sale  
in the said City of Fredericton, any  
milk procured from any cow which  
has not been so tested.

3. Every person so applying as  
aforesaid shall also furnish along  
with the application and with said  
declaration, a certificate in writing  
from an accredited veterinary sur-  
geon, approved by the local Board of  
Health, certifying that all the cows  
from which the applicant procured  
any milk for the purpose of sale,  
have been tested within one month  
from the date of such application,  
with Tuberculin for the diagnosis of  
tuberculosis, and that the said cows  
and each and every one of them are  
entirely free from Tuberculosis, Cow  
Pox, Actinorhynchosis, Puerperal Fever,  
Retention of the Placenta or any  
other malignant or contagious dis-  
ease. All certificates from veterinary  
surgeons shall be on forms approved  
of and supplied by the local Board  
of Health.

4. And every person owning or  
keeping herds from which milk is sold  
in the City of Fredericton, shall,  
upon making any additions to said  
herds, have each and every addition  
properly tested with Tuberculin for  
the diagnosis of tuberculosis and  
shall file a certificate from an accre-  
dited veterinary surgeon that said  
additions are free from tuberculosis.  
5. And every person selling milk  
in the City of Fredericton shall have  
their entire herd of cows properly  
tested for tuberculosis as before pro-  
vided, at least once every year, be-  
tween the first of April and the first  
of May. Should the Board deem it  
necessary in the interest of the pub-  
lic health, they can order any or all  
herds from which milk is supplied to  
the City of Fredericton to be tested  
with Tuberculin as before described,  
twice during the year.

6. Every license to sell milk with-  
in the City of Fredericton shall be  
subject to the condition that the li-  
censee shall and will observe, abide by  
and perform all the restrictions, con-  
ditions and regulations from time to  
time adopted or enacted by the local  
Board of Health during the currency  
of said license or any renewal there-  
of, and upon the said licensee failing  
to observe, comply with or perform  
any of such restrictions, conditions  
or regulations, the license granted  
to such vendor of milk shall forth-  
with become null and void.

7. Every licensed vendor of milk  
offering milk for sale in the City of  
Fredericton shall at least once a  
year, deliver to the Board of Health  
a statement containing (1) His name  
and address; (2) The source or  
sources of his milk supply; (3) The  
number of cows in his possession;  
(4) The average quantity of milk dis-  
posed of either (a) to milk shops, (b)  
to milk vendors, (c) or to private  
consumers; (5) The situation of his  
dairy or dairies, and such other in-  
formation as the Board or its officers  
may deem necessary.

8. Every licensed vendor of milk  
shall comply with the various clau-  
ses of the Public Health Act by giv-  
ing notice to the local Board of any  
cases of contagious disease in his  
family or in his farm house or shop  
at which from which, or in which the  
milk is either sent or received, and  
he shall further carry out the res-  
trictions laid upon him by the local  
Board under the Public Health Act.

9. No licensed milk vendor shall  
sell or offer for sale in the city of  
Fredericton any milk which is un-  
wholesome or unfit for human food,  
or any milk which has been adulter-  
ated, or has been reduced or chang-  
ed by the addition of water or other  
substance, or by the removal of  
cream, or milk known as swill milk,  
or milk from cows or other animals  
fed upon garbage or the like sub-  
stance, or milk from diseased ani-  
mals; but skimmed milk may be sold  
as such if contained in cans or  
vessels bearing upon their exterior  
the word "Skimmed" placed conspicu-  
ously in letters not less than two  
inches in length; and no person shall  
supply such skimmed milk unless  
such quality of milk is asked for by  
purchaser.

10. Every licensed milk vendor shall  
permit all his milk cows and cow  
byres, and all dairies and other places  
in which milk is sold or kept, to be  
inspected by the Health Officers, or  
person or persons appointed for that  
purpose by the Board of Health  
whenever any such officers may desire  
to do so, and no licensed vendor of  
milk shall keep any milk intended for  
sale, or which may be afterwards sold  
or offered for sale in the said city,  
in any place where such milk is likely  
to become unwholesome or liable to  
produce disease, either by reason of  
adulteration, contamination with  
sewage, absorption of disease germs  
infection of cows, uncleanness, or  
any other unrecognized cause, nor

in any place condemned by the Board  
or its authorized official, nor carry  
it in any wagon of vehicle used for  
the conveyance of swill, manure, or  
any other offensive material.

11. Every licensed vendor of milk  
shall have the number of his license  
conspicuously placed on the wagon  
or vehicle from which the milk is  
sold, and every can or vessel from  
which it is sold when no vehicle is  
used.

12. Every dairyman and vendor of  
milk and every driver of milk wagons  
or vehicles having in his possession  
in the city of Fredericton milk for  
sale in the said city at the time,  
shall, whenever so requested, furnish  
the Inspector of the Board with such  
samples of milk as he may require  
from time to time and at such places  
as the samples may be demanded.

13. Every sample of milk shall have  
a label attached to the vessel con-  
taining it, which shall have written  
thereon at the time of collecting it,  
the number of sample, date of col-  
lection and the initials of the officer  
or inspector receiving the same, who  
shall at once enter in a book (carried  
for that purpose) for further refer-  
ence, a corresponding number with  
the name of the owner or driver from  
whom the said sample was obtained.

14. Each sample shall be examined  
separately according to its number,  
by the medical health officer or per-  
son appointed for the purpose, who  
shall register the specific gravity, tem-  
perature and percentage of butter  
fat, opposite a corresponding number  
in a book kept for that purpose, the  
names of the owners to be subse-  
quently inserted.

15. The Health Officers and Sanitary  
Inspectors are authorized and  
required to inspect, as often as to  
them or any of them seem necessary,  
all Milk offered for sale whether on  
any of the streets, public places or  
shops of the said City, and to seize  
and destroy all such Milk which may,  
on such inspection, be found unwhole-  
some or unfit for human food.

16. Any one infringing any of the  
above regulations will be subject, for  
every offence to a penalty not ex-  
ceeding Forty Dollars.

17. These regulations will come in  
force on the first day of June, 1912.  
Passed and enacted this twenty-  
sixth day of April A. D. 1912.

## NEXT HEIR TO EARLDOOM OF ASHBURNHAM

Well Known Citizen of Fredericton  
Comes from a Distinguished Fa-  
mily

(St. John Times)

In the interesting series of letters  
by La Marquise de Fontenoy, appear-  
ing in the Times, one of special local  
interest has come to hand. It an-  
nounces Major the Hon. Thomas Ash-  
burnham of Fredericton as now being  
the next heir to the British Earldom  
of Ashburnham. The Times' Freder-  
icton correspondent asked Major Ash-  
burnham about it and he confirmed  
the report. The Fontenoy letter  
states that the earldom is now held  
by Major Ashburnham's uncle. He  
says this is not correct, that it is  
held by his brother. The Fontenoy  
letter reads as follows:—

Major the Hon. Thomas Ashburn-  
ham, late a captain of the 7th Hus-  
sars who is married to a Canadian,  
the daughter of W. H. Anderson of  
Fredericton, N. B., where he has had  
his home for the last seven years,  
has, through the death of his brother  
John, become the next heir to the  
Earldom of Ashburnham. The pre-  
sent incumbent thereof is his uncle,  
who is seventy-two years of age, and  
a widower, with one child and that  
a daughter.

The Ashburnham family, according  
to Burke, quoting from "Fuller's  
Worthies," is "of stupendous antiq-  
uity," and quoting Nesbet, "is one  
of the ancientest families in Eng-  
land which can be instructed to have  
been of good account in England be-  
fore the conquest."

The first absolutely authentic mem-  
ber of the family whom direct de-  
scendant in the male line can be proved,  
is Reginald de Hesseburnham, who  
by a deed in Lord Ashburnham's  
possession, gave certain lands to the  
monks of the church of St. Martin,  
at Battle, in Sussex. Subsequently  
the name was modified to Ashburnham  
and in 1407 it appears from docu-  
mentary evidences to have assumed  
the present form, Ashburnham.

John Ashburnham was one of the  
groom of the bed chamber to Charles  
I., and member of Parliament for  
Hastings in 1640. In 1646, when  
Charles I. deemed it advisable to  
leave Oxford, John Ashburnham acted  
as his only servant and guide. He  
was afterwards instrumental in the  
fight of Charles I. from Hampton  
Court, and eventually was committed  
to the Tower by Cromwell where he  
remained until the Protector's death.

William Ashburnham took an active  
part in the civil war, being expelled  
from Parliament for his fidelity to  
the crown. He was a major general  
in the royal army.

Ashburnham Place, in Sussex, the  
principal seat of the family, is a  
delightfully picturesque country  
house, with gables and lofty tower,  
perched on a knoll in a deep wood-  
ed glen. Its most precious posses-  
sions, in its owner's eyes, are the  
relics of Charles I., including the  
shirt, silk drawers and watch he wore  
on the scaffold, and the blood-stained  
sheet in which the headless body was  
wrapped after his death.

About four years ago Lord Ash-  
burnham offered a home on his Welsh  
estate to some Benedictine monks  
from Brittany, whose tongue is so  
much like the language of Wales that  
they found themselves able to con-  
verse freely with the Carmarthen-  
shire neighbors, who received them  
very kindly.

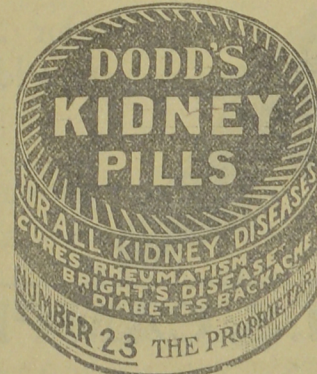
