HON. RODOLPHE LEMIEUX TAKES FALL OUT OF MONK

Speaking at great Liberal meeting in the Monument National at Montreal on Saturday evening, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, ex-postmaster general said:

"Sir Lomer Gouin had realized all the aspirations which the people of Quebec placed in him. His inflexible rectitude naturally bore him to the eminent post which he occupies with such distinction. Sir Lomer Gouin understood that if our province was to remain faithful to certain ideals it must be started out along the lines of progress and higher education. Faithful to the policy of his great predecessor, Honore Mercier, he multiplied the grants for elementary schools and night schools, while the monument of his work, the greatest works of his life are the School for Higher Commercial Studies and the technical schools of Montreal and Quebec. Sir Lomer Gouin understood better than any other that after having restored the finances, it was most important to give the youth of the French and English-speaking races those educational advantages which would assure a brilliant future for them. The reproaches which have been made against him in this respect are on a par with the mentality of the Conservative leaders.

"The Gouin Government has reduced the working hours for women and children in factories to fifty-five hours a week; it has regulated the inspection of factories, and Sir Lomer Gouin has given us a law governing accidents to workmen which is the most perfect in the Dominion and which is copied by Ontario and all the other provinces. Honor to Sir Lomer Gouin!

"You were told recently that Sir Lomer Gouin intended to depend on his Federal friends for support in the present campaign. Sir Lomer Gouin does not need to borrow any aid from others. He has continued the work of Honore Mercier, and he has continued the reputation of integrity which characterized Hon. Felix Gabriel Marchand. He represents in Quebec what Sir Oliver Mowatt represented in Ontario—the ideal of the sovereignty of provincial autonomy.

The Conservative need not make any mistake. It is not the reciprocity question which is at stake in the present campaign. That question,

belongs to the federal domain and in that domain—thank God!—it will receive its definite solution.

"It is the Conservative leaders who are asking help from their Federal friends to try to win this election. I wish to put you on your guard against these friends of Mr. Tellier. In a speech the other night at the Ames banquet, at which Mr. Monk (boobs), Mr. Pelletier (booths) and Mr. T. Chase Casgrain were present, the latter declared that the time was coming on May 15 when Laurierism would be crushed out of the province of Quebec.

"Mr. Casgrain will permit me to say that no matter how horrible his name or record is, he has perhaps forgotten that Laurierism will live as long as the name of 'Laurier' lives in the hearts of the French-Canadian race. The memory of Casgrain will not live while Laurier's name is still green, because we will see that his name lives and that his principles will triumph before long.

HISTORY OF CANADA DIVIDED INTO THREE PERIODS

Mr. Casgrain will permit me to tell him that the defeat of last September will never obscure the figure of Laurier. It will rather be like the shades in a splendid painting, bringing out the beauties of the picture. We are proud of gigantic work accomplished by Laurier. I think the history of Canada is divided into three periods: first, the Baldwin-Lafontaine period; let us be just to our opponent and say that the Cartier-McDonald period saw Confederation established, but Sir Wilfrid Laurier completed the work of Lafontaine and Cartier in uniting the races and proclaiming the advantages of Canada to the greatest Empire in the world. Pelletier, I place myself on the side of Laurier and the friends of Monk and this is not Federal politics, but if we It is this Laurierism that we are going to crush out on May 15! No, of Laurier. Sir Wilfrid Laurier in any event has been avenged in the bankruptcy of Nationalism.

"As for Mr. Monk, I declare here to the Liberals who are listening to me, that since September 21 Mr. Monk has shown himself to be the most cruel persecutor in the annals of Canadian politics, driving hundreds of modest Liberal functionaries

from their positions.

"He is not the man that you had pictured him, a virtuous stranger amongst the Liberal army of vice," continued Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux. "Not the man with the open hand and the smiling face, but the man with the closed fist and the sneering smile who has knocked down as many as he has been able of the men who committed the crime of voting for Laurier at the last election."

Mr. Monk had stated that the Province of Quebec would have to follow the lead of the Ottawa Government if it wanted to be given its share of the patronage.

"The Province of Quebec is not for sale and it will not be sold," said the ex-Minister of Marine.

BLAMES PREJUDICES FOR DEFEAT OF LAST SEPTEMBER

Mr. Lemieux referred at length to the last federal campaign wherein the Laurier Government went down to defeat. He claimed that the defeat was due to the fact that prejudices of a different nature had simultaneously been resorted to and raised in Ontario and Quebec.

"I accuse Messrs. Monk and Pelletier of having made the first attack upon the autonomy of Canada and the rights of the different provinces," charged Mr. Lemieux.

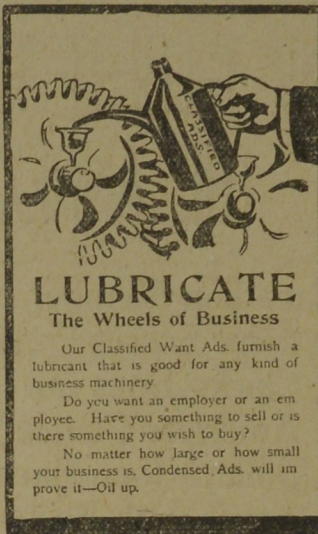
Mr. Lemieux made a bitter attack upon Mr. Monk, and accused him of having failed to accomplish any of the acts that he had promised he would do.

"A day of dupes," he referred to the 21st of September last as being. "Conservatives are looking back to the glorious victory of 1878. Liberals referred with fond recollection to the great victory of 1896, but no one refers to the 21st of September last as a glorious day.
