BORDEN'S TERM OF OFFICE LIKELY TO BE BRIEF

Hon. W. L. McKenzie King Discusses Political Matters in an Interview at St. John

(St. John Telegraph)

Looked upon as one of the great men of Canada, although now only in his thirties, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, minister of Labor in the Laurier government, is a guest in the city. Since the defeat of the government Hon. Mr. King has taken a prominent part in Ontario politics as president of the Reform Association, and assisted in the successful campaign in South Renfrew as well as in the provincial elections in which the Liberals made considerable gains against the strongly entrenched government led by Sir James P. Whitney.

In an interview with a Telegraph reporter yesterday afternoon, Mr. King expressed conviction that the Borden government would be short lived, its records having been a distinct disappointment to Conservatives as well as Liberals.

"Coming into power with 'any number of promises,' he said, 'the government has as yet failed to fulfill any one of the pledges. Strongest of all they placed before the people in the last campaign their views on Imperialism and the duty of defending the Empire, including an aggressive naval policy. They began, however, with taking into the cabinet such men as Monk, Pelletier and Nantel, who were avowed followers of Bourassa and the navy policy. At the same time, while denouncing the Laurier government's naval policy before the election they have neither repealed nor changed it in any particular."

"Hardly had they attained office than they sought to increase their following in the house by forcing a fight in the by-election in South Renfrew but that election was certainly disappointing to their followers," said Mr. King.

"In the speech from the throne at the opening of parliament," he continued, "the government laid stress upon the importance of appointing a tariff commission and of giving aid to the provinces in connection with the making of roads, but at the speech from the throne at the close of parliament no mention was made of either of these measures although most of the time of the session was taken up in their debate. The reasons why these were dropped at the last minute, after being included in the speech, in fact, discloses motives on the part of the government which are by no means creditable."

"The Liberals had sought to have included in the tariff commission bill a clause which would protect the con-

sumer by requiring that when application was made for an increase in the tariff, the commission would inquire into the profits made in this industry, the amount of the output and other items which would show the real need for additional protection. The Conservative party was unwilling to adopt this amendment and allow the profits of protection to be shown up, and so allowed the measure to be sacrificed."

"In the case of the bill for aiding the provinces to build roads the Liberals gave hearty support to the idea of assisting the provinces if carried out on the basis of granting the money to the provinces according to population and allow the provincial governments to administer the fund. By refusing to acquiesce in this, and seeking to retain expenditure of the money in his own department, Mr. Cochrane, minister of railways and canals, made it evident that he was seeking to introduce into federal politics the same insidious method he employed while a minister of the Ontario government, of having available a fund of this kind for the possible influence of constituencies just prior to elections."

"The appointment of Mr. Morine as chairman of a commission to inquire into the civil service, in view of his past record in Newfoundland, which was known to the prime minister at the time of the appointment, greatly impaired the prestige of the government and its leader with members of the Conservative party throughout Canada."

"The increase in public expenditure of more than \$40,000,000 in the first year of the government's tenure of office," said Mr. King, "is also a disappointment to the public everywhere, and indicates that instead of surpluses being rolled up as in the years of Liberal administration, surpluses will be rolled down and the public debt piled up."

"An increase of \$9,000,000 in the militia estimates is also an indication of the extent the jingo spirit is likely to make itself felt in the administration, and in the absence of a single measure for the betterment of industrial conditions, the working men of Canada are hardly likely to view with satisfaction the increased expenditure of this kind."

"I might mention, also, the many commissions, which have been appointed, evidently for the purpose of giving government patronage to its

supporters and to the dismissal of many trustworthy civil servants, all of which have shaken public confidence in the professions of the party before it was in power and particularly of the leader that they were in favor of the British system of administering the public service and removing it from politics altogether, rather than the American spoils system.

"On the other hand, the confidence in Sir Wilfrid Laurier is stronger in the hearts and minds of the people of Canada today than it ever has been and I find that the impression that the Borden administration will be short-lived is gaining ground every day. Nowhere is this feeling stronger than in the province of Ontario. If there were an election in Ontario tomorrow the Liberal representation would be larger than it was before the last election and as president of the Reform Association I will undertake that the normal Liberal strength of forty seats or more will be restored in the next election, whenever that may be. That means, of course, that Sir Wilfrid will be premier again."

Asked to speak of his impressions of St. John Hon. Mr. King said that he found in the city many evidences of prosperity and progress.

"I find business thriving," he said, "and the outlook good for a doubling of your export business as soon as the Courtenay Bay work is completed. When I was a member of the government no week passed without Dr. Pugsley making some reference to St. John and Courtenay Bay and in fact, your representative let no opportunity pass of impressing upon his colleagues and upon private members of the house the national importance of providing suitable facilities for the Grand Trunk Pacific and other railways at Canada's winter port. I can see evidences today of the wisdom of his course and some of the things which will be accomplished through his instrumentality. The last time I was in St. John I attended a banquet in his honor given soon after he and I became members of the Laurier government and coming here again after several years have passed I am able to congratulate the citizens of St. John on the fact that their representative has made good."

In speaking to the Canadian Club last evening Hon. Mr. King also paid a glowing tribute to Hon. Mr. Pugsley's work on behalf of St. John, a reference which was received with hearty applause.

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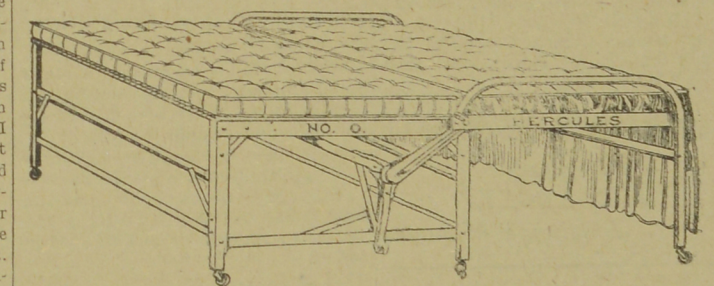
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
