## WILL RUSH WORK ON THE VALLEY RAILWAY

(Woodstock Press.)

That the work of constructing the St. John Valley Railway will be pushed forward as rapidly as possible and that, if no delay arises in connection with the building of the bridges, trains will be running from St. John to Grand Falls within two years, was the statement made by A. R. Gould, president of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company, who was at St. John Wednesday and interviewed by The Standard.

"We plan to have the road as far as Grand Falls built and in operation in two years time," said Mr. Gould. "Of course, we may be delayed, but in any case the road will be completed as far as Grand Falls, well, within three years."

"Our chief engineer, Mr. Thompson, has purchased a residence at Fredericton and surveying parties have been sent out from both Fredericton and Woodstock to make profiles and to secure data necessary to making specifications for contractors to work on, in putting in tenders for construction work. This survey work will be

sufficiently advanced by spring to enable construction to be started at Fredericton and Woodstock, and construction gangs will be set to work at both these points, moving both ways."

"When will you start on this end?" "As soon as possible after we get things under way at Woodstock and Fredericton. We will begin work at Rothesay and construct the line towards the bridge on the Kennebecasis. Arrangements have been made with the I.C.R. to connect up with their tracks near Rothesay."

"How long will it take to build the bridges over the St. John River and Kennebecasis?"

"They could be built in about a year," replied Mr. Gould. "But it will probably take longer. I can't say just when a start will be made on the bridges. We are going to Ottawa next week to consult with the government and their engineers in regard to the building of the bridges. After the conference I expect to know more about the bridge question than I do now."

Rumball, who was arraigned in court here today to stand trial for the alleged murder of her 13-year-old stepdaughter, Helen Rumball. The little girl was found dead in the attic of her home near here last July. In the morning of the day of her death, her stepmother had whipped her and bound her to the studding of the attic because, according to the stepmother, the little girl had misbehaved. It was one of the hottest days of the year and the consequent heat in the attic was increased by an incubator in operation. The supposition is that the girl fainted from the heat and in falling to the floor was strangled by the rope with which she was tied. The medical examination showed that her neck was broken in two places. When the facts became known Mrs. Rumball was indicted for causing the death of her stepdaughter. Arthur Lewis, a brother of Mrs. Rumball, was indicted as an accessory. Lewis was tried several weeks ago and convicted of manslaughter.
