BROOKLYN LED NATIONAL LEAGUE IN STRIKE-OUTS

St. Louis had Greatest Number of Bases on Balls, Sweeney Smallest Number of Strikeouts

New York, Jan. 21—Official record of bases on balls, strikeouts and first base on errors by teams in the National League for the season of 1911, with individual figures in some cases, were made public today by Sec. John Heydler.

National League pitchers, these statistics show, gave 4279 bases on balls. The St. Louis club led with 592 passes received, Chicago was second with 585 and Cincinnati third with 578. Brooklyn was last with 425.

Sheppard of Chicago, led the league with 147 passes in 16 games. Bates and Bescher of Cincinnati, followed with 103 and 102 respectively. Sweeney led Boston with 77, Hummel had 67, Devore 81, Krabe 94, Wagner and Byrne 67 each and Higgins 96.

STRIKEOUTS.

There were 4798 strikeouts last season. These were divided among the eight clubs as follows:

A new departure of the keeping of records shows the number of men reaching first on errors. These figures show 1196 runners profited in this way. Boston was favored 171 times, Philadelphia 164 times, Pittsburgh 154, Cincinnati 151, St. Louis 147, Brooklyn 141, New York 139, Chicago 129.

Sweeney of Boston, led the individual players, reaching first 35 times on errors. The other club leaders were Mitchell 25, Lobert 23, Daubert 23, Wilson of Pittsburgh 21, Evans 19, Merkle 18 and Hofman 16.

He has an idea that, if he can draw a crowd just to see him umpire a game, as was the case when he officiated in a game in Saginaw, Mich., last summer, his ability to bat may also be of commercial value to him.

Anson batted for better than 300 in twenty years of his long National League career in baseball, falling below that mark only twice from 1876 to 1897 inclusive. Moreover, he left the game still a great batsman. His style was so perfect and his eye so accurate, that it may be possible that the "old man" may not be dreaming that he has still a stock of pinch hits on tap, if some one will give him a chance to unload them. At any rate it would be an interesting experiment in baseball, and if he makes good, his prowess may yield him the honest money he is looking for.
