TO DASH HOPES OF RICHESON

Boston, Jan. 20—Clarence V. T.
Richeson, condemned prisoner of Avis
Linnell, has not yet been told of the
refusal of the executive council to
commute the death sentence of Silas
Phelps, the Franklin County outlaw.
Day by day, locked in his cell at the
Charles Street jail, he is awaiting
word of the council's decision, brac-
ing himself with the hope that, should
the council commute Phelps' sentence,
it might also commute his.

William A. Morse, Richeson's coun-
sel, will visit him in his cell today,
and in all probability will tell him
that Phelps must die. The jailers be-
lieve it will be a severe shock to Rich-
eson. They have refrained from tel-
ling him, though he has questioned
them repeatedly, and the newspapers
have been denied him since his con-
fession and sentence.

According to his jailers, Richeson's
condition is satisfactory and is im-
proving every day. They say he eats
and sleeps well. The negro, Butts,
who is awaiting trial for murder, still
sits with Richeson in his cell and, at
times, reads to him from the New
Testament. In addition one of the
prison guards sits outside the cell
door every hour of the day and night.
Sheriff Quinn is determined that
Richeson shall leave Charles Street
jail alive, and keeps a double guard
to prevent suicide.

OPPOSE NEW WOODMEN LEVY

Chicago, Ill. Jan. 23—A convention
of the head camp of the Modern
Woodmen of America, composed of
about 800 delegates representing the
1,500,000 members of the order
throughout the country, met in this
city today to consider and act upon
the question of raising the insurance
rates of the organization. The higher
rates are proposed in order to con-
form with the so-called Mobile Law,
a measure agreed upon by a conven-
tion of fraternal insurance organiza-
tions held at Mobile a year ago,
which decided upon a uniform rate in
order to meet the requirements of
the insurance laws of the many States.
Many of the local camps of the
Woodmen have protested against the
proposed increase and the opposition
has gone so far as to threaten se-
cession from the parent organization
if the assessment is raised.

IOWA BUTTERMAKERS MEET

Mason City, Jan. 23—The growing
importance of the dairying industry
in Iowa was evidenced by the large
and representative attendance here
today at the opening of the annual
convention of the State Butter Mak-
ers' Association. The business ses-
sions of the convention are being held
at the court house and will continue
three days. In connection with the
gathering there is an elaborate ex-
hibition of dairy products and dairy
machinery.

POLITICAL PARADOX IN SOUTH RENFREW

the Conservative party were not do-
ing anything wrong in opposing Hon.
G. P. Graham, and added: "I want
to say right here that more than once
I told Mr. Llw, indeed the last time
not more than three hours before his
resignation, that under no conditions
would I agree to the proposed agree-
ment, because it was a question for
the electors of South Renfrew to de-
cide in convention. You have select-
ed Dr. Maloney, and every member
of the government is ready to come
here and help you elect him. When
the Liberal party, by means of a
lavish expenditure of money and by
other unfair means, succeeded in de-
feating our honored leader, Hon. R.
L. Borden, in Halifax, and we asked
them to allow his election in Carle-
ton by acclamation before Parliament
so that he could lead us from the
opening of the session, G. P. Graham
and others refused and made us wait
until the House met, and they kept
Mr. Borden out of the House as long
as they could, although Carleton
never elected anybody but a Conser-
vative, and the election was a mere
matter of form. For this kind act
they now ask us to allow Mr. Graham
to be elected by acclamation. Not if
I know it. We are out for a fight.
If you are prepared to fight us hard
as we are we will win, and will send
G. P. Graham back to Brockville to
run his newspaper."

Mr. Reid next enumerated some
reasons why the electors of South
Renfrew should support the Borden
Government. Dr. Maloney he refer-
red to as a supporter of the Govern-
ment, who is always more useful
than a member of the Opposition.
"He is always on the job in the
interests of his country. But what
can a member of the Opposition do
for you? Mr. Low has a week in
which to give his answer, but we are
going to start work at once. We will
wait a week, and if at the end of that
time he does not pull it off it will
never be pulled off at all, and we will
fight for the next two months."

MR. MCGARRY STANDS BY IT

A resolution of confidence in the
Borden and Whitney Administration
was then passed, and the proceedings
seemed to be at an end, but the con-
vention called loudly for "McGarry,"
and then came the anti-climax of the
notable gathering. Greeted with rous-
ing cheers, the local member said:
"I want to tell you that I have not
changed my position one iota. I did
not sign the agreement, but I stand
by it, and on my honor I feel bound
to observe that agreement to the let-
ter. I have nothing but the best
wishes for Dr. Maloney, who is one of
my closest personal friends, but as an
honorable man I must stand by that
agreement, and my friends, who are
men of honor, will also stand by it un-
til they are relieved by the Liberal
party. There is not a man who signed
that agreement but has the highest
regard for Mr. Borden and the Govern-
ment. There is not a man on that
agreement who will vote against Dr.
Maloney; but there is not a man on
the agreement who will work for
him or talk for him. Every man who
signed that agreement will observe
that agreement to the letter, and will
do nothing which will injure his repu-
tation as a man of honor."

NOT TO RESIGN

"It has been said that I am go-
ing to resign. I am not. I am going
to continue to represent South Ren-
frew. I will not resign until the peo-
ple ask me to do so. I am bound in
honor. I have offered my resigna-
tion to the Minister at Ottawa and
to the Liberal party, and if they ac-
cept it I am willing to step out, but
both must agree. But I could not
give back to the Liberal party the
position as it stood on December 4.
Now the Government is in power and
conditions are very different. It
would be cowardly, it would be mean,
if I were to open the constituency
now, when I could not do so on fair
conditions. So far both the Liberal
party and the Ministers have refused
to accept my resignation, and so I
stay. I stand on my honor and on
the honor of my friends, but I tell
you frankly that, so far as they and I
are concerned, I cannot enter into
the campaign." (Great cheering.)

This ended the proceedings, al-
though later there were cheers for
the King, for Dr. Maloney, and,
above all, for Tom McGarry, who
came out of the ordeal as honest
man.

Chicago, Jan. 23—The Belleville
Club of Chicago, at its second an-
nual dinner to be given at the Hotel
La Salle tomorrow night will have
as its guest of honor and principal
speaker, Honorable Sir MacKenzie
Bowell, K.C.M.G., former premier of
Canada. The club is composed of
Belleville men who formerly lived in
Belleville, Ontario.
