
A. R. SLIPP, M. P. P.
APPOINTED FELLOW OF
ROYAL COLONIAL INST.

Other Canadians Similarly Honored at Same Time—Distinction has been Conferred on but Few in This Province

BRITISH BODY INTERESTED
IN MATTERS COLONIAL

Despatches from London state that Mr. A. R. Slipp, M. P. P., of this city has been elected a fellow of the Royal Colonial Institute. Other Canadians similarly honored at the same time are Mr. William Dennis of the Halifax Herald, John Leary and W. H. Malken.

The honor of being elected to membership in the Royal Colonial Institute is one which has not been conferred upon a great many Canadians and Mr. Slipp has been particularly fortunate in being singled out for the distinction. This province contains but few members of the institute.

The Royal Colonial Institute is a body which was formed for the purpose of furthering in Great Britain the interests of the outlying portions of the British Empire and its membership includes some of the foremost statesmen and thinkers of the empire. Subjects related to the colonies and of an Imperial interest are discussed at its meetings and the reports issued by the body show that in many ways the institute serves to keep the public of Great Britain in touch with matters colonial.

STREET LIGHTING
MATTERS CONSIDERED

City Council Today Taking up Applications for Position of Superintendent—Ottawa Delegation

The City Council this afternoon is considering the proposition of the Fredericton Gaslight Company to light the streets of the city and also is taking into consideration the applications for the position of superintendent of the Street Lighting Department made vacant by the death of the late W. H. McGinn. His Worship Mayor Thomas has received one application from St. John and Ald. Kitchen chairman of the Street Lighting Committee has received two from local men.

The meeting of the council will also furnish an opportunity for the aldermen to lay plans concerning the work of the delegation which is to go to Ottawa to press for assistance from the federal government for river-dredging, and wharf-building and also for the locating in this city of the car-shops of the St. John Valley Railway. Up to the present the date on which the delegation is to leave has not been fixed nor have any arrangements been made. The announcement which appeared in a local newspaper yesterday to the effect that the delegation would leave this evening came as a great surprise to the members of the delegation themselves.

ST. MARY'S APPOINTMENT

It is understood that the appointment of James Ashfield as tax-collector for the parish of St. Mary's in the place of Wm. Jaffrey was made after a struggle between two Tory factions in the parish. Mr. Ashfield was the choice of the two councillors but the Mullin-Blair faction boomed Vernon Matthews assistant to Postmaster Blair of St. Mary's for the office. The councillors won out.

COMMITTEE TO
PRESENT MEMORIAL
TO HIS LORDSHIP

Draft of Memorial Submitted to Congregation of Cathedral at Last Night's Meeting Suffered Important Alterations

CONGREGATION UNANIMOUS
RE MATTER OF CHANGE

The congregation of Christchurch Cathedral at a meeting held in Church Hall last night decided unanimously to present to His Lordship the Bishop of Fredericton a memorial expressing plainly the opposition of the congregation to the proposal to change the place of episcopal residence from Fredericton to St. John. The decision to present the memorial was reached by unanimous vote but after several important alterations had been made in the memorial.

COMMITTEE APPOINTED

His Lordship Bishop Richardson was not in the city at the time the meeting was held and a committee was appointed to present the memorial to him. The committee was composed of Dr. T. C. Allen, Mr. A. J. Gregory and Mr. O. H. Sharpe. His Lordship was expected to return to Fredericton today and the memorial will be presented either today or Wednesday.

ALTERATIONS MADE

When the original draft of the memorial was read objection was taken to certain clauses. One implied that the change in residence would be followed by more important changes in the diocese. Mr. J. F. Winslow objected that a threat was implied in the words and they were struck out. Mr. A. A. Sterling objected to another clause which stated that a precedent had been established in the change of residence of the Bishop of New Westminster. Mr. Sterling pointed out that the cases were not at all parallel, the Bishop of New Minister being created an archbishop.

BRITISH FINANCIAL
MEN TO VISIT THIS
PROVINCE IN APRIL

Large Party Representing English and Scottish Firms will Come Looking for Opportunities for Making Investments

W. LEONARD PALMER
ORGANIZING PARTY

A letter received last week from Mr. W. Leonard Palmer, of London, England, representing The London Financial News, contained the information that in April next he would personally conduct a large party of English and Scottish financial men over this province, paying particular attention to the St. John Valley. Mr. Palmer's letter stated that the men composing the party would represent reliable and solid financial concerns in Great Britain, who could place a considerable amount of capital in this province if suitable opportunities should present themselves, and Mr. Palmer believes that New Brunswick offers as favorable a field for British capital as does any other portion of the Dominion.

It is recognized that the month of April comes too early in the spring to enable the St. John Valley to be shown to greatest advantage. June would be the most favorable month, but the itinerary of the British financiers as now arranged, will not permit of their coming to this province at that time.

U.N.B. HOCKEY CAPTAIN.

K. R. Machum of the junior class at U.N.B., was this morning elected captain of the College hockey team for 1912. He is a son of Mr. E. R. Machum of St. John.
