## Winning Ticket Nominated Yesterday in King's County

Dr. G. N. Pearson, S. H. Flewelling and O. W. Wetmore Chosen as Candidates by Largely Attended Liberal Convention at Hampton -- A. B. Copp, M. P. P., Received a Magnificent Reception

Hampton, N.B., May 16—Kings County joined in the movement for good government in New Brunswick after four years of wasteful administration this afternoon when a winning ticket was chosen at the large and representative Liberal convention at which the opposition leader laid down a most progressive policy with regard to aid to rural districts of the province. Dr. G. N. Pearson of Sussex; S. H. Flewelling of Hampton, and O. W. Wetmore of Clifton, will be the next representatives for Kings County if the temper and enthusiasm of the convention which nominated them this afternoon is any indication of the feeling of the whole people. Mr. Flewelling was chosen as one of the candidates at the Liberal convention held more than a year ago in anticipation of an early election at that time, and was re-nominated after a friendly contest with F. E. Sharp of Midland, and the nomination made unanimous on the motion of Mr. Sharp himself, who made a manly address and promised to work his hardest for the election of the good government opposition candidates.

The three candidates spoke at some length and made a most telling impression, giving evidence of their ability to conduct a strenuous campaign with victory as the goal.

### MR. COPP'S FINE POLICY.

A. B. Copp, leader of the opposition, who was most heartily received, came out strong for an advanced agricultural policy and declared that previous governments had been but playing with the matter.

"If the province can guarantee bonds for a railway to the extent of \$25,000 a mile," he said in presenting this new policy, "and take for security one mile of this railway, would it not be as safe and as business-like to pledge the credit of the province for the benefit of a farmer who wishes assistance and take as security that man's farm?"

Mr. Copp proceeded to outline the policy of loaning money to farmers at five per cent. and taking long term mortgages for the benefit of the sons of the province who wished to take up and occupy land.

Mr. Copp also came out in favor of securing cheaper telephone communication in the rural districts and condemned the Flemming government as being tied hand and foot by wealthy corporations.

He said that, aside from the question of telephone rates in the cities, the government should secure special dispensation for those in country districts and said he had in mind a scheme by which it could be worked out without it costing the province one dollar.

Mr. Copp also advocated other reforms in the interests of the people, and it was quite evident that in this energetic and popular leader the people have found a champion against the bosses and the corporations. Mr. Copp's handling of the two members of Kings who remain in the field was heartily applauded by the neighbors of these men, who are better able to judge than anyone else of the identity of "various persons" as mentioned in the auditor general's report.

### GREAT CONTRAST.

Today's convention was in marked contrast to the government gathering of Tuesday when, as E. S. Carter, the secretary of the county Liberal Association remarked, practically all those present were secretary-treasurers of highway boards or game wardens. ## Minister of Militia Visitor to City Today

## W. F. HATHEWAY TURNED DOWN

Flemming Government Slaps Organized Labor in the Face

Refused Labor Commissionership and in Consequence will not be Candidate in St. John City

The Flemming government has given organized labor throughout the province a cold turn-down in its treatment of Mr. W. F. Hatheway, M. P. P., for St. John City. At the last election Mr. Hatheway was returned largely by the votes of organized labor in St. John City the 'Longshoremen's and Ship Labour's' Unions. He had asked for the cabinet position of Commissioner of Labor but has not received it.

The St. John Globe yesterday had the following on the matter:—"Talking with the Globe today, Mr. W. F. Hatheway, M. P. P., confirmed the announcement made Wednesday evening that he had not noticed his colleagues that he would not be a candidate for re-election. Mr. Hatheway said the statement that his principal reason for withdrawing was because he had not been made Commissioner of Labor, might give the impression that he was disgruntled because he was not given a lucrative cabinet position. Such, however, was not the case. He had asked the appointment because of his interest in labor and in the interests of labor, and had expressed a willingness to discharge the duties of the position without remuneration. Mr. Hatheway, it is known, has not entirely approved the government's course as it affected labor interests or in granting concessions to large corporations without adequately safeguarding the province."

## THE STOCK MARKET

## RESULTS OF EXPLORATIONS

British School of Archaeology in Egypt Performed Great Work

Remarkable Discoveries near Memphis and Cairo—Linen Woven in Eleventh Dynasty Found Perfect

London, May 17—Details of the season's results in exploration by the British School of Archaeology in Egypt are described by Professor Petrie as gigantic. An alabaster sphinx was found at Memphis, 26 feet long and four feet high, which weighed sixty tons. The face is as perfect as when it was carved 1300 years B. C., earthen fortress walls over 100 feet thick and a quarter of a mile across, were discovered at Heliopolis.

They probably date back to the earlier barbaric invasions. A cemetery was discovered three miles south of Cairo, with dates on the stones from the earliest historic age down to the period of the pyramids.

Linen was found there, of which some sheets went back to the eleventh dynasty. They were as white and sweet, as if they were just from the loom.

Accompanied by his Staff and Engineering Officers-- Appearance of Military Property to be Greatly Improved--Fencing to be Replaced by Stone Coping Bearing Electric Lights -- Is the Guest of O. S. Crocket, M. P.

Accompanied by Col. Humphrey, Capt. Bingay and Lieut. C. B. Russell of Halifax, Col. Sam Hughes, M. P., Minister of Militia, arrived in the city this morning by private car, and is today the guest of Mr. O. S. Crocket, M. P. Col. Hughes is the fourth cabinet minister to visit Fredericton in the course of a week. Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways and Canals, having paid a visit to the city on Friday last, while Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce and Hon. J. D. Hazen, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, were here yesterday in attendance at the encoenia exercises at the University of New Brunswick.

Col. Hughes' visit is not purely social but is the outcome of urgent solicitations, invoked by ex-Mayor Thomas and other prominent citizens, calling the attention of his department to much needed repairs in and around the military quarters, and being part of a scheme for the beautifying of the city, of which these gentlemen were the leading spirits.

The Department of Militia and Defence was appealed to in January of the present year, when Lieut. C. B. Russell of the Royal Canadian Engineers was sent here from Halifax to look into the matter and make an estimate of the probable cost of the desired improvement. His report, it may be safely said, received the approval of the Department.

### IMPROVEMENTS ANNOUNCED

The old wooden fence at the military depot which faces on Queen St. will be torn down, to be replaced by coping similar to that which surrounds the Officers' Quarters. The coping however, will be much higher and will be crowned with a small iron fence. At intervals of about twenty feet, steel posts will be placed in the coping, each supporting three incandescent lights. The gate-way leading into the Barracks will be fenced off as usual, and the fence along Carleton Street will remain intact.

The repairs at the Officers Quarters are more elaborate, and will consist in the coping being raised for its entire length, with a small iron fence extending from the Post Office Block, along Queen, Regent and Campbell Streets, furnished as at the Barracks, with electric lights at the stated intervals.

### MORE GRANOLITHIC WALKS

The granolithic walk, which was placed in front of the Military Quarters by the late Liberal Government, will be extended along Regent Street, and to the end of the Officers' Quarters on Campbell Street.

It was also recommended that the wooden building which now forms part of the Officers' Quarters be torn down and replaced by either a stone or brick structure, but it would seem that this innovation did not meet with the approval of the department.
